Our Next Generation of School Leader – a Vital Investment?

In all aspects of life the need for outstanding leadership is immutable. The evidence is clear that in high performing schools we have wonderful leaders – talented, passionate individuals who hold at the heart of their work a deep sense of moral purpose – the desire and drive to make a difference in the lives of young people. Do these outstanding educational leaders emerge by osmosis or chance? Some do, but the vast majority don't. They develop and continue to refine their leadership practices through coaching, mentoring and other professional learning opportunities to ensure that they are the best professionals they can be.

The need for good leadership

High performing schools, and indeed organisations, are characterised by distributed approaches to leadership and a concomitant, deliberate investment in the growth of their current and future leaders. All professionals must continue to be committed to learning and all organisations are too complex to simply be reliant on the capacity of one or two individuals. A highly competent principal is a must for any school, but they cannot lead alone. Outstanding principals realise this and nurture leadership in others.

Arguably, the case for having the very best leaders in our schools is more important than most areas of enterprise. Schools work with our most precious, impressionable people – our children, our future generation. So, the development of our current and future school leaders must not be left to chance. The need for high quality leaders in all fields of endeavour remains an ongoing challenge. Data released by a leading Australian management consulting company, Mercer in 2013, noted that only 10 per cent of Australia's top 100 ASX businesses had identified their future generation of leaders. A very interesting statistic to reflect on in relation to the school sector.

The need is just as acute in the schooling sector.

Succession planning, the commitment to building a distributed leadership culture and fostering the next generation of leaders are very real and immediate reasons for identifying future leaders. Regrettably, the sustained and focussed investment in high quality leadership development remains an ongoing issue for the sector. There needs to be a 'pipeline' of future leaders developed but regrettably in too many schools the development, of leadership is left to chance and circumstance. The development of our school leaders, particularly the next generation of leaders, should not be seen as discretionary or optional – it is a vital investment that accrues real benefit for our children and our school leaders.

Identifying leadership qualities

So, what are the essential skills, characteristics and or dispositions that should be fostered in our future generation of school leaders? Here are some of these:

1) Maximising relationships

The most fundamental of these centres around relationships, relationships, relationships. School leaders now and into the future will continue to be required to effectively and artfully manage a diverse, complex, interconnected and sometimes dysfunctional set of relationships. These relationships require leaders who can establish trust and regard for children, parents and peers. The successful school leaders display authenticity and interest in others (Duignan, 2014). Parents and students want to know that their school's leaders and staff care about them. Simply, children don't learn from people (teachers) they don't like! Moreover, high performing schools and their leaders display aspiration for all children despite their circumstance and need a moral purpose that I noted earlier in this article. The research validates this – greater levels of student and parent engagement improves individual outcomes.

2) Ability to be self-reflective

Related to the above, the next quality I would suggest is a desired one for any leader, current or future, is the capacity to be self-reflective and focus on continuous personal enhancement. Research by Harvard Business School (2013) notes that 75% of respondents in a study on the key qualities of high performing CEOs were the ability to be reflective, to be honest, affirming areas of strength and looking for areas of their leadership they could further enhance.

Typically, outstanding school leaders have a commitment to ongoing personal learning typified by professional reading, learning with peers, a pride in the work they do and a deep sense of connection to a 'calling' rather than the job of school leadership.

3) Professional fluency

Future school leaders must have that desire to always improve and commit to what I would term 'professional fluency'. The education of our wonderful children is a very complex, shared and rewarding job. School leaders must develop a fluency about their work that not only is about technical and subject knowledge, but a never ending desire to provide outstanding professional practice that involves finding the keys to motivating and supporting our teachers to make that difference for our children.

4) Resilience, responsive and innovative

The disruptive, ever-changing and turbid world in which we live will challenge our school leaders to be responsive, innovative and highly able strategic thinkers. The challenges presented to leaders will require leaders in our schools to display high levels of collaboration; measured risk taking; vulnerability to learning and possibility; personal resilience; and the fortitude to ask the necessary questions.

The next steps for school leadership

Parents will continue to expect schools to be safe, nurturing environments for their children whilst equally expecting schools to enhance their global citizenship. The partnerships with school parents and the broader community will be critical for school leaders in moderating the essential features of what will constitute 'a good education'.

The identification, nurturing and ongoing development of current and future school leaders is a must for any school committed to the moral purpose of education – making a difference in the lives of all children regardless of circumstance and or ability. The immediate and long term cases for investing in school leadership is strong and has never been more urgent. Great schools are typically led by talented educational leaders.

