Learning to Care for our Common Home

We are living through times of rapid change.

Today we are experiencing increasing uncertainty and facing not just one but many crises – ecological, social, economic and in the Australian Church.

We all know that humanity is living in a way that is unsustainable on the planet. Just looking around at the plastics, the chemicals, the pollution of our waterways and atmosphere, our daily consumption of fossil fuels and the many human systems that we have created that serve ourselves rather than benefiting the common good.

So what are we going to do about it?

On June 18th 2015, Pope Francis issued his encyclical, Laudato Si' - On Care for our Common Home. His leadership message is clear: we need to stop and reflect, to see the deep interconnections between everything and work together through dialogue and action. We are being invited to respond with the common good in mind, love in our hearts and a commitment to act in a way that respects all that surrounds us.

What does this message mean for us today?

Its release was an historic event, as Pope Francis issued a powerful message about our moral responsibility to care for creation. On Care for Our Common Home (Laudato Si') is a very strong appeal from Pope Francis addressed to "every living person on this planet" for an inclusive dialogue about how we are shaping the future of our planet.

Pope Francis calls the Church and the world to acknowledge the urgency of the challenges we face and to join him in embarking on a new path where we develop an integral ecology – inclusive of the social, economic, cultural, spiritual and ecological.

This encyclical means that caring for creation is forever part of Catholic Social Teaching and permanently core business for Catholic organisations and their people.

So what is this new path we are being called to take together?

Dialogue is the resounding first step. We are being invited to open our minds, our hearts and our will to tune in and discover with curiosity firstly, and then more intimately, to the details of where we live. For our children this may be easy, so we can take our lead from them. Awe and wonder open us up to feelings and experiences that Pope Francis says we need to have in order to work out what to do about the problems we face. "To dare to turn what is happening in our world into our own personal suffering, so that each of us can determine what to do about it."

Pope Francis reminds us that our common home is a gift – and that our first response to that gift needs to be thank you! Beyond that we are being invited to enter into relationship with everything around us.

So how are we going to transition to a life giving path for all Creation (including ourselves, of course!)?

Well, the first thing we need to do is to see that we are not separate from everything around us. Paying

attention to the connections between everything is the key. Our journey on Earth is an exploration of place as much as it is an inner journey of our hearts and minds. So, cultivating our inner life and our outer life through meaningful action is the balancing act we need to strive for, understanding that we have a part to play through our simple daily actions.

Beyond the day to day activities of individuals what can our organisations and schools do to really make this change?

We all need help to make the change and our organisations need more than a champion model to embed sustainability. Jesus is the best model for us to look to when seeking help for this change.

Recognising how our Christian spirituality is connected with sustainability through exploring Laudato Si' is an invitation for all Catholic organisations. The new theology contained in Laudato Si' includes the intrinsic value of every living and non living thing, understanding that every part of Creation is revealing God to us in every moment and coming to realise that we are called to be in a state of 'sublime communion' – when we are in right relationship with our maker, the human family and all creation.

Everyone is looking to the next generation with hope and Catholic schools are in the best possible position to offer ecological education and spiritual formation.

Understanding our deepest motivations and how the spirituality

of each place is longing to be shared is central to the story. Schools are working hard to embed sustainable practice.

There are plenty of examples of initiatives, such as gardens, recycling, units of work that integrate ecological thinking and student outcomes, prayers and liturgies. Integrating the ecological and spiritual is the critical work ahead, and every member of each school community has a unique contribution to make.

Catholic Earthcare Australia has developed a model and a suite of resources that takes organisations, such as schools, on a sustainable journey – and its called ASSISI. It's all about developing 'Learning Communities for Sustainability'.

Growing the capacity for communities of practice to learn how to become sustainable together is where dialogue, formation and steering groups come in to play, developing the social skills to enquire together and think through the best way forward in each unique bioregion of Australia. The name ASSISI comes from the principles we used in designing a model that is sustainable in itself – A Strategic, Systems-based, Integrated, Sustainability Initiative.

The call for a change of mind and heart, reflected in action is the work of Catholic Earthcare Australia. And it's not just personal ecological conversion we're here for, it's the institutional change required that now deserves our collective and urgent attention.



Jacqui Rémond is National Director of Catholic Earthcare Australia, the ecological agency of the Catholic Church in Australia. Jacqui has spent many years developing partnerships and ecological conversion programs to enable the Catholic Church in Australia to better care for God's Creation through advocacy, education, research and collaboration. Two key initiatives are the National Energy Efficiency Network (NEEN) and A Strategic Systems-based Integrated Sustainability Initiative (ASSISI).

Jacqui is currently the Convener of the National Council of Churches Australia Eco Mission Project, the NSW Eco Mission Network, one of the founding members and on the steering committee of the Global Catholic Climate Movement, and a member of the Australian Education Sustainability Alliance and the Justice and Peace Advisory Council in Sydney.

