Even more so when her husband died just two years into their marriage. She's now running her own successful sewing business and has become an inspirational community leader.

In 2015, Janaki joined a youth club formed by Caritas Australia partners, Caritas Nepal and the Ekata Foundation Surkhet, as part of the Children and Youth Empowerment Program (CYEP) which provides youth with job skills and income-generating projects. She took a loan from the youth club to purchase her first sewing machine.

Two years on, Janaki has 11 sewing machines and is running her own business, teaching others, and is considered a community role model.

"My confidence level has raised," Janaki says. "I appreciate all those respected peoples of Australia who are supporting this wise cause. Through their help, women who experience domestic violence and who are financially vulnerable are getting new hope in their life. I thank them from bottom of my heart."

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
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
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












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Catholic Education in the Global Village

The story of Catholic education in Australia dates back to the first decade of the 1800s, before Catholic priests were allowed in the fledgling colony. Lay women and men who had seen the power of forming young people

in the Faith began carrying on that tradition in their own homes. About 15 years later, the first of what we would today recognise as a Catholic school opened in Parramatta, starting a 200-year journey that has taken Catholic education to every corner of this country.

Australian Catholic schools were often established thanks to the generosity of lay people and run under the leadership of orders of religious women and men.

St Mary of the Cross MacKillop stands as a pioneer of Catholic education in our history, and especially in the history of educating disadvantaged children, girls and those in rural and regional Australia. Despite the ebbs and flows of government funding across two centuries, Catholic schools have always had a commitment to forming young people academically, physically, emotionally and spiritually.

As Pope Francis said back in 2014: "Education cannot be neutral. It is either positive or negative; either it enriches or it impoverishes; either it enables a person to grow or it lessens, even corrupts him. The mission of schools is to develop a sense of truth, of what is good and beautiful."

Catholic schools seek to imbue truth, goodness and beauty in each community in which they operate, including in the many new suburbs and towns where Catholic school systems are the first to take up the challenge of providing an education for children. It is not an overstatement to say that it's hard to imagine schooling in Australia without Catholic education.

One in six Australian schools is a Catholic school. In some remote parts of Western Australia and the Northern Territory, a Catholic school is the only school in the community. The impact of any Catholic school is significant; the impact of a Catholic school when it's the only school within a few hundred kilometres is immeasurable.

Each Catholic school across our nation is unique. Each has its set of individual strengths, as well as its particular challenges. But despite that school being a vibrant and dynamic and transformative unit, it's also part of a growing network of 1,740 Catholic schools that are forming young people to see themselves as truly part of something bigger than themselves.

Think of your local Catholic schools. Think of the outreach that takes place in support of the local, national and international community. Those schools are forming young people into citizens who have a sense of justice and a sense of service – citizens that know that life isn't all about "me", but about being part of a global village to which we can all contribute.

Think of how local schools are forming young people in that way. Now multiply that effort by 1,740 and you'll get a sense of the difference Catholic schools are making in this country – and in our world.





ACU and The Global Village

This momentum is exemplified by the National School of Arts at ACU. where world-class researchers come together with award-winning teachers to provide an exceptional educational experience for students that sets them up for life. In 2017, ACU was ranked in the top 2-3% of universities for Arts and Humanities worldwide. This achievement is evidence of the University's growing reputation for excellence in a range of disciplines, most notably History, Politics, International Relations, Sociology and Literature. At ACU, the future of Arts looks very bright indeed.

This success notwithstanding, doubts persist in some quarters about the value of studying the Arts, **Humanities and Social Sciences** at university. Historically, students who expressed an interest in doing a BA were asked why, the assumption being that it was an indulgent pursuit that wouldn't lead to a clearly-defined job. While old attitudes die hard, the world has changed almost beyond recognition. In today's 'global village', where core human values will shape the tide of technological innovation, the old stereotypes about Arts look woefully outdated.

The evidence for the 'real world' value of Arts is compelling. In Australia today, Arts graduates

have lower unemployment than the national rate and higher mid-career salaries than Science graduates. But they are also thriving internationally, with qualities that are highly prized by global employers in the workforce of the twenty-first century. Who would have thought that 60% of industry leaders in the United Kingdom had completed a Humanities, Social Sciences or Arts degree at university?