Staff and students within the Faculty of Education and Arts strive to exemplify the mission in all aspects of our daily lives, whether engaged in learning and teaching, research or working with our stakeholders and our communities.

One of the key roles of our Faculty is to prepare the next generation of education leaders through delivering our highly respected initial teacher programs as well as working with already gualified educators undertaking postgraduate coursework and research programs. We strive to explore, critique and address the various issues and challenges that are a part of the everyday lives of teachers, leaders. students and carers in educational institutions and communities. Like many educators, I regard the role of educator as affording us a unique privilege that provides opportunities to touch the lives of young people and play our part in enabling each young person to reach their full potential. In doing so, we prepare them for their future as educators and community leaders.

None of us would dispute the primary importance that education plays in the life of individuals and societies. Education is foundational to the social, economic and cultural well-being of any society. From earliest times, education has been about a quest for knowledge that can benefit society by focusing on the common good and making a positive difference. As leaders in their classrooms and contemporary education settings, they will provide an excellent education for, and act as role models to, the future leaders of our society.

Fundamental to our understanding is the significance of quality teaching in our students' learning pathways. Our programs are underpinned by our belief in the role of teachers as leaders who provide this leadership through a wide range of roles that contribute to positive student outcomes and the success of educational institutions and their communities, including:

 being excellent instructional and curriculum specialists;

- facilitating powerful learning opportunities with and for colleagues;
- leading and engaging in data-informed practice; and
- actively contributing to continuous improvement in their settings by acting as agents of change within their communities.

Finally, and most importantly, ACU's Education programs stress the importance of educators being lifelong learners who constantly ask questions of themselves and of their practice to inform and improve their capacity to positively impact on students' learning.

ACU is well-placed to work with educators aspiring to or holding leadership positions in Catholic educational contexts through the LaSalle Academy. This Academy, an exciting new ACU initiative, will have responsibility for the development, delivery and quality assurance of teaching and research programs. The primary focus is on the development and formation of teachers and leaders of religions education in Catholic Schools at undergraduate, postgraduate and doctoral levels. The Academy will work closely with our Faculty of Theology and Philosophy and the Directorate of Identity and Mission to provide an integrated approach to curriculum development, course delivery, continuous assessment and formation, and be responsible for the delivery of faith engagement activities to our students and teachers in religious education.

Our Future Leaders - Secondary Colleges

We need future leaders that can transform society. And a model of leadership where service to others is more important than self-promotion is the sort of leadership that can be transformative. Graduates of contemporary Catholic secondary colleges have experienced cultures that aim to promote the growth of the whole person, where personal gifts are cultivated for the wellbeing of the individual and the good of the community.

Catholic secondary colleges promote the growth of the whole person via a philosophy that draws on the spirit of their founders. They encourage students to lead within their school community, their parish community and as advocates in the wider society.

Many Catholic secondary colleges draw strongly on the spirit of religious orders to cultivate a sense of Christian service and community among students and staff. These religious orders were animated to serve in Catholic schools by the pioneering example of the order's founder. Apart from our own Mary Mackillop, many religious orders established overseas came to Australia to set up schools and teach. The faith and generosity of the multitudes of religious nuns and brothers who established and staffed these schools is a treasured legacy in Catholic education in Australia.

The founder's story and vision within these religious orders is now meaningfully translated and brought to life in these schools, acting as a compass point for Christian living and service. While the members of these orders today may not be physically present in the school in large numbers, the founding spirit of the order is very much alive, animating students and staff to serve both within the daily life of the school and the community.

Students gain important insights about the importance of serving by leading through this connection with the religious orders and their founding vision. In a real sense this legacy is shaping future leaders.

Some Catholic secondary colleges draw their founding vision from saints and significant leaders in the Catholic Church internationally or in Australia. The faith, life stories and context of these key figures in the Catholic Church provide important models for Christian living and leadership in contemporary times.

A pastoral priority in the Catholic life of the secondary college is to cultivate a supportive learning environment where each student has an opportunity to develop intellectual and socioemotional competencies that assist them to be selfregulated, confident learners. Key human resources and structures ensure students receive appropriate levels of pastoral and educational support.