With a long history in environmental advocacy, Jacqui has previously worked as the Coordinator of the Northern Australia Environment Alliance and served as Chair of Environs Kimberley. In 2006, Jacqui undertook training with Al Gore to become a 'Climate Change Leader'. This led to her involvement in 'The Big Switch' campaign and her organising the first 'Walk Against Warming' in the Kimberley. Today, Jacqui is a mentor to a group of retired academics in Al Gore's Climate Reality Project.



Australian Catholic University Embraces Laudato Si'

A ustralian Catholic University (ACU) is proud to recognise its longstanding responsibility to embrace the natural environment,

and practicing sustainability is directly related to the Catholic Mission of our university.

Pope Francis observes in his encyclical, *Laudato Si' – Caring for our Common Home*, "how inseparable the bond is between concern for nature, justice for the poor, commitment to society and interior peace".

ACU has worked steadily to transform the way it operates in order to lighten its environmental impact through gains in energy efficiency, water conservation, and waste recycling.

There have been some significant achievements: in 2014 and 2015, ACU was Australia's most energy-efficient university and one of its most efficient water users.

It has a recycling rate of above 40 per cent, up from barely 15 per cent four years ago.

The major source of the University's environmental impacts is its many buildings, and ACU has invested strategically and ethically in sustainable renovations,

refurbishment and new-building construction.

Its Melbourne Campus is home to the Daniel Mannix Building, which obtained six stars under the Green Star rating system, indicating world-leading sustainable design and construction.

ACU's operational sustainability program has positioned the University well to meet the increasingly urgent demands made of organisations in all sectors for stronger sustainability leadership, and to grasp the many emerging opportunities to display it.

Those demands have emerged from many sources, including the moral imperative stated in Laudato Si', from the expectations of our students, alumni and staff, from the wider Catholic community, and from sound financial drivers for efficiency and resilience.

The opportunities are many: they include smart energy and building technologies; clever use of videoconference technologies to remotely connect our people across our dispersed campuses; paperless administration and assignments; better building management; and enabling and empowering our community of students and staff to take more action daily to help ACU reach its sustainability targets.

ACU is now planning in detail how it can expand its sustainability program to meet these new challenges. For our students and staff, the day to day experience of sustainability is subtle, because so much of our sustainability work has been prosaic and out-of-sight: it's in the built form of our campuses, in the operation of our heating and cooling systems, in the digitisation of our buildings, and in our lights, taps, toilets, showers and water tanks (all 550,000 litres of them).

Over the next several years, those initiatives will continue apace, but inspired by Laudato Si' and its commitment to the common good, ACU will elevate its practice of mission-based sustainability so that it becomes a normal, positive part of the daily experience of campus life, and will contribute to ACU's strong record in preparing its graduates to create a better world.



Making The University Experience More Than Just a Certificate

they continue their studies and work towards a career.

Australian Catholic University (ACU) has invested significant time, thinking and funds into the improvement of the overall student experience. A whole range of strategic projects, including the Learning for Life framework, have been specifically targeted at responding to the demands of our students for a

better learning experience at ACU. Our student engagement programs provide a co-curricular experience building social contacts, skills and employability. For the University it was validation of the significant commitment to this program to achieve such outstanding results in the Quality Indicators in Learning and Teaching 2015 Student Engagement Survey (SES).

We saw the Overall Experience Satisfaction of ACU students increase to 83.4% – well above the industry average of 80%. Within the survey we saw how the University's focus on quality teaching in a modern learning environment had resonated with our students, with satisfaction rates reaching:

 86% for Skills Development compared to the national average of 81%

- 67% for Learner Engagement compared to the national average of 60%
- 84% for Teaching Quality compared to the national average of 82%
- 75% for Student Support compared to the national average of 72%
- 88% for Learning Resources compared to the national average of 86%

The faculties, through Learning for Life, provide input into the key learning and teaching areas of curriculum design, the increased use of technology to enhance learning, and the provision of significantly improved physical learning and teaching spaces. The aim is always to ensure that our students receive the most engaged and engaging learning and teaching experience, irrespective of the mode of delivery and that our graduates

are job-ready to further develop in their professional lives. Programs such as Learning for Life are driven by, and centred on, students. As a university, we pride ourselves on building strong relationships with our students, extending to their aspirations for a university that provides them with the best opportunity to cause change in the world. We look to develop and empower our students' entrepreneurial skills, with many putting these skills into practice to create their own NGOs and community organisations, becoming job creators with a focus on the community around them.

This is what excites us and motivates the University to continue to focus on delivering our teaching for the modern university student in ways that engage and grow their appetite to learn. To do this, we need teachers with a passion to innovate. This was solidified at the Australian Awards for University Teaching (AAUT) Citations for Outstanding Contributions to Student Learning, with Faculty of Education and Arts academics Dr Catherine Bell and Dr Cathie Harrison, along with Mr Anthony Whitty from the Faculty of Health Sciences, recognised for their creativity and innovation in learning and teaching.

For ACU these results are recognition of what we have been able to achieve in a short time, but like our students, we are not settling for the status quo.