Consider this too. Young people today will experience about seven career changes in their lives. This means that a vocational degree – leading to one clearly-defined job – may no longer be the most practical choice for students. When government or industry signals that they are on the lookout for well-rounded graduates who can apply their skills in new ways to meet new challenges, this should be music to the ears of prospective Arts students because this is the greatest strength of Arts graduates.

The best thing about Arts graduates is they keep on learning. They understand context, communicate clearly and respond well to change. They are also outward looking, equipped to engage with diverse cultural perspectives, locally and globally. In a modern job market that values flexibility and diversity above all else, Arts graduates stand out as both 'work ready' and 'world ready'. It is not surprising that so many people who have carved out successful careers in law, politics, journalism, business, government, education and the creative industries have studied the Humanities and Social Sciences at university.

But what makes Arts at ACU so special? Why might students choose to study with us? Some will no doubt be attracted by our rising profile – the fact that we have been recognised for excellence in international rankings. Others will be drawn to our student-centred learning environment - an environment characterised by small class sizes, flexible pathways through our degrees and engaging teaching staff who know their students' names, provide personalised learning support and celebrate their students' successes. For still others the key appeal will be our graduate outcomes - our reputation for producing exceptional graduates who engage the world with confidence and purpose.

In Arts at ACU, the world is our classroom. We recognise that the modern workforce requires globallyfocused citizens who understand different worldviews, are crossculturally competent and empathise with the life experiences of different peoples. In addition to an engaging curriculum informed by contemporary international issues, we offer our students rich opportunities to further their studies overseas. From semester-long exchanges with one of our 90 international partner universities, to intensive units of study taught by ACU staff in locations such as New York, Rome, London, Venice and Beijing, 200 Arts students at ACU have benefited from international learning experiences over the past year. These students have discovered that studying overseas is a transformative learning experience that builds their confidence, broadens their perspectives and gives them an edge in the global job market.

While becoming 'work ready' is a key outcome of studying Arts at ACU, developing socially aware and ethically-minded graduates who aspire to use their knowledge and skills in the service of others is at the core of what we do. Students in the School of Arts are encouraged to recognise and help ameliorate disadvantage in local and global contexts. For example, in our core second-year community engagement unit, we encourage students to see how urgent 'global problems'. such as poverty, exist in our own communities. This year students in this unit have participated in the Big Idea Competition - 'Australia's leading social enterprise immersion and competition for university students'. There, they have had the opportunity to apply the research, critical thinking and problem-solving skills developed in their Bachelor of Arts degree to come up with actual solutions to real-world problems. This is precisely the kind of 'hands-on' experience that future employers will be looking for.

ACU's National School of Arts is gearing up for an exciting few years ahead. Our offerings are expanding to include innovative new degrees in diverse areas, including global politics and creative practice; we have study tours planned for Rome and New York; and we are welcoming a large number of new teaching staff who will further enrich our expertise in history, politics and international relations, and sociology.

Our School is a lively intellectual community for students who wish to engage with pressing global issues and who aspire to make the world a better place.

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Parents as First Educators in the Global Village

The history of Catholic School Parents Australia (CSPA) is relatively short however the story of parents and Catholic education in Australia goes back nearly 200 years to 1820 with the opening of the first Catholic school in Parramatta. Formed in late 2013, CSPA has quickly established itself as the national body for parents-carers with children in the 1740 Catholic schools across Australia. Now, more so than ever, it takes the whole global village to educate the child, and with great pride and responsibility parents are 'the first and most important educators of their own children' (Pope John Paul II, 1994).

Driven by our core values of *Integrity,* Respect, Faith and *Inclusivity*, CSPA supports and celebrates the holistic education (cognitive, social, physical, ethical and spiritual) offered to students in Catholic schools.

What does CSPA do?

Catholic School Parents Australia:

- Advocates for families with children and young people in Australian Catholic schools;
- · Represents these families to

education authorities such as NCEC and ACARA and governments;

- Supports and provides national leadership to the State and Territory parent bodies working with Catholic schools;
- Works with such agencies as the Australian government and the Australian Research Alliance for Children and Youth (ARACY) to support, explore and promote Parent Engagement as an influence on student learning; and
- Collaborates with the National Catholic Education Commission (NCEC) in all matters pertaining to parents as partners in Catholic education.