Year-based groupings and initiatives, as well as multi-age experiences, provide opportunity for friendships between students of the same age and to build their identity with students of different ages. Peer support initiatives, for example, facilitate mentoring relationships between younger and older students and equip student mentors with problem solving and conflict resolution skills that assist younger students to develop positive relationships. These experiences cultivate opportunities for leadership cultures and mentoring through the ups and downs of community life.

Hearing the concerns of students in community life is an important aspect of authentic community. Students are given a voice through representative and pastoral structures in Catholic secondary colleges. This models an important characteristic of leadership and of future leaders - to be attentive to the needs of individuals and respects their views.

Catholic secondary school students are frequently presented to the wider community as advocates on social justice issues, or engaged in community service. Community service is easily framed within the vision of the founding order in a Catholic secondary college and as a way of expressing Christian love.

Importantly for each student, engaging in community service, which may be out of his or her 'comfort zone', may encourage major perspective shifts with new insights into the experiences of others and the growth of empathy and tolerance.

These experiences can have lifelong and lifechanging implications. For some students it will mean further commitment to voluntary service within the community, leading to future roles of influence and leadership.

'Beyond the school gate' engagement can provide older secondary students with experiences that build confidence and skills in public advocacy. A number of Catholic secondary colleges in the metropolitan area, for example, are supporting their senior students' involvement with the Sydney Alliance, a grass roots non-denominational advocacy group. It raises matters of grass roots concern in areas such as health and transport services, on behalf of those who use these services. Students engaged in the Sydney Alliance benefit from professional guidance and workshops on effective and responsible public advocacy strategies.

Students appointed to formal leadership roles in Catholic secondary colleges will also have many opportunities for public speaking, contact with leaders from other schools, representative duties at parent and whole school functions, and contact with civic representatives and politicians. Beyond these formal roles, leadership is invariably promoted as a characteristic expected of all senior students.

A final insight into the role of the Catholic secondary college in contributing to future leaders involves personal formation and opportunities for inner leadership. How students and teachers experience Catholic secondary colleges can be spiritually formative – both in the daily experience of community and often inspired by the founding vision of the school. These experiences present opportunities for encounters with Jesus and the lived values of the Gospel.

The emphasis on the growth of the whole person at the core of Catholic secondary colleges provides an environment where leadership as service with a clear moral compass is nurtured. This kind of leadership will continue to contribute to society.



Dr Tony Bracken is the Assistant Director of School Improvement at the Catholic Schools Office for Broken Bay Diocese, NSW. In this role, he oversees a current focus on learning and school improvement across all schools in the system. He is also responsible for strategic oversight of, and support for, school cultures that represent the voices of students and encourage student leadership.

Tony's prior professional experience includes a senior role at the Catholic Education Office in Parramatta where he worked on professional learning, learning services, formation and leadership development. Prior to that, he was a secondary principal for six years.

His doctoral research focused on the principal's leadership role in the spiritual formation of teachers. Tony maintains professional connections with the university sector, advising three education faculties in Sydney and he is also the Deputy Chair of the National Policy Committee of the Australian College of Educators. Tony has presented at national and international conferences on school improvement, leadership development and teacher formation.





Located at Westmead, in close proximity to the central business district of Parramatta, the school began operation in 1966 on the present site as a regional Catholic secondary school for girls in Years 7 to 10. Years 11 and 12 were introduced in the mid-1980s.

Founded by the Mercy Sisters, Catherine McAuley Westmead has a strong Mercy charism. Inspired by our founder. Mother Catherine McAuley, we aspire to a Godcentred way of life, which respects and affirms the dignity of each person. We commit to excellence in girls' education and empower young women to be actively involved in social justice. We value our diversity and inclusiveness. and the creation of a warm and inclusive community where all feel safe and valued is a key focus of life at Catherine McAuley.

Pastoral Care complements our academic program and is central to the organisation and operation of the school. It is based on the core Mercy values of mercy, justice, excellence, integrity, courage and hospitality, and recognises the need to address the spiritual and emotional wellbeing of the young women in our care. Pastoral care programs at each year level are designed to help build resilience, independence and courage within each girl.

The school offers a broad curriculum, with flexible choices that cater for the wide range of student abilities. Programs have been implemented in Year 7 that develop metacognition skills and enable students to analyse their own learning styles to assist them in their development as autonomous, life-long learners. At Catherine McAuley we believe it is not just what students learn at school that is important but also how they learn.