The University will continue to listen to our students to make sure our courses and programs engage and enable their aspirations.



What Makes Us Special

Respect and concern for the individual student and her needs are central to life at Bethlehem. Our Pastoral Care program seeks to nurture the development of each student – spiritually, emotionally, intellectually, physically and socially.

In 2015, the College moved to a different model of pastoral and academic care known as Homeroom Circles. In keeping with the charism of the Sisters of Charity, the school has always extended outstanding pastoral care to our students and their families, but the new structure has been developed in response to contemporary research from Edith Cowan University into 'Next practice' for pastoral care and student wellbeing in schools and the changing needs of young women today.

The Homeroom Circles nurture the ongoing development of the whole person by collaboratively supporting academic, emotional, physical, social and spiritual wellbeing. The "Take 5" approach places students in smaller groups rather than more traditional homeroom/roll groups, providing a more intimate community of learners where staff and students alike develop and nurture relationships centered around holistic wellbeing.

Environment and Sustainability

Bethlehem College has been pursuing environmental sustainability for a number of years. At the centre is the very committed student environmental group CARE (Committee for the Awareness and Restoration of the Environment) which spearheads environment and sustainability initiatives at Bethlehem, and over recent years, there has been a staff Environmental Stewardship Committee. Student and teacher volunteers have participated in Clean Up Australia Day for years. At the College, students take part in Schools Clean Up Day. Each year, senior students are excited to attend the Earth Hour Breakfast at St Ignatius College, Riverview. Back at school, Earth Hour is acknowledged with an electricity-free lesson for all students.

At Bethlehem College, the issues of the environment and sustainability are embedded into various curriculum areas including Religious Education, Science and Human Society and Its environment. For some years, Bethlehem has had involvement with the 1 Million Women group and some students have joined the group with a commitment to reduce their carbon footprints.

CARE students have attended 1MW events and have heard inspiring guest speakers. CARE group's recent initiatives have included installing taps for filling water bottles to encourage the reuse of bottles and the provision of bins for recycling paper for each teaching space. In response to Pope Francis' Laudato Si, we hope to enhance our mindsets and develop our commitment to social and environmental justice.

Environment and Sustainability

A Brigidine College education provides the environment to develop intellectual capacity and enable students to think deeply and critically. In preparing girls for the world beyond Brigidine, we inspire them to be aware of their social responsibilities. Our sustainability programs are implemented within and beyond the curriculum. These include Retreats, Duke of Edinburgh Awards and Immersion Programs. Embedded in the geography curriculum, our staff teach students about the concept of sustainability considering the capacity of the environment to support people's lives and the lives of other living creatures. The College Master Plan has been designed with environmentally sensitive design principles, including spaces where we aim to foster "collaboration, creativity and active learning".

Energy efficiency is incorporated into design and construction including building orientation and fittings. Our 'future' classroom designs incorporate natural light, colour and the use of space addressing the notions of "flexibility, collaboration and delivery". Energy-efficient lighting is a priority, incorporating the use of LED lighting. Other initiatives include the installation of 5 x 45,000-litre water tanks, water sensor taps in bathrooms and a detention stormwater system. A campus recycling program and Bonza bins for general waste demonstrate our commitment to environmental concerns. Natural ventilation is a priority with the inclusion of louvered windows to create cross-flow ventilation. Our buildings predominately run north/south with minimal exposure to the west. As of 2017, Brigidine will be plastic free. The campus is well-landscaped with green areas for student recreation. creating a peaceful and clean environment. A perfect backdrop for student health and wellbeing.

What Makes Us Special

Catherine McAuley Westmead is a Catholic systemic school offering a comprehensive education for girls from Years 7 to 12. Located at Westmead, in close proximity to the central business district of Parramatta, the school began operation in 1966 as a regional Catholic secondary school for girls in Years 7 to 10 on the present site. Years 11 and 12 were introduced in the mid-1980s.

Founded by the Mercy Sisters, Catherine McAuley Westmead has a strong Mercy charism. Inspired by our founder, Mother Catherine McAuley, we aspire to a God-centred way of life, which respects and affirms the dignity of each person. We commit to excellence in girls' education and empower young women to be actively involved in social justice. We value our diversity and inclusiveness, and the creation of a warm and inclusive community where all feel safe and valued which is a key focus of life at Catherine McAuley.

Pastoral Care complements our academic program and is central to the organisation and operation of the school. It is based on the core Mercy values of mercy, justice, excellence, integrity, courage and hospitality, and recognises the need to address the spiritual and emotional wellbeing of the young women in our care. Pastoral care programs at each year level are designed to help build resilience, independence and courage within each girl.

Environment and Sustainability

Catherine McAuley Westmead recognises the importance of educating students about environmental issues and the need for young people to be environmentallyaware. Consequently the school offers programs and extra-curricular activities to help improve students' understanding of the environment and sustainability.

The school has a Student Environment Group consisting of a team of students and a number of staff who have rejuvenated and cared for the wetlands area located at the boundary of the school. The school has received awards in recognition of its contribution to the wetlands area.