Currently, a key undertaking of CSPA is the exploration of Parent Engagement practices in schools across all school sectors nationwide. Working in partnership with the University of Southern Queensland (USQ) and ARACY, CSPA has used funding from the Australian Government's Department of Education and Training (DET) to survey and interview principals and interview parents about Parent

Engagement. A key outcome of this research will be, during 2018, the generation of tool kits outlining for principals, teachers and parents – carers, contemporary Parent Engagement strategies that enhance student learning and well-being.

CSPA is keen to get this right as respected research has shown that when parents engage in their children's learning, they develop a stronger belief in education (Pushor, 2007) and their children are likely to:

- · achieve higher grades;
- · stay at school longer;
- develop better social skills:
- have improved behaviour;
- · graduate successfully; and
- transition to post-secondary education.

(Emerson, Fear, Fox and Sanders, 2012).

If undertaken effectively, Parent Engagement can be a cost effective way for not only a parent – carer to improve their child's learning and well-being, but also for the globally connected village of Australia to assist their students in stepping up to another level of performance.



Tony O'Byrne is the inaugural Chair of CSPA, a position he has held since 2013. Tony was principal of Aquinas College at Ringwood for 25 years up until 2013. Tony's three children were educated in Catholic schools and he currently works for Melbourne Catholic Education.

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Hidden Costs of Education

■ ave you started savings for your child's education? Understanding the total cost of education might give you a reason to. When it comes to planning your child's education, there are several factors most families consider, from the quality of the education, range of subject options, academic achievement, school values and ethos, and family tradition. And, although cost may not be the number one factor when making this important decision, research by ASG¹ suggests that the estimated total cost of a Catholic education² has risen by 57 per cent in the last decade, which makes cost a growing consideration for many families. Information from the Australian Bureau of Statistics also indicates that the cost of education across all sectors has risen by 64 per cent over the past 10 years, which is more than double the increase in inflation.3

Luckily, finding out the fees and levies associated with a particular school, and comparing schools across a range of criteria is relatively easy to do, especially with resources such as Catholic Schools Guide.

What some parents fail to consider however are the additional costs associated with education that sometimes go unrecognised until their children actually start school.

Research conducted by ASG1, an education savings and scholarship benefit fund provider in Australia, illustrates that costs such as uniforms, books, extracurricular activities, technology and excursions or school trips in 2017 can actually represent 27 per cent of the total costs for a child attending a Catholic secondary school in metropolitan Australia. Families planning on sending their child born in 2017 through a Catholic education could face additional costs of close to \$50,000 over 13 years.

ASG CEO John Velegrinis says Australians are fortunate to have excellent government, systemic and private schools to choose from, but costs can spiral out of control. "We advocate parents use a disciplined approach by putting a little bit away each week so they can financially afford to meet their children's educational goals and aspirations."



Independent statistician and Managing Director of foreseechange Charlie Nelson says a range of economic factors influence the cost of education. "Employment growth, hourly wages and inflation all impact the cost of living, which puts extra strain on the family budget. With school fees likely to rise further, it has never been more important for parents to financially plan for their child's future."

Careful planning and budgeting now can of course help families ensure there are no surprises during the first year of school.

ASG provides a cost and savings calculator on their website— www.asg.com.au which can help you understand the various estimated costs associated with the different types and stages of education, which may help you with your planning.

Consider these hidden cost tips when planning your child's education



Find out what uniform costs are now and likely to be when your child starts school

- Uniforms can be expensive, and will most likely need to be updated as your child grows up.
- Ask the school about uniform costs and find out if there is a second-hand uniform store.
- You may also want to find out if the school is looking to update or change uniforms in the near future.



Get a feel for current book, technology and stationery costs

 Find out what the average book list cost is at each year level to see what the likely costs could be when your child starts school.



Find out if there are additional levies during the school period

 It might be worthwhile confirming with the school if they are planning on any additional levies to cover things like buildings or refurbishment over the coming years.



Find out whether or not all trips and excursions are included in the school fees and levies

 Confirm with the school the policies around school trips and excursions and if these costs are included in the annual fee schedule.