Catherine McAuley offers a full range of Board of Studies Approved and Endorsed courses and is committed to innovative learning and teaching methods. The recent introduction of our 'Bring Your Own Device' scheme recognises that changes in technology mean that students benefit from having access to their own personal IT devices. As citizens of the 21st century. students need to be curious, resourceful and motivated problem solvers who can be creative and adaptable thinkers. Access to personal technology devices enables learning to be more flexible and personalized, supporting good teaching.

The excellent co-curricular program enables students to experience involvement and success in a wide variety of areas. Students are encouraged to participate in these activities and their involvement and achievement is celebrated.

At Catherine McAuley we encourage our young women to be leaders and provide opportunities for them to develop their confidence and skills through a range of activities, including debating and public speaking, performing arts evenings, sporting competitions, liturgies, hospitality and social justice activities. Our Curriculum

The College offers a contemporary curriculum suited to the diverse needs of 21st century learners. Students complete secondary school studies by qualifying for a HSC or ROSA credential. Many students who opt to study a VET course also leave the College with a Certificate II or Certificate III accreditation.

All BOSTES mandatory curriculum requirements are met by students studying a range of courses and include study in a course in Religious Education.

Students studying for a HSC credential choose a pattern of study from the 40 courses offered at the College. A variety of VET and TVET courses are studied by the students. Students also study a variety of languages at the Saturday School of Community Languages and at the Open High School. Students can also access the resources of Sydney Distance Education HS to study other courses like Design and Technology offline.

Curriculum delivery is supported by a variety of online and electronic tools. 

The college has a strong focus on literacy and numeracy skills through the curriculum. The college goals aim to improve the skills of students in order for each to become independent learners with highly developed critical and creative thinking skills.

In the senior years, students have a range of options available as they make important choices for future careers and tertiary study. Students have the choice of a traditional study of senior subjects to complete the HSC as well as achieving an Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR) or they may elect to study a specific trade through the college's Trade Training Centre which allows students to begin an apprenticeship whilst also completing the HSC. Extra-curricular activities add to the learning experiences provided by the subjects studied in the college. Choices range from academic pursuits involving national and international competitions, debating, university-aligned courses, humanitarian pursuits incorporating charity fund raising and sporting endeavours which includes sports from within the college, diocesan, state and national level.

At McCarthy Catholic College we provide a number of ways for students to take on leadership and care for the community. We encourage all girls to develop their leadership skills and provide students with many opportunities to take on leadership roles in the College.


Our student leadership structure is such that from Year 7, students can be voted in as Year representatives in portfolios such as liturgy, social justice, environment and creative arts.

About Us

Mount St Benedict College was founded by the Sisters of the Good Samaritan in the Order of St Benedict in 1966. The College is one of ten owned by the Sisters in Australia.

The College is an independent Catholic girls' school located in the Catholic Diocese of Broken Bay and run under the auspices of Good Samaritan Education through its Board of Directors and the College Principal. The core values of the College are Pax, Hospitality and Stewardship, and the promotion of holistic education. The College offers a rigorous academic program, a comprehensive curriculum and an enriching co-curricular program in the spirit of Benedictine and Good Samaritan tradition.

There is an extensive choice of subjects on offer at the College, as well as a Pastoral Care structure that nurtures students within small Homeroom groups and Houses. In this supportive environment students are able to grow and flourish, developing their particular gifts and challenge themselves to venture into new and exciting areas of enquiry. Mount St Benedict College has committed to Positive Education as a whole-school approach across all areas of curriculum, pastoral and mission. This initiative nurtures well-being in both students and staff, a positive learning environment where students flourish both academically and emotionally.

Our Curriculum

The curriculum at Mount St Benedict College caters for a diverse range of student needs, allowing more able students to engage in a fulfilling and rewarding course of study, while also offering support to students with special learning needs. Teaching staff have undertaken professional learning in the Harvard Teaching for Understanding Learning Framework and are using this framework to prepare students to be women of competence, confidence and compassion equipped with the necessary skills to ensure life-long learning, independent learning, critical thinking, a keen sense of justice and compassion for others.

In 2014, the MYBennies Innovation Project was launched, the result of two years of research at the College, into how to better engage students in the middle years of schooling, Years 7 to 9. Central to these changes is our belief that girls learn at their best when they have strong connections, when they feel valued, respected and known, and when their learning is relevant and interesting. In 2015, for the first time, a Year 7 Integrated program will aid the transition of students into the College. A team of teachers will work with students to acquire the 21st century skills of creativity and problem solving, communication, critical thinking, information and media literacy, global citizenship, collaboration and teamwork, and independence in their learning.