The Student Environment Group also tends to the school vegetable garden and students participate in Clean Up Australia Day and National Tree Day each year. Students have the opportunity to learn skills in garden planning. including irrigation, and to also be involved in planting, composting and the worm farm.

Catherine McAuley has a Student Leader of Environment and an Assistant Leader of Environment who take on the role of developing school spirit and the environmental involvement of students within the school. The Student Environment Leaders work with the Principal, Assistant Principal (Pastoral Care / Administration) and Science Coordinator to help adapt student behaviours and practices towards protecting the environment. The Leaders will regularly address full school assemblies on environment issues and achievements and organise relevant school activities.

Gilroy Catholic College, established in 1980, is a Year 7-12 co-educational high school. As a faith community with a motto of 'Christ is my Light', we seek to deepen each student's relationship with Jesus Christ through study, prayer and service. In 2016, the College adopted St Mary of the Cross MacKillop as our patron saint and her motto for life. "never see a need without doing something about it" (1871), permeates College life, making Gilroy a very special place. Together, staff, students and parents work tirelessly to foster excellence in education and connections with those in need.

Our students are engaged in a diverse and comprehensive curriculum founded on student-centred learning to foster creativity and critical thinking. Our Pastoral Care program is integrated into Years 7-12. with each year group's theme targeting the spiritual, social and emotional needs of the students. The program is based on the seven College values of compassion, community, faith, forgiveness, justice, service and respect. It is time devoted to developing students' skills in goal setting, team building and awareness of social justice issues, with the aim of building confident, independent and resilient young people.

Environment and Sustainability

At Gilroy Catholic College, environmental awareness and sustainability skills are a priority across all subject areas. Students learn about personal and global responsibilities and develop a deep understanding of the impacts of human life on the environment. They investigate environmental issues through studying individual organisations, to identify natural and man-made impacts and current practices, and legislations that currently work to minimise human footprints. Sustainability, while looking at ways to protect the environment, is also about innovation in designs. A core skill in many practical subjects requires students to critically evaluate the appropriateness of design ideas and to consider re-use, re-purpose and recycle options for current and evolving design concepts.

Within the College, students actively apply their knowledge and skills in sustainable practices. In the one-to-one device program, students use energy-saving modes for technology and Cloud services to minimise printing. Recycling is an embedded practice together with responsible selection of timbers, fabrics and recyclable materials. Students also cultivate crops in raised garden beds within our beautiful College grounds. Participation in recreation camps provides first-hand experience of the impacts of hiking and camping on the natural environment. Human-free areas are discussed to enable students to weigh up the degradation caused by human presence and our ethical responsibilities for the generations to come. As a Catholic school, stewardship of God's creation is actioned in responsible behaviour within the context of 21st century education for a rapidly changing world, where ethical practices are central to the theme of 'Reverence for life'.



What Makes Us Special

Kincoppal – Rose Bay School is a leading Catholic independent school with over 135 years of 'educating' hearts and minds'. KRB's Junior School is co-educational from Sophie's Cottage to Year 6. The Senior School is girls only, day and boarding, from Years 7 to 12. The School is part of the international network of Sacred Heart schools in 44 countries.

KRB offers the latest pedagogy and technology, together with access to current thinking, concepts and practices in the broader world. The School focuses on the academic care of the whole student, nurturing both the Heart and the Mind. The School encourages all students to take on new challenges, develop resilience and to be the best they can be in all areas of their learning. Students are also given many opportunities to develop leadership qualities as mentors and as role models to others. KRB students are also encouraged to act as agents of change by raising awareness of global issues and social justice. KRB graduates leave our School with the belief that they can address these concerns through effective leadership.

At KRB, we believe that global exchange programs have life changing potential. Throughout the year, a number of students from Years 7-11 participate in the international exchange program. The program allows students to develop tolerance, maturity and independence and encourages them to gain an international perspective.

Environment and Sustainability

Caring for our environment is a significant component of a KRB education. It begins in the Early Learning Centre, where the children are taught about nurturing and caring for their space and the bushland surrounding the Centre. Wild Time in the natural KRB bushland engages the children. Activities include exploration of the natural habitat, plants, trees and flowers, and even the construction of a fire pit and campfires, which build a link to the past people of the land. The children from both the Early Learning Centre and the Junior School participate in Mud Days, National Tree Day and World Environment Day. In developing a Masterplan for a new Junior School, the plans for a new Year 12 Learning Hub, café and Boarding staff accommodation, much emphasis has been placed on providing learning and play areas with rocks, leaves and other elements of the natural environment, as well as selecting environmentally sustainable building materials.

The importance of providing a sustainable environment continues into the senior years and often forms part of particular projects prepared by the HSC students. A number of students studying Visual Arts, Design & Technology and Drama, focus on the importance of the environment in their works. Other activities have included support of the Elephant Adoption Package with Taronga Zoo. Our student leaders are particularly involved in caring for the environment and have set up programs to encourage recycling, promoting environmental awareness and encouraging all students to get involved with Earth Hour.