Find out if here are any special activities, such as exchanges or overseas trips, that your child may want to attend

Cultural and language exchanges or excursions are great opportunities
for students to learn and experience new cultures and countries.
If you think you'd like your child to participate in these types of
experiences, it might be worthwhile finding out from the school when
and how much these types of trips or experiences cost to ensure that
you can plan for these additional costs as they come up.



Understand whether there are costs for things like school band or sporting equipment

 Participating in school music or sporting programs can also mean additional costs for purchasing or renting instruments or equipment.
 These costs can vary, and if your child participates in a number of activities, they can add up quickly.

Principal faith to life

Bringing taith to lite

ost of us wouldn't know much about the Central African Republic. A landlocked country in the middle of Africa, it is home to around 4.6 million people. Despite being the site of ongoing conflict between Christian and Muslim militias in recent years, it is rarely featured in our news here in Australia.

But in 2015, the Central African Republic did make the news – and not for another outbreak of violence. In November that year, Pope Francis launched the Catholic Church's Year of Mercy in Bangui, the country's capital. Opening the Holy Door of the Cathedral in front of a crowd of onlookers, the Pope declared that the city was, that day, 'the spiritual capital of the world'.

Traditionally, only churches in Rome have had Holy Doors. They are generally designated during jubilee years so that pilgrims may walk through them to receive the plenary indulgences that are available to them during those celebrations. The Year of Mercy was the first time a Pope had allowed Holy Doors to be designated in other dioceses. The Central African Republic, which few could even find on a map, was the first place where a Door of Mercy was opened.

Pope Francis has spoken about what he terms the 'globalisation of indifference', which often arises as a defence mechanism when people are confronted with the overwhelming difficulties facing people around the world. It's difficult not to despair at the endless stories of violence and conflict in our media. Sometimes we can feel like the only option is to turn off, to focus on the immediate needs of ourselves and those closest to us.

But, in his travels and in his speeches, Pope Francis puts forward an alternative approach – one that doesn't just focus on our own needs and goals, but sees each of us as part of a different type of global community.

"To the modern concept of the intellectual working for the realisation of self and in search of personal recognition, it is necessary to counter with a model built on solidarity, which works for the common good and for peace', he told a group of international students last year. 'In this way, young people are formed who thirst for truth and not power, ready to defend their values and live mercy and charity, which are the fundamental pillars for a healthier society."

There is an enormous blessing that comes from being part of a globalised Church. It allows us to experience a solidarity with Christian communities in places like the Central African Republic that have been torn apart by conflict. Organisations like Caritas and Catholic Mission offer a way for Catholic schools to contribute in a meaningful way to the lives of people in those communities. Students might even go on immersion trips where they connect with Catholic communities in developing countries.

Catholic communities here in Australia are also enriched by being part of a globalised Church. Many parishes welcome priests from overseas, and host regular liturgies for migrant groups. Our Catholic schools attract families from different backgrounds, many of whom first connected with the Church in countries a long way from Australia. They trust that the values that they were raised with will also be passed on to their children because our Church is a universal one.

Once you start to see yourself as part of a worldwide community of people with the same values and interests, other barriers also start to fall down. While he was in the Central African Republic, Pope Francis made a visit to a mosque that had been besieged by Christian militias.

"Christians and Muslims are brothers and sisters", he said to the men gathered inside. "Together we must say no to hatred, to revenge and to violence, particularly that violence which is perpetrated in the name of a religion or of God himself. God is peace. Salaam."

While globalisation has many detractors, there are in reality two types of globalisation – that which creates inequality and conflict, pushing people apart; and that which creates peace

and prosperity, turning people into brothers and sisters.

Under the leadership of Pope Francis, the Catholic Church is becoming more of a beacon to those who look for that latter type of globalisation, where the concerns of those at the forgotten margins of our world are the centre of attention for the global community.

As Jesuit priest Fr David Holdcroft recent wrote in Eureka Street, "Francis' approach was not primarily theological; it was in the first place pastoral and active. It was to travel and place himself at the centre of people's lived experience, withholding moral judgement, but helping its participants to situate their experience – and suffering – within a larger narrative and analysis."

Fr Holdcroft points to Pope Francis' homily on the island of Lampedusa, the landing place of many boat migrants attempting to find passage to Europe, and where it's impossible to forget the many who perished trying to make the journey.