Student Leadership

Leadership at MSB is informed by the notion of servant leader - participative leadership focused on the needs of others. There are many opportunities for our students to develop an understanding of the strengths they possess and opportunities to develop the skills they will utilise in their future.

Across the year groups students may be voted into the Student Representative Council. In Years 10 and 11 students are trained as Peer Support leaders and have the opportunity to be House Vice-Captain. Year 11 students partake in a leadership formation program that results in the voting of College Captain, Vice-Captain Spirit and Vice-Captain Portfolio. House Captains and Portfolio Captains are also elected and House Ambassadors are appointed. About Us

Nagle College first began on the present site in 1965 as a Years 7-10 school. It was founded by the Presentation Sisters and is named after the founder of the order, Nano Nagle. In 2015, Nagle College will celebrate 50 years of providing Catholic education for the girls of Blacktown.

The College motto, 'In Deed Not Word', encapsulates the particular aim of the school, which is to help our students become women who want to improve the world and who are prepared to work actively to achieve this goal. All members of the College community are encouraged to have high expectations, achieve their academic best, be respectful of all members of their community and to ensure that their actions benefit others. The school provides girls with the opportunity to pursue tertiary study and enter the world of work with confidence and skills.

Nagle College is also based on the Gospel values of Hope, Faith and Forgiveness as well as the College values of Faith, Learning, Welcome, Courage and Action. The Religious life of the College is fostered through liturgies, daily prayer, school Masses, the celebration of Church feasts and a comprehensive Religious Education programme taught from Years 7-12.

Our Curriculum

The Duke of Edinburgh programme is well established at Nagle College. This programme that is held in high esteem worldwide, consists of four areas: Volunteering, Skills, Outdoor Recreation and Expeditions. The programme has attracted a significant number of girls over the years. In 2014, we had 20 students undertaking Bronze level, 15 students undertaking Silver level and 10 students undertaking Gold. As part of the community service aspect of the programme, the girls have developed a Science learning space and garden.

The girls undertake a variety of expeditions that cover different terrain and conditions; they are supervised by an experienced team of teachers who are supported by the latest in satellite technology. Each year, students provide service to the school and to the wider community.

The value of the award is in its development of the whole person through a non-competitive programme. Students who take part in the programme provide service to the community, test their endurance and leadership skills and broaden their interests through acquiring new skills. The sense of achievement and the increase in personal confidence affect a student's overall approach to learning at school.

Student Leadership

Nagle College is committed to student voice and choice. The belief that each girl should contribute to her learning actively underpins the pastoral programme at the college. Chaired by the College Captain and Vice Captain, the Student Representative Council has elected representatives from each Year group.

Regular meetings at which school issues are raised, responded to, and commented on, contribute to the school's decisionmaking process. The SRC organises significant fundraising events like Project Compassion, contributes to the shaping of significant College events, and supports school liturgies. The SRC members will consult widely with their relevant year groups and use surveys and forums to gather data that can be presented to the College Leadership team. The House system offers girls further opportunities for leadership. With five Houses led by senior students, the school spirit is strengthened.

Homerooms are organised into Houses, allowing for cohesion in the Houses and the consolidation of strong relationships across the year groups. The Big Sister/ Little Sister programme provides each Year Seven student with a Year 12 mentor. Year 7 students can speak with their Big Sisters about any questions or issues that they wish to explore further.

Other volunteer programs include the instruction of children with special needs. St Vincent de Paul activities and visiting retirement homes in the local community. Our graduates are encouraged to participate in the Share the Mission volunteer program and other opportunities to "make a difference" in Lasallian missions. At Oakhill our aim is to challenge, inspire and guide our students to become leaders and make a meaningful and ongoing contribution to our society. This is not new! It has been an essential element in the delivery of Lasallian education for centuries.



Established in 1894, Santa Sabina College, a Catholic school in the Dominican tradition, educates students to achieve personal excellence, act with justice and compassion, and embrace the future with an optimistic global vision.

The College delivers a comprehensive curriculum that caters for diverse strengths and goals. Varied co-curricular activities allow students to pursue their individual interests and include over 20 sports, music and drama ensembles, public speaking and debating, and the Duke of Edinburgh Scheme.

We know that our learners need effective feedback and self-reflection to understand themselves as learners which fosters their critical and creative thinking skills.