What Makes Us Special

Loreto Normanhurst is a leading Sydney independent, Catholic day and boarding school for girls in Years 5-12. Established in 1897, the school is part of a 400-year tradition of educating girls, and is connected to a worldwide network of Loreto schools, including seven in Australia.

Our Foundress, Mary Ward, a simple and devout English woman who lived from 1585-1645, believed that, "Women in time to come will do much..." This still resonates with us today. In our school, we live out Mary Ward's vision through the Loreto Values of Freedom, Justice, Sincerity, Verity and Felicity.

At Loreto Normanhurst, relationships and learning are of equal importance. The Loreto Normanhurst Student Growth Model (LNSGM) is an award-winning model of education which develops students holistically in the areas of Faith. Academic, Community and Extra-curricular (FACE).

The success of the LNSGM in the academic realm is highly evident, with Loreto Normanhurst having been ranked as the top Catholic School in NSW for four of the last five years. In 2015, the School was ranked as the #1 Catholic School and #26 overall in the State. There were 13 students on the All-Rounders list, and 289 mentions on the Distinguished Achievers List.

The development of ecological sensitivity in all members of the community so that all actions reflect a care for creation.

A school that assumes ethical responsibility for decisions which promote sustainability across all areas of the community, within and outside Loreto Normanhurst. The development of a growth strategy and Master Plan that imagine and deliver a state of the art school with modern facilities ensuring robust stewardship of resources.

Loreto Normanhurst has implemented many initiatives which focus on "caring for our common home". As an ecologycentred school, environmental considerations are at the forefront of decisions made regarding building projects.

The Gonzaga Barry Centre and Veronica Reid Buildings are designed with features which reduce or eliminate the need for air-conditioning or heating. The oval is irrigated with recycled water from the school's water tanks. The array of solar panels on the roof of the school's Aquatic Centre and Gymnasium have the capability of saving 153 tonnes of CO2 from entering our atmosphere annually.

The School's Green Team, comprising of students and staff with great passion and advocacy about the environment, work to continually raise awareness and shape culture and everyday actions within the school community.



What Makes Us Special

Maronite College of the Holy Family, established in 1972, is a K-12 Coeducational College administered by the Maronite Sisters of the Holy Family through its motto: know, love and serve. The College provides opportunities for all members of the College community (staff, parents and students) to deepen and explore their faith through prayer, academia and social interaction. Students at the College enjoy a community-centred environment, where they are guided, challenged and encouraged to go beyond expectations to achieve.

Emphasis is firstly given to providing a strong Maronite Catholic Foundation, expressed through regular worship and prayer, celebrating liturgy and Sacraments, commitment to the Scriptural Word and emphasis on the working of the Holy Spirit. Secondly, emphasis is given to love and service. All students are encouraged to see the best in themselves and in one another, and to achieve their full potential. The College is a community which promotes a sense of family. It emphasises values of treating all with dignity, service, forgiveness and justice.

The College strives to identify the unique needs of each student, so as to allow every child to develop to their fullest potential – spiritually, academically, physically and socially. Students are encouraged to take pride in their identity living in a multicultural society. Parents are key stakeholders in education and, therefore, the College recognises and affirms the pre-eminent role of parents in the education of their children and encourages their active involvement in the College community.

Environment and Sustainability

The College values the importance of a sustainable environment and promotes sustainable practices. The College has formed partnerships with organisations to model the importance of a sustainable environment.

Students are exposed to the importance of a sustainable environment through many key learning areas. Geography students explore and investigate various topics, such as accessing fresh water, the physical environment, current issues in the environment and sustainable management. TAS students look into factors of design including environmental sustainable products. All focus areas foster an awareness of the impact of industry on the environment and the importance of the use of alternative and sustainable resources. This enables students to make informed decisions in relation to the selection and use of materials and processes. Senior Studies of Religion students cover environmental ethics from a Christian and Jewish perspective. They examine teachings from scripture and writers and how we can live these ethical principles today.

The College has implemented various initiatives to model the importance of a sustainable environment through updating its recycling and waste management systems, installation of rainwater tanks, use of compost bins, construction and maintenance of a herb and veggie garden, and establishment of an environmental group to raise funds for projects, host events and activities, such as 'Go Green Day'. Currently, the College is in the process of constructing a new learning centre where the installation of solar panels and energy saving systems (such as lighting) are being incorporated into the design.

What Makes Us Special

Mount St Benedict College was founded by the Sisters of the Good Samaritan in the Order of St Benedict in 1966 and has recently celebrated fifty years of educating young women. The College is one of ten owned by the Sisters in Australia and is run under the auspices of Good Samaritan Education through its Board of Directors and the College Principal.

The core values of the College are Pax, Hospitality and Stewardship, and the promotion of holistic education. The College offers a rigorous academic program, a comprehensive curriculum and an enriching co-curricular program in the spirit of Benedictine and Good Samaritan tradition.