"The culture of comfort, which makes us think only of ourselves, makes us insensitive to the cries of other people, makes us live in soap bubbles which, however lovely, are insubstantial', said Pope Francis. 'In this globalized world, we have fallen into globalized indifference. We have become used to the suffering of others: it doesn't affect me; it doesn't concern me; it's none of my business!"

He continued, "Let us ask the Lord for the grace to weep over our indifference, to weep over the cruelty of our world, of our own hearts, and of all those who in anonymity make social and economic decisions which open the door to tragic situations like this."

In a sense, what Pope Francis has done is made the peripheries the heart of our Church. With Pope Francis, the heart of our Church is no longer Rome. The heart is wherever the lost and abandoned congregate, wherever the desperate cry out for help, wherever victims seek shelter. The heart of a globalised Church is at the margins – the same place that Jesus lived.




Global Village

In a community boasting 43 different language groups, we celebrate our diversity in many ways and are proud of the culturally harmonious relationships between students, staff and parents.

Our students are true global citizens. Year 8 students have the choice of three languages: French, Italian and Japanese, to study as part of their mandatory study of a Language Other Than English and they can also continue their studies of these languages into Stage 5 and 6. A large number of our students also remain connected to their first language and culture through the provision of study through providers such as the NSW School of Languages and Saturday School of Community Languages. Students at Catherine McAuley Westmead have many opportunities to connect with the world and be a part of the 'global village'. The school offers both Japanese and French, and every second year, our language students are given the opportunity to participate in a two-week study tour to either Japan or New Caledonia. In addition, our school regularly hosts international students on exchange programs from Japan and France, which provide further opportunities for our language students to practice their language skills. Our students may also take up the opportunity to participate in global exchange programs.

Professional development for our teachers includes being part of the New Tech Network, an international organisation which facilitates project-based learning in schools around the world. Catherine McAuley Westmead is one of only 12 Australian schools that are part of this network. Our school recognises cultural diversity in all our students with one example being the McAuley Strong Sisters Group made up of indigenous students who educate the student body on indigenous issues. Cultural diversity is celebrated at the annual school talent guest and annual Mercy Day with the Mercy Day theme for 2017 being 'Celebrating Cultures'. Catherine McAuley Westmead is a strong performer in the Education Perfect Championships – global online competitions that see our students compete against students around the world in a range of subjects. In the 2016 Language Perfect World Championships, our school placed 12th overall globally out of 1111 schools that took part. These competitions provide our students with both global connections and a powerful online learning platform.

What Makes Us Special

Loreto Normanhurst is a leading Sydney independent, Catholic day and boarding school for girls in Years 5-12. Established in 1897, the school is part of a 400-year tradition of educating girls, and is connected to a worldwide network of Loreto schools, including seven in Australia, Our Foundress, Marv Ward, a simple and devout English woman who lived from 1585-1645, believed that, "Women in time to come will do much..." This still resonates with us today. In our school, we live out Mary Ward's vision through the Loreto Values of Freedom, Justice, Sincerity, Verity and Felicity.

At Loreto Normanhurst, relationships and learning are of equal importance. The Loreto Normanhurst Student Growth Model (LNSGM) is an award-winning model of education which develops students holistically in the areas of Faith, Academic, Community and Extra-curricular (FACE). The success of the LNSGM in the academic realm is highly evident, with Loreto Normanhurst ranked as the top Catholic School in NSW for four out of the last six years. In 2016, Loreto Normanhurst students again achieved excellent results in the HSC. The School received 14 All-Rounders and two Top Achievers in Course. There were 80 students on the Distinguished Achievers list, with a total of 230 mentions. An impressive 23% of the Class of 2016 achieved an estimated ATAR of 95 and above. 38% received an ATAR of 90 and above, and 55% were above 80. Loreto Normanhurst was ranked fourth amongst Catholic Schools, and achieved the 44th position in NSW. Loreto Normanhurst is a school which offers breadth and richness in its relationships and its curriculum and provides opportunities to grow in spirit and faith to prepare a young woman to take her place and make a difference in the world.

