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
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












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The Global Village

We often hear the phrase 'the global village' used to describe today's world of rapid communications, easy and fast intercontinental travel, and ready access to a world of information. We understand it to mean that there has been a breaking down of the boundaries that used to divide and isolate the peoples of the world; the ease of international travel for the mass population and the introduction of the internet are probably the factors that most of us would say have contributed to the global village in which we live our lives today.

It probably comes as a surprise to students in our schools today that the concept of "the global village" is not an especially 21st century phenomenon; in fact, it's a phrase that had its origin almost 60 years ago.

The first person to predict that the world would 'shrink' in such a way as to become, in effect, a global village, was a Canadian philosopher and media theorist by the name of Marshall McLuhan. In his 1962 work, The Gutenberg Galaxy, he predicted that the world would soon enter a new age; an electronic age, when everyone would have access to the same information through technology. Although he didn't really understand exactly how it would come to fruition, McLuhan was predicting what we know today as the internet.

He believed that human history could be divided into four eras: the acoustic age; the literary age; the print age; and – the one which he believed would arrive in the

late 20th century – the electronic age, which he predicted would be characterised by a community of people brought together by technology. Sound familiar?

At the time that book was written, television was just beginning to take off in Australia. TV first came to Queensland in 1959. McLuhan saw this new medium as one which would, literally, bring the world into everyone's living room.

The world-wide web would not become a reality for another 30 years – and indeed, not until around a decade after McLuhan's death in 1980 – but he was able to predict what the internet would mean:

He theorised that the method of communication, rather than the information communicated, would become the most important aspect of this new electronic age.

His vision that "the computer as a research and communication instrument" would become central to our lives was proven correct over the next half-century. Today, we are surrounded by them, in our homes, our offices, our bedrooms, our pockets, and our schools, where the use of these learning tools is integrated across the curriculum.

They enable us to conduct rapid research into any and every subject imaginable; they allow us to do

It was in this book that the phrase "the global village" was first used.

In his next book, *Understanding Media*, which was published in 1964, McLuhan coined another phrase that was to become famous: "the medium is the message".

business with people on the other side of the world in an instant; they bring into our homes the horror of war and famine in lands a long way from our own.

The embrace of technology in our schools over the past 25 years

has been the greatest revolution in education since the introduction of the printing press (by the German inventor Johannes Gutenberg in the 15th century – whose name McLuhan appropriated for his own book some 500 years later).

The challenge is to teach our students how best to find, sift and discern the right information from the world of words, theories and sometimes shaky facts which present themselves whenever they open Google or Bing. From the earliest years of primary school, students in Catholic schools are guided through this potential minefield, being taught how to access information safely and evaluate it wisely. They are taught how to think, not what to think.

But the global village is more than just the world of electronic information. It also incorporates the 'international experience' that is available to students – interacting with young people from other countries and cultures, whether that be online, or by welcoming them as visitors to our schools, or by visiting them in their homelands. These valuable experiences bring people together by celebrating what we share in common, as well as what differentiates us.

The world of the 21st century for which we are educating our students demands that our schools adopt the practices and technologies which they will use in their adult lives. Like Marshall McLuhan in the mid-1900s, we need to be visionaries to provide our students with the very best start to their lives as citizens of the global village.

Catholic Education in the Global Village

The story of Catholic education in Australia dates back to the first decade of the 1800s, before Catholic priests were allowed in the fledgling colony. Lay women and men who had seen the power of forming young people

in the Faith began carrying on that tradition in their own homes. About 15 years later, the first of what we would today recognise as a Catholic school opened in Parramatta, starting a 200-year journey that has taken Catholic education to every corner of this country.

Australian Catholic schools were often established thanks to the generosity of lay people and run under the leadership of orders of religious women and men.

St Mary of the Cross MacKillop stands as a pioneer of Catholic education in our history, and especially in the history of educating disadvantaged children, girls and those in rural and regional Australia. Despite the ebbs and flows of government funding across two centuries, Catholic schools have always had a commitment to forming young people academically, physically, emotionally and spiritually.

As Pope Francis said back in 2014: "Education cannot be neutral. It is either positive or negative; either it enriches or it impoverishes; either it enables a person to grow or it lessens, even corrupts him. The mission of schools is to develop a sense of truth, of what is good and beautiful."