At Santa Sabina College we use this knowledge and understanding of our students and learning, to promote scholarly endeavours in a diverse and rich curriculum, which support the individual learning needs of all.

Pillars Leadership Program Student leadership has a very strong tradition at Santa Sabina College. Leadership development is an integral part of a Dominican education. Our Mission statement identifies that "each student is encouraged to aim for personal excellence and to develop skills of independent learning and critical thinking... promoting self-esteem, self-discipline, responsibility and leadership".



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



leader of a mixed male and female religious community, the great monastery of Kildare, which was renowned for its faith and learning. Therefore, she is a great model for a Catholic co-educational College.

Together with a committed group of parents and staff, the College will cater for Years 7 and 8 in 2015.

Our Curriculum

At St Brigid's we have a passion for student-centred teaching and learning, where we know the strengths of each student and encourage them to be creative and innovative thinkers, achieving their personal best.

It is hoped that our students are impassioned so that their hearts and minds are set afire with the love of life and learning through the experiences that are offered to them at our College. Our goal is to develop students who are life-long learners with twenty-first century learning skills which include critical and creative thinking, problem solving, working both collaboratively and independently. To enhance this learning we have a 1:1 laptop program for all students.

Students complete a range of mandatory courses set by the NSW BOSTES and additionally enjoy the study of Religious Education following the Diocesan Religious Education syllabus.

Growing Leaders

Students are encouraged to use the gifts that they have been given to bring about a better world. Leadership is very much about service to others, and students are supported and challenged to live out their call to discipleship with compassion and love.

Students have the opportunity to be members of the SRC, house leaders and assistant house leaders. They are proud of their role in building the culture of this community. These programs provide opportunities for early enrolment, credit toward degrees and the possibility of scholarships at the University of Western Sydney. St John Paul II Catholic College also offers opportunities for students to enrol in the Step Up Into Teaching program from the Australian Catholic University.

Facilities at our campus are state-of-the-art and include a performance centre, gymnasium, wellresourced library, sporting facilities and classrooms that are equipped with the latest technology. About Us

The St Joseph's Catholic College community empowers young women who are shaped by their relationship with Jesus Christ within the Catholic tradition and inspired by St Mary of the Cross MacKillop to make a difference in the world. Our students: develop relationships founded on discipleship and the Gospel; strive for personal excellence and purpose; develop their unique gifts and talents; value learning and reflection that provide a foundation for individual growth and wellbeing; act with courage, strength and gentleness in the service of others and in the stewardship of our earth; value education as the foundation for achieving change in the world; lead with compassion, serve with respect, pray with hope and act justly.

The College seeks to provide a safe and caring environment for all its members. It is in this supportive environment that each student is called to live out the College values of Compassion, Hope, Justice and Respect. This pastoral care approach is a key part of the College's planning for students' wellbeing, effective learning and to develop contemporary MacKillop women empowered to lead in the wider community. Students in each year begin the day in their House-based pastoral group under the leadership of their pastoral teacher who manages attendance, daily organisational issues and facilitates the formal pastoral program.

Our Curriculum

At the core of all learning and teaching at the College is our vision to enable girls to achieve the highest standards possible and empower young women to make a difference in their changing world. An engaging and diverse curriculum emphasises the importance of the whole person and is designed so that each student enjoys a well-balanced education with opportunities to develop her unique talents and interests. All key learning areas are included in the academic curriculum. Students and teachers are active participants in their learning where teaching and learning experiences are significant, flexible and dynamic.

Learning and teaching addresses issues particular to girls and their learning within the Ouality Teaching framework. In this way, learning and teaching focuses on equipping students with key twenty-first century learning skills that include critical and creative thinking, problem solving, working collaboratively and working independently. To assist this learning, staff and students use and apply contemporary technology such as tablet devices and digital textbooks. Students at St Joseph's are indeed educated to be lifelong learners. The co-curricular program complements the academic curriculum and includes a variety of sports, debating, musical theatre. drama and dance and several social justice initiatives through which students involve themselves in their community.

Student Leaders

Students acquire and practise the skills and behaviours of leaders as they learn to lead in stage-appropriate leadership positions.

Year 7 students manage the staff room recycling program; Year 8 serve afternoon tea to the elderly every month; Year 9 volunteer in the canteen, library and managing the top office at lunch; and Year 10 serve as Peer Mentors to students in Year 7, coordinate volunteer donors for the Red Cross Blood Bank and volunteer to prepare and serve lunch to the disadvantaged.