An immersion experience unique to Loreto Normanhurst is the Far North Oueensland Experience (FNOE). involving the entire cohort of Year 9 students and over 20 members of staff. Now in its twelfth year, FNQE is an important highlight of every student's journey as a Loreto girl. They 'walk beside' country, engage with a number of indigenous communities, perform community service, and experience learning in the beautiful environment of Far North Queensland. Opportunities are also available for students to participate in immersion experiences to Dunedoo or Yarrabah, as well as overseas awareness-raising and fundraising expeditions.

Loreto's global reach extends to the United Nations in New York, with the non-government office of the IBVM focused primarily on women and children, the eradication of poverty, education for global citizenship, human trafficking, climate change, and the empowerment of women. Students at Loreto Normanhurst are offered a variety of languages including Chinese, French and Italian. The school also provides opportunities for overseas tours including a Music Tour to Europe, a Drama and Visual Arts Tour to New York, and Sports Tours to the UK.


Global Village

The College's strong social justice focus stems from its rich Mercy tradition. Mercy Action student leaders facilitate fundraising and awareness raising on local and global issues. The College's Amnesty International Group encourages engagement with social justice issues, while the EcOLMC group encourages community action on environmental concerns. From Year 8, students have the opportunity to study a language, with most students choosing Japanese or French. The College's exchange agreements see French and Japanese students come to OLMC on an annual basis. Cultural Study Tours to Japan and France also allow students to experience, firsthand, the language and culture.

Each year, the Student Representative Council organises Multicultural Week, which celebrates our community's diversity with displays, food stalls, music, dancing and a talent quest, giving students and staff exposure to a range of rich cultural experiences. Girls can expand beyond their known horizons by joining the Cambodian Immersion, which is a chance to live out the Mercy Values, immersed in another culture. As an IB World School we are part of a world-wide community enabled through a rich variety of educational experiences both that traverses space and time.

Students can immerse themselves in a range of global experiences in South Africa and the Solomon Islands as well as undertaking our annual immersion program to the Anangu Pitjantiatjara Lands of Central Australia to learn about the First People of Australia. Every second year we participate in the Alliance of Girls Schools' Space School Expedition to NASA in the USA. Other international cultural trips take place each year in areas of art, history and languages.

partnerships forged with visiting international musicians and choirs who perform with our students. In 2017 our students performed with the Sankt Annæ choir from Denmark and the St Stephen's School choir from Hong Kong. 



St Andrews College continues to strengthen its essence of being people for others through its engagements with global communities. In 2011, St Andrews College established a sister school relationship with Isahaya Commercial High School in Nagasaki, Japan. This program focuses on language. culture, history, religion and daily living in a Japanese home. Biennially, students visit Japan to experience the Japanese way of life and to enhance their Japanese language skills.

Since 2012, students have been involved in an annual Thailand Cultural Immersion trip to a village school in the Dankhunthod local district. This trip aims to offer students an authentic experience in another culture without the tourist tag. St Andrews College students teach English to young Thai students and very quickly learn how students from developing countries value education.

2017 saw the inaugural basketball and volunteer trip to Tunjun Lyso Ministry Center, San Juan, The Philippines. During the week stay our students and staff volunteer with construction projects, distributing food and medical supplies, interact with the community and share basketball skills. For more than a decade, St Andrews College has financially assisted K-12 trainee teachers at the Catholic Teachers College, Baucau, East Timor. These funds assist with resources for their studies and a trip back home to see family. These cultural programs give students of St Andrews College an opportunity to become aware of global injustices. With their compassion and their conviction of faith, students of St Andrews College are able to become confident young people who can transform the world they live in.

Our dual campus College boasts modern facilities, including fully-equipped and air-conditioned science laboratories, Design and Technology spaces, a music centre, art studios, commercial and industrial kitchens, and a performance centre. In addition, our learning spaces are fully-wireless to ensure greater flexibility in learning and teaching. Information and Communications Technology (ICT) is integrated into the curriculum providing innovative learning and teaching that is relevant to the students of today.