Catholic schools seek to imbue truth, goodness and beauty in each community in which they operate, including in the many new suburbs and towns where Catholic school systems are the first to take up the challenge of providing an education for children. It is not an overstatement to say that it's hard to imagine schooling in Australia without Catholic education.

One in six Australian schools is a Catholic school. In some remote parts of Western Australia and the Northern Territory, a Catholic school is the only school in the community. The impact of any Catholic school is significant; the impact of a Catholic school when it's the only school within a few hundred kilometres is immeasurable.

Each Catholic school across our nation is unique. Each has its set of individual strengths, as well as its particular challenges. But despite that school being a vibrant and dynamic and transformative unit, it's also part of a growing network of 1,740 Catholic schools that are forming young people to see themselves as truly part of something bigger than themselves.

Think of your local Catholic schools. Think of the outreach that takes place in support of the local, national and international community. Those schools are forming young people into citizens who have a sense of justice and a sense of service – citizens that know that life isn't all about "me", but about being part of a global village to which we can all contribute.

Think of how local schools are forming young people in that way. Now multiply that effort by 1,740 and you'll get a sense of the difference Catholic schools are making in this country – and in our world.



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

ACU and The Global Village

This momentum is exemplified by the National School of Arts at ACU. where world-class researchers come together with award-winning teachers to provide an exceptional educational experience for students that sets them up for life. In 2017, ACU was ranked in the top 2-3% of universities for Arts and Humanities worldwide. This achievement is evidence of the University's growing reputation for excellence in a range of disciplines, most notably History, Politics, International Relations, Sociology and Literature. At ACU, the future of Arts looks very bright indeed.

This success notwithstanding, doubts persist in some quarters about the value of studying the Arts, **Humanities and Social Sciences** at university. Historically, students who expressed an interest in doing a BA were asked why, the assumption being that it was an indulgent pursuit that wouldn't lead to a clearly-defined job. While old attitudes die hard, the world has changed almost beyond recognition. In today's 'global village', where core human values will shape the tide of technological innovation, the old stereotypes about Arts look woefully outdated.

The evidence for the 'real world' value of Arts is compelling. In Australia today, Arts graduates

have lower unemployment than the national rate and higher mid-career salaries than Science graduates. But they are also thriving internationally, with qualities that are highly prized by global employers in the workforce of the twenty-first century. Who would have thought that 60% of industry leaders in the United Kingdom had completed a Humanities, Social Sciences or Arts degree at university?

Consider this too. Young people today will experience about seven career changes in their lives. This means that a vocational degree – leading to one clearly-defined job – may no longer be the most practical choice for students. When government or industry signals that they are on the lookout for well-rounded graduates who can apply their skills in new ways to meet new challenges, this should be music to the ears of prospective Arts students because this is the greatest strength of Arts graduates.

The best thing about Arts graduates is they keep on learning. They understand context, communicate clearly and respond well to change. They are also outward looking, equipped to engage with diverse cultural perspectives, locally and globally. In a modern job market that values flexibility and diversity above all else, Arts graduates stand out as both 'work ready' and 'world ready'. It is not surprising that so many people who have carved out successful careers in law, politics, journalism, business, government, education and the creative industries have studied the Humanities and Social Sciences at university.

But what makes Arts at ACU so special? Why might students choose to study with us? Some will no doubt be attracted by our rising profile – the fact that we have been recognised for excellence in international rankings. Others will be drawn to our student-centred learning environment - an environment characterised by small class sizes, flexible pathways through our degrees and engaging teaching staff who know their students' names, provide personalised learning support and celebrate their students' successes. For still others the key appeal will be our graduate outcomes - our reputation for producing exceptional graduates who engage the world with confidence and purpose.

In Arts at ACU, the world is our

classroom. We recognise that the modern workforce requires globallyfocused citizens who understand different worldviews, are crossculturally competent and empathise with the life experiences of different peoples. In addition to an engaging curriculum informed by contemporary international issues, we offer our students rich opportunities to further their studies overseas. From semester-long exchanges with one of our 90 international partner universities, to intensive units of study taught by ACU staff in locations such as New York, Rome, London, Venice and Beijing, 200 Arts students at ACU have benefited from international learning experiences over the past year. These students have discovered that studying overseas is a transformative learning experience that builds their confidence, broadens their perspectives and gives them an edge in the global job market.