As an academically non-selective school, in the 2015 HSC the College was ranked as the 12th best performing Catholic school in NSW and 76th overall in NSW. There is an extensive choice of subjects on offer at the College, as well as a Pastoral Care structure that nurtures students within small Homeroom groups and Houses. In this supportive environment, students are able to grow and flourish, developing their particular gifts and challenging themselves to venture into new and exciting areas of enquiry.

Mount St Benedict College has committed to Positive Education as a whole-school approach across all areas of curriculum, pastoral and mission. This initiative nurtures well-being in both students and staff, and a positive learning environment where students flourish both academically and emotionally.

Environment and Sustainability

As a Catholic School in the Benedictine tradition. Mount St Benedict College places significant emphasis on its commitment to the environment and sustainability through the Benedictine value of Stewardship. Core to the College's Mission Statement is a commitment to instill in each student a responsibility to be active stewards of the environment and natural resources. This embraces the curriculum, mission and pastoral dimensions of the College and is integrated across all aspects of the curriculum where appropriate. In line with the new Australian Curriculum, sustainability is a cross curriculum priority (Years 7-10) in Maths, English, Science, History and Geography. In the College's mandatory Studies of Religion course (Year 12), students study Environmental Ethics with a focus on stewardship. Students at the College are active in their stewardship of the environment. Two student leaders for the environment are elected each year and are supported in their initiatives by a portfolio of Year 12 students.

The installation of solar panels, shade cloths and rainwater tanks demonstrate the College's commitment to stewardship of the environment. The College has recently installed a 100kw solar panel system which has substantially reduced the College's carbon footprint. The College is also active in sourcing Fairtrade products.

In 2015, the College embarked on changing the way staff and students think about their printing. A College-wide print management system, called PaperCut, was introduced to reduce printing levels by changing a user's printing behaviour. The College has realised an incredible 64% decrease in paper usage in just eighteen months.

What Makes Us Special

Our Lady of Mercy College Parramatta is one of the oldest Catholic girls' schools in NSW. From its establishment in 1889 until 2003, only seven women had held the position of College Principal, all of whom were Sisters of Mercy. This continuity in vision over the years saw a treasured legacy established, including an unwavering commitment to social justice.

The hard work and determination of the founding Sisters established a culture of excellence which grew over its 127-year history: Excellence enjoys prime place as one of the College's eight key Mercy Values. Pastoral Care at OLMC is the proactive creation of an environment where girls feel supported, safe and ready to take a chance and believe in their potential. By knowing girls, not just by name, staff can meet their needs effectively.

OLMC is large enough to offer superior, specialist resources and broad subject options so that every student has multiple chances to excel, but small enough to be a closely-knit community.

A contemporary Mercy Education at OLMC empowers young women to lead with courage, act justly and respond to the challenges of their time, and make a difference in whatever sphere of life they choose to move, in the spirit of Catherine McAuley.

Environment and Sustainability

Environmental sustainability is intertwined into all aspects of life at Our Lady of Mercy College Parramatta. As a Catholic school, the College takes very seriously the call to stewardship of the Earth. This is one of the College's key eight Mercy Values, hence, sustainability is both practiced and preached.

The College has an extensive recycling program which includes recycling of general waste products, cardboard, batteries, toner cartridges and all incandescent and fluorescent light bulbs. The installation of water stations in the playgrounds has seen a dramatic decrease in plastic bottle usage. In terms of responsible water usage, the College has five 5,000-litre water tanks, the water from which is used for gardens and cleaning playgrounds. LED lighting, solar panels and a green wall are other examples of initiatives taken at the College to promote sustainability.

Mercy Girls who are passionate about environmental advocacy have formed a student group at the College called EcOLMC. The group meets regularly, attends summits and develops campaigns to raise awareness in the College community of specific environmental issues.

In 2016, the College embarked on an Environmental Impact Assessment to measure the sustainability of College operations with a view to implementing and refining exemplary sustainability practices.

What Makes Us Special

St Andrews College continues to strengthen its essence of 'being people for others' through its cultural, language study, sport and volunteer tours. Year 11 students are offered the opportunity to take part in the Thai Cultural Immersion Program in Khorat, Thailand, to teach English at Wat Dannok School. This program aims to offer an authentic experience in another culture without the tourist tag.

St Andrews College has formed a sister school relationship with Isahaya Commercial High School in Nagasaki, Japan. This program focuses on language, culture, history, religion and daily living in a Japanese home. The sport and volunteer project to the Philippines offers an opportunity for senior basketball players to put into practice their faith, service and community. During the tour, students play basketball, visit a home and school for street kids and assist in community projects.

These cultural programs give students an opportunity to enhance their compassion for, and learn from, people with different cultures and to become confident young people who with their conviction of faith can transform the world they live in. St Andrews College also provides an industry professional environment where students can experience and refine their talents. The Night of Excellence Showcase and the Creative Arts Night are opportunities where the school community celebrates the visions, sounds and the skills of its students. These events celebrate the quality work produced across the College from a range of subjects, including Music, Visual Art, Drama, Design and Technology, Industrial Technology, Engineering, Textiles and Design, VET Hospitality and VET Entertainment.