The senior campus forms part of the Nirimba Education Precinct – an exciting and innovative educational concept incorporating the Western Sydney University and TAFE Western Sydney. Students have the option whilst completing their HSC to undertake additional studies at TAFE Western Sydney or the Western Sydney University. These programs provide opportunities for early enrolment, credit toward degrees and the possibility of scholarships at the Western Sydney University for students of St John Paul II. Students may also enrol in the Step Up Into Teaching program from the Australian Catholic University. The College also runs a Year 7 Core Learning and Teaching Program that has been developed to assist with the transition from primary to secondary school and to assist the change from a single classroom in primary to numerous classrooms and teachers in high school. It allows students to develop a strong educational relationship with their two core teachers for English, History and Religion and another for Mathematics, Science and Personal Development, Health & Physical Education. Collaborative teaching and learning spaces have recently been built for the Year 7 students, which is an addition to their base classroom spaces.

In our ever-changing world, it is important that our students are understanding and open to the multicultural society that we are so lucky to have in Australia. Throughout the year, these students attend events with other indigenous students, including a welcome BBO, Reconciliation Ceremony and ATSI Future Pathways Student Conference.

Since 2014, St Patrick's Marist has worked to provide funds to establish a Marist Nursery and Primary school in povertystricken Southern India. The school caters for those in the remote village of Vizhalamedu, about 40 minutes from the closest city, Tiruchirappalli. Each year the College holds a fundraiser that has so far raised enough money to complete the first stages of the school's development. This has opened up a new world of opportunity for children who had no way to receive a formal education. Each year the College sends a group of Year 11 students to visit and work at the school. This immersion experience is invaluable in opening the eyes of the young people to the plight of others less fortunate than themselves.

The College also has students who participate in World Youth Day, preparing for and undertaking the pilgrimage every three years that enables them to grow as Catholics on a world stage with other young people. And in 2017, a group of St Patrick's Marist students participated for the first time in a NASA-endorsed Space Camp in the United States, offering them a rich educational and cultural experience, and exposing students to opportunities on a global scale.

St Paul's promotes the core values of Respect, Responsibility, Results and Reverence. We aim to produce confident young men who are innovative, well-rounded and flexible decision makers prepared to make a difference in the world.

Emphasis is placed on diversity, inclusiveness, solidarity and fairness on both a local and global level. Indigenous immersion programs have provided students with the opportunity to gain a broad perspective of the world by challenging us to live everyday with value. St Paul's offers students the opportunity to be involved in overseas sporting and cultural tours. A cultural tour travelling to England, Scotland, Wales and Italy is scheduled for April 2018. Students studying Japanese in Year 9 and 10 are eligible to tour Japan, providing a cultural and linguistic experience while, in return, families host students from our sister school Waseda Junior High in Tokyo. Social justice tours to Cambodia assist communities with housing construction projects, and support teaching in classrooms, while developing awareness of some of the critical issues in developing countries.

In conjunction with Sydney University, students participate in 'Zero Robotics', an international educational program. Social media sites, such as Facebook and Twitter, encourage our community to communicate, connect and collaborate internationally to develop a broad global perspective. Some organisations the College is involved with include Our Big Kitchen, Bear Cottage, Starlight Foundation, Bushlink, Caritas and St Vincent de Paul. Fund raising projects enable students to broaden their understanding of the importance of developmental programs in poorer communities while enriching each boy's knowledge and understanding of the Gospel call to justice and the social teachings of the Catholic Church. As a College with an Edmund Rice Tradition, we see ourselves as part of a global movement of Catholic schools educating young men.



In our unique Potts Point location, our educational and social outreach builds upon this unique setting to provide our young women extensive opportunities that extend beyond our classrooms. At St Vincent's College, we foster creativity, discernment and leadership in the development of our students to be courageous women of action.

At the heart of our mission are the students in our care who we wish to empower to flourish in new and progressive ways. The core values of St Vincent's College, Generosity of Spirit. Hope, Respect, Justice and Service of the Poor, are lived out through the pastoral care of our students. Key to our approach is developing the whole person within a wellbeing framework. Students who are in a nurturing environment and are known and valued, thrive intellectually, emotionally and spiritually.

Education Excellence – We pride ourselves on knowing our students in a learning paradigm that is reflective and evaluative. The learning framework at St Vincent's College centres on informing students, with the essential knowledge and core skills of the 21st century, transforming students within a culture of right relationships, immersion into social justice experiences, practices of reflection and discernment, and empowering each student to be independent in thought, compassionate in attitude and confident to act.