While becoming 'work ready' is a key outcome of studying Arts at ACU, developing socially aware and ethically-minded graduates who aspire to use their knowledge and skills in the service of others is at the core of what we do. Students in the School of Arts are encouraged to recognise and help ameliorate disadvantage in local and global contexts. For example, in our core second-year community engagement unit, we encourage students to see how urgent 'global problems'. such as poverty, exist in our own communities. This year students in this unit have participated in the Big Idea Competition - 'Australia's leading social enterprise immersion and competition for university students'. There, they have had the opportunity to apply the research, critical thinking and problem-solving skills developed in their Bachelor of Arts degree to come up with actual solutions to real-world problems. This is precisely the kind of 'hands-on' experience that future employers will be looking for.

ACU's National School of Arts is gearing up for an exciting few years ahead. Our offerings are expanding to include innovative new degrees in diverse areas, including global politics and creative practice; we have study tours planned for Rome and New York; and we are welcoming a large number of new teaching staff who will further enrich our expertise in history, politics and international relations, and sociology.

Our School is a lively intellectual community for students who wish to engage with pressing global issues and who aspire to make the world a better place.

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Parents as First Educators in the Global Village

The history of Catholic School Parents Australia (CSPA) is relatively short however the story of parents and Catholic education in Australia goes back nearly 200 years to 1820 with the opening of the first Catholic school in Parramatta. Formed in late 2013, CSPA has quickly established itself as the national body for parents-carers with children in the 1740 Catholic schools across Australia. Now, more so than ever, it takes the whole global village to educate the child, and with great pride and responsibility parents are 'the first and most important educators of their own children' (Pope John Paul II, 1994).

Driven by our core values of *Integrity,* Respect, Faith and *Inclusivity*, CSPA supports and celebrates the holistic education (cognitive, social, physical, ethical and spiritual) offered to students in Catholic schools.

What does CSPA do?

Catholic School Parents Australia:

- Advocates for families with children and young people in Australian Catholic schools;
- · Represents these families to

education authorities such as NCEC and ACARA and governments;

- Supports and provides national leadership to the State and Territory parent bodies working with Catholic schools;
- Works with such agencies as the Australian government and the Australian Research Alliance for Children and Youth (ARACY) to support, explore and promote Parent Engagement as an influence on student learning; and
- Collaborates with the National Catholic Education Commission (NCEC) in all matters pertaining to parents as partners in Catholic education.

Currently, a key undertaking of CSPA is the exploration of Parent Engagement practices in schools across all school sectors nationwide. Working in partnership with the University of Southern Queensland (USQ) and ARACY, CSPA has used funding from the Australian Government's Department of Education and Training (DET) to survey and interview principals and interview parents about Parent

Engagement. A key outcome of this research will be, during 2018, the generation of tool kits outlining for principals, teachers and parents – carers, contemporary Parent Engagement strategies that enhance student learning and well-being.

CSPA is keen to get this right as respected research has shown that when parents engage in their children's learning, they develop a stronger belief in education (Pushor, 2007) and their children are likely to:

- · achieve higher grades;
- · stay at school longer;
- develop better social skills:
- have improved behaviour;
- · graduate successfully; and
- transition to post-secondary education.

(Emerson, Fear, Fox and Sanders, 2012).

If undertaken effectively, Parent Engagement can be a cost effective way for not only a parent – carer to improve their child's learning and well-being, but also for the globally connected village of Australia to assist their students in stepping up to another level of performance.



Tony O'Byrne is the inaugural Chair of CSPA, a position he has held since 2013. Tony was principal of Aquinas College at Ringwood for 25 years up until 2013. Tony's three children were educated in Catholic schools and he currently works for Melbourne Catholic Education.