Environment and Sustainability

The students of St Andrews College have developed a strong awareness of environmental and sustainability issues.

It has been a long tradition that senior students volunteer as members of Streamwatch, a water-monitoring program initiated by Sydney Water. Students investigate and take action on the water quality and health of the ecosystem of Breakfast Creek. One day a week after school students monitor Breakfast Creek and send the data they collect to water authorities for warnings of extreme pollution. Streamwatch students also maintain historical records on how Breakfast Creek has changed over time. Breakfast Creek has been an extension of the Biology classroom and is a focus on the learning of environmental sustainability.

In recent years, students at St Andrews College have been conscious of the amount of water bottles filling rubbish bins each day. Through the Student Leaders Forum discussions were held to find a solution to reduce the amount of bottles the College placed in landfill. Three water coolers were installed and in a twelve-month period the coolers saved the environment 50,000 plastic bottles.

The Autism Unit identified that the student body, as a whole, was not respecting the school environment. To address this concern the Autism students established the St Andrews Rubbish Agency (SARA). Students from the entire Junior Campus are invited to join SARA. A roster was developed for the volunteers to collect rubbish at the end of recess and lunch each day. Students are currently investigating a sustainable recycling program for bottles and cans consumed and paper used on campus.

Our pastoral care program supports developing right relationships amongst the students, providing an environment where every student feels a sense of belonging. Students are surrounded by a group of peers who have genuine compassion and respect for one another.

Environment and Sustainability

St Dominic's College takes a whole-school approach to environmental education and sustainability. We believe that environmental sustainability is essential to the future, and that educating our students to have respect and care for our environment enriches both our College and the surrounding community. The College contributes to the quality of the environment through a combination of state of the art design of our College buildings and grounds, and an emphasis on teaching and learning towards sustainability in our College curriculum. The St Dominic's College campus incorporates a number of environmental technologies to ensure that our impact on our environment is limited. The reduction and minimisation of resource use by the College continues to be a high priority in the development and management of the College grounds and buildings. We have over 11 rainwater tanks on the property, with a total pool of 451,000 litres of water and a 100.000-litre underground reservoir. The College also has two large solar arrays totalling 266 solar panels.

The St Dominic's College curriculum encompasses a wide range of teaching and learning strategies towards sustainability. We foster attitudes and values in our students that are reflected in an appreciation and commitment to:

- respecting and caring for life in all its diversity;
- conserving and managing resources in ways that are fair to present and future generations; and
- $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ understanding and conserving cultural heritage.

We also encourage our students to become involved in community events, such as National Tree Day and Clean Up Australia Day, and to actively participate in recycling and energy conservation around the College.

Our dual campus College boasts modern facilities, including fully-equipped and air-conditioned science laboratories. Design and Technology spaces, a music centre, art studios, commercial and industrial kitchens, and a performance centre. In addition, our learning spaces are fully wireless to ensure greater flexibility in learning and teaching. Information and Communications Technology (ICT) is integrated into the curriculum providing innovative learning and teaching that is relevant to the students of today.

The senior campus forms part of the Nirimba Education Precinct – an exciting and innovative educational concept incorporating the Western Sydney University and TAFE Western Sydney. Students have the option whilst completing their HSC to undertake additional studies at TAFE Western Sydney or the Western Sydney University. These programs provide opportunities of early enrolment, credit toward degrees and the possibility of scholarships at the Western Sydney University for students of St John Paul II. Students may also enrol in the Step Up Into Teaching program from the Australian Catholic University. The College also runs a Year 7 Core Learning and Teaching Program that has been developed to assist with the transition from primary to secondary school and to assist the change from a single classroom in primary to numerous classrooms and teachers in high school. It allows students to develop a strong educational relationship with their two core teachers for English, History and Religion and another for Mathematics, Science and Personal Development, Health & Physical Education. Collaborative teaching and learning spaces have recently been built for the Year 7 students, which is an addition to their base classroom spaces.

Environment and Sustainability

Students at St John Paul II Catholic College share a unique space that was specifically planned and built to reflect unity and oneness with the land and its environment. The Schofields Campus was planned with sensitivity to 'permaculture' principles, meaning carefully thinking about the environment and use of resources, to sustain our needs for ourselves and future generations. The College was designed to create environments, which have diversity, stability, and resilience of natural ecosystems, to regenerate damaged land and preserve environments that are still intact.

The permaculture design of the College includes keeping the buildings close to the natural environment and the gentle rise and fall of the land, construction of innovative, energy-efficient buildings which reflect the micro-climate of the area, placement of buildings to work with the prevailing winds, therefore, providing shelter and avoiding potential wind tunnel areas, and the overall physical design which minimises the long, narrow nature of the site. Appropriate landscaping was also provided to enhance the appearance and create a positive environmental sense of wellbeing within the school, including the placement of trees.