Year 10 also study the principles of Youth Ministry with the Catholic Schools Youth Ministry Australia and help facilitate catechist classes for primary students. Students in Year 11 lead as Peer Mediators and Peer Tutors. Students in Year 12 lead the College and the six houses to organise carnivals and social justice and fund-raising initiatives throughout the year. Students also participate in a range of social justice and ministry initiatives, for example, preparing breakfast for the homeless, 'manning' the Vinnie's Night Patrol van in Sydney and travelling to Mumbai in India and the Warmun indigenous community in the East Kimberley for immersion experiences.





Our Curriculum

The College curriculum is supported by our dedicated staff who are strongly focused on providing personalised learning experiences. Developed through a deep knowledge of their students and their speciality subject areas, they engage learners from Kindergarten through to the Higher School Certificate. The entire continuum of learners is catered for from the high achievers to those with additional needs.

A broad range of almost 50 subjects. including VET course and TAFE options, are available in senior years, along with courses in child-care, nursing and transition to work programs. About Us

Established in 1903, this day school for boys caters for students from Years 5 to 12, and is a member of Edmund Rice Education Australia, consisting of 40 leading Catholic schools around Australia.

Because learning is a lifelong process, Waverley College aims to develop its students as critical thinkers who are ready to engage with their world: a learner at Waverley College is a problem solver, a communicator, a collaborator, an innovator, globally aware, media literate and information literate. Every student participates in our Critical Thinking course for two years from Year 7. The course enhances problem-solving and higher-order thinking skills right from the early high school years, with HSC expectations firmly in view. Over forty courses are offered at HSC level: all of the usual core academic subjects, plus a great range of additional electives such as Engineering Studies, Software Design & Development, Information Processes and Technology and Food Technology.

The creative arts play a central role in a school life rich with opportunities for self-expression. On alternating years the College stages a major musical production and drama production, each produced to a professional standard. A range of instrumental and voice ensembles are available and one-to-one tuition for instrument, voice, theory and composition can be incorporated into a student's weekly timetable.

Leadership

The College offers broad opportunities for its students to develop leadership skills across sport, social justice, houses, debating, music and much more. In 'Applied Philosophy', an academic extension elective for Years 9 and 10 endorsed by the Board of Studies as a model for other schools to follow. 'Visions of Leadership' lectures invite real-world leaders to inspire and challenge students. Speakers have included Her Excellency Prof Marie Bashir AC, Governor of NSW: The Hon Malcolm Turnbull MP: neurosurgeon. Dr Charles Teo AM: peace activist, Dr Stella Cornelius AO OBE; journalists Kerry O'Brien and David Marr; television producer, Andrew Denton; and Advertising Executive, Todd Sampson. Students report a lasting impact from exposure to these influential role models.

The Waverley College Cadet Unit has provided outdoor education, character development and leadership experience to our students for over 100 years. The Unit was the training ground for Australian legend, former Chief of the Defence Force, Australian of the Year and now Governor General, His Excellency The Hon General Sir Peter Cosgrove AK MC. Participation in cadets commences with a compulsory year in Year 8 and a structured leadership development program is implemented for students as they progress through the ranks to become leaders of the Unit in their final year.

The Centre, which was established by the Society of Mary on Taveuni in 1969, is one of Caritas Australia's longest running partnerships and runs courses for people from the remote northern islands of Fiji to help build strong relationships, maintain healthy families and become successful farmers.

the country, youth unemployment is high, nutritious food is in short supply, and life expectancy is much lower than in Australia.

Eric and Ma credit the Married Couples Course at the Tutu Rural Training Centre, which is supported by Caritas Australia, for changing the direction of their lives and helping them to raise a healthy, happy family and grow food for life. Over the last 25 years, Eric and Ma have worked hard to establish their farm. Now a sustainable source of food and income, it has helped them to raise and educate their six children, who are now raising families of their own.

Before Tutu, Eric worked hard on the farm, but his labour was unprofitable. After training at Tutu, most of the family's daily food is now



grown in their own fields, and it's helping them to avoid the serious health problems many Fijians experience due to a lack of fresh fruit and vegetables in their diets.

"I think we were blessed to be part of the program in Tutu. Tutu opened a new door for us. Without Tutu we wouldn't be here where we are now," says Eric. "And it's only possible thanks to the wonderful people of Australia."