Global Village

St Vincent's students and staff are outward looking and always finding ways to engage in local, national and international communities. In the classroom this happens through the topics chosen for study and the real world context of assessments. We use Google Classroom to creative collaborative spaces and reflective learning hubs. Students demonstrate innovation and business acumen through the development and management of Pop-up Market stalls (including a Coffee cart) and Sporting galas. Emerging technologies and coding are workshopped in collaboration with industry and other schools in order to prepare our students for an unpredictable future.

Social Justice is integral to all we do at the College and students in every year level engage in advocacy and fundraising for their assigned Charity or Aid organisation. Students participate in the wide variety of Social Justice experiences where they are encouraged to be outward looking and of service to others. Students are able to hone their advocacy skills in Caritas Christi, where regular discussions for reducing social inequalities in Australia and abroad are part of our fortnightly agenda.

At the end of Year 10, students prepare for Stage 6 learning by engaging in a Social Justice, Wellness and Learning immersion program called Parati. This enables students to be "women of the world" through conversation, service and reflection. In Year 11, students are invited to apply for a First Nation or Tanzania Immersion. These immersions provide students with an insight into a different culture and a language with which to advocate for change.

What Makes Us Special

We are proud of being a school that is unique in Sydney's Eastern suburbs for its genuinely inclusive community, authentic Catholic education, breadth of opportunities and innovative approach to educating boys. Since 1903, Waverley College has educated many eminent Australians in law, medicine, the military, sport and the arts.

Inclusiveness is one of our touchstones and we remain proudly non-selective. Nevertheless, roughly 80% of our Year 12 graduates go on to attend university.

Student care is supported by firm discipline and a proactive approach to managing bullying in all its forms. The thriving Old Boy network is also available to support and mentor current students and young graduates, as well as foster connections through the decades.

Educational diversity is our focus. With 39 HSC courses, the hardest part is choosing: from Engineering Studies to Food Technology and Vocational (VET) and Content Endorsed options, such as Construction, Visual Design, Photo, Video and Digital Imaging and Hospitality.

Waverley's Social Justice Program encourages even our youngest students to participate in outreach activities, and to develop a lifetime commitment to activism for the world's marginalised in the spirit of our founder Edmund Rice. This is a school with an important mission at its heart: to transform the minds and hearts of young Australians to build a more just, tolerant and inclusive community by educating for liberation and possibility.

Global Village

Inclusiveness is one of four touchstones for the Waverley College learning community, which encourages individuals to be accepting and welcoming, fostering right relationships and committed to the common good. This philosophy promotes social inclusion and views diversity as beneficial to a liberating education. The study of Spanish at Waverley encourages students to develop habits and learning skills that are useful across the curriculum. It particularly helps develop a deeper understanding of English and encourages students to develop habits of mind such as resilience and critical thinking, which are key to performing well at HSC level. Language teaching is supported by a range of cultural exposure opportunities including overseas immersion and cultural exchange. International tours are offered to students each year across a range of subject areas which have included music, commerce and history, as well as sport. In 2018/19 these will include a music tour to Europe, a STEM tour to NASA in the USA, a cricket tour and rugby tour to New Zealand. These tours provide an opportunity to extend study or sporting experience as well as gain an understanding of other cultures. Technology also connects Waverley students to other students around the world. Global collaboration in 2017 connected Year 5 students from Waverley College with students in Southern California, to study the gold rush in both countries. Social iustice immersion experiences include tours to Timor-Leste and Indigenous tours to Walgett, NSW and the Northern Territory. These experiences create a lasting legacy, with students often regarding their experience as a highlight of their time at school. The college acknowledges the traditional ownership of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and welcomes them into its community.


In 2015, Janaki joined a youth club formed by Caritas Australia partners, Caritas Nepal and the Ekata Foundation Surkhet, as part of the Children and Youth Empowerment Program (CYEP) which provides youth with job skills and income-generating projects. She took a loan from the youth club to purchase her first sewing machine.

Two years on, Janaki has 11 sewing machines and is running her own business, teaching others, and is considered a community role model.

"My confidence level has raised," Janaki says. "I appreciate all those respected peoples of Australia who are supporting this wise cause. Through their help, women who experience domestic violence and who are financially vulnerable are getting new hope in their life. I thank them from bottom of my heart."