Since its development in 1996, the College continues to educate students about the unique environment of the College and sustainable practices, including the agriculture, use of solar panels, water tanks and a well-executed "reduce printing" campaign. St John Paul II Catholic College proudly represents a sustainable environment, sensitive to the Aboriginal heritage and the rural, multicultural farming background of the area; a continuing recognition of the interdependence of all living things.

Students in both HSIE and Science are actively engaged in the study of the environment. We offer a stimulating and relevant curriculum that incorporates classroom, laboratory. field, and research experiences. Through this curriculum, we educate for fundamental understanding of the structure and function of natural, economic, and political systems as they relate to the environment. Students come to appreciate the complexity, details and interrelated nature of systems and problems. We also examine the effects of society's activities upon environmental resources and their relevance to human well-being.

A cross-curriculum priority: Stella teachers are embedding sustainability concepts and environmental education across the curriculum in Science, Maths and Geography. An excursion to the local waterways to test the cleanliness of the water forms part of the Year 12 Chemistry class assessment. Participation in the "Clean-up Australia" national program is an annual event for Social Science and Economics Department. Food gardens and vegetable patches are cared for by our students in the learning support program. The teachers believe that experiential learning is the approach to provide students with deep understanding of the need to care for our environment.

Just switch off: Stella students and staff have a good habit of switching off the light when they leave the classrooms. Staff mainly work on laptops so desktops are not left on overnight. With the beautiful breeze coming from the ocean, there is little need for air-conditioning in the school.

Look good in our uniform: Stella students take pride in wearing their school uniforms well. The majority of our students re-sell their uniforms in good condition.

Walk or Ride to school: Stella students enjoy walking and exercising. With the beautiful coastline and the close proximity of the school's location, the girls enjoy the full benefit of going green and soaking up the sun. Bicycle stations are installed for the girls to ride to school and change room facilities are there for students who exercised on the way. There is indeed a strong culture of keeping fit and staying healthy in the school community.

What Makes Us Special

We are proud of being a school that is unique in Sydney's Eastern suburbs for its genuinely inclusive community, authentic Catholic education, breadth of opportunities and innovative approach to educating boys. Over its 112-year history, Waverley College has educated many eminent Australians in law, medicine, the military, sport and the arts. Inclusiveness is one of our touchstones and we remain proudly non-selective. Nevertheless, roughly 80% of our Year 12 graduates go on to attend university.

Student care is supported by firm discipline and a proactive approach to managing bullying in all its forms. The thriving Old Boy network is also available to support and mentor current students and young graduates, as well as foster connections through the decades.

Educational diversity is our focus. With 44 HSC courses. the hardest part is choosing: from Engineering Studies to Food Technology and Vocational (VET) and Content Endorsed options, such as Construction, Visual Design, Photo, Video and Digital Imaging and Hospitality.

Waverley's Social Justice Program encourages even our youngest students to participate in outreach activities, and to develop a lifetime commitment to activism for the world's marginalised in the spirit of our founder Edmund Rice. This is a school with an important mission at its heart: to transform the minds and hearts of young Australians to build a more just, tolerant and inclusive community by educating for liberation and possibility.

Environment and Sustainability

All students are encouraged to care for the environment at Waverley as part of a philosophy that encourages stewardship of the planet for future generations. Activism for the planet and for those adversely affected by climate change is an important part of the school's social justice focus.

The College minimises its environmental impact in many ways; solar panels have been installed on the roof of one of the main buildings, the school promotes recycling and also educates junior students about self-sufficiency by maintaining its own vegetable garden. The college's latest building development. The Cosgrove Centre, has been designed with sustainability in mind. The building is fitted with automated windows and blinds as well as giant fans for cooling. The building is controlled by a C-Bus system and the lighting is energy efficient and programmed on sensors. Showers in the pool house are touch controlled and programmed on timers to minimise water waste.

The Cadet program in the senior school provides a number of bush camping experiences each year at which students are taught the importance of sustainable use of the earth's resources. The recent addition of The Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme to the school's co-curricular program will provide even more opportunities to extend this learning in outdoor environments. In the academic curriculum, a new HSC Marine Studies course fosters in students a sense of ownership of our oceans by teaching diving and boating skills while also developing an understanding the chemical and physical makeup of the marine environment and the enormous diversity of life within.



In 2011, a Caritas partner organisation began working with Dinia. She has been able to develop a sustainable income through a livelihoods program that helps both her and her neighbours overcome the widespread poverty of the rural Philippines.

Her strength comes from her own journey of healing, which began in shock and despair.

"I didn't have other income aside from my husband's from his work as a miner," she says.

"After he died, I used to collect shells and crabs from the seashore to sell. That was my main source of income ... it was a very small income."

Dinia flourished thanks to education and development programs supported by Caritas Australia.

Today, she has an integral role in her community, a sustainable livelihood, and a brighter future for her children.

"My life is much better now. It is much easier," Dinia says.