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Hidden Costs of Education

■ ave you started savings for your child's education? Understanding the total cost of education might give you a reason to. When it comes to planning your child's education, there are several factors most families consider, from the quality of the education, range of subject options, academic achievement, school values and ethos, and family tradition. And, although cost may not be the number one factor when making this important decision, research by ASG¹ suggests that the estimated total cost of a Catholic education² has risen by 57 per cent in the last decade, which makes cost a growing consideration for many families. Information from the Australian Bureau of Statistics also indicates that the cost of education across all sectors has risen by 64 per cent over the past 10 years, which is more than double the increase in inflation.3

Luckily, finding out the fees and levies associated with a particular school, and comparing schools across a range of criteria is relatively easy to do, especially with resources such as Catholic Schools Guide.

What some parents fail to consider however are the additional costs associated with education that sometimes go unrecognised until their children actually start school.

Research conducted by ASG1, an education savings and scholarship benefit fund provider in Australia, illustrates that costs such as uniforms, books, extracurricular activities, technology and excursions or school trips in 2017 can actually represent 27 per cent of the total costs for a child attending a Catholic secondary school in metropolitan Australia. Families planning on sending their child born in 2017 through a Catholic education could face additional costs of close to \$50,000 over 13 years.

ASG CEO John Velegrinis says Australians are fortunate to have excellent government, systemic and private schools to choose from, but costs can spiral out of control. "We advocate parents use a disciplined approach by putting a little bit away each week so they can financially afford to meet their children's educational goals and aspirations."



Independent statistician and Managing Director of foreseechange Charlie Nelson says a range of economic factors influence the cost of education. "Employment growth, hourly wages and inflation all impact the cost of living, which puts extra strain on the family budget. With school fees likely to rise further, it has never been more important for parents to financially plan for their child's future."

Careful planning and budgeting now can of course help families ensure there are no surprises during the first year of school.

ASG provides a cost and savings calculator on their website— www.asg.com.au which can help you understand the various estimated costs associated with the different types and stages of education, which may help you with your planning.

Consider these hidden cost tips when planning your child's education



Find out what uniform costs are now and likely to be when your child starts school

- Uniforms can be expensive, and will most likely need to be updated as your child grows up.
- Ask the school about uniform costs and find out if there is a second-hand uniform store.
- You may also want to find out if the school is looking to update or change uniforms in the near future.



Get a feel for current book, technology and stationery costs

 Find out what the average book list cost is at each year level to see what the likely costs could be when your child starts school.



Find out if there are additional levies during the school period

 It might be worthwhile confirming with the school if they are planning on any additional levies to cover things like buildings or refurbishment over the coming years.



Find out whether or not all trips and excursions are included in the school fees and levies

 Confirm with the school the policies around school trips and excursions and if these costs are included in the annual fee schedule.



Find out if here are any special activities, such as exchanges or overseas trips, that your child may want to attend

Cultural and language exchanges or excursions are great opportunities
for students to learn and experience new cultures and countries.
If you think you'd like your child to participate in these types of
experiences, it might be worthwhile finding out from the school when
and how much these types of trips or experiences cost to ensure that
you can plan for these additional costs as they come up.



Understand whether there are costs for things like school band or sporting equipment

 Participating in school music or sporting programs can also mean additional costs for purchasing or renting instruments or equipment.
 These costs can vary, and if your child participates in a number of activities, they can add up quickly.

Principal faith to life

Bringing faith to life

ost of us wouldn't know much about the Central African Republic. A landlocked country in the middle of Africa, it is home to around 4.6 million people. Despite being the site of ongoing conflict between Christian and Muslim militias in recent years, it is rarely featured in our news here in Australia.

But in 2015, the Central African Republic did make the news – and not for another outbreak of violence. In November that year, Pope Francis launched the Catholic Church's Year of Mercy in Bangui, the country's capital. Opening the Holy Door of the Cathedral in front of a crowd of onlookers, the Pope declared that the city was, that day, 'the spiritual capital of the world'.

Traditionally, only churches in Rome have had Holy Doors. They are generally designated during jubilee years so that pilgrims may walk through them to receive the plenary indulgences that are available to them during those celebrations. The Year of Mercy was the first time a Pope had allowed Holy Doors to be designated in other dioceses. The Central African Republic, which few could even find on a map, was the first place where a Door of Mercy was opened.

Pope Francis has spoken about what he terms the 'globalisation of indifference', which often arises as a defence mechanism when people are confronted with the overwhelming difficulties facing people around the world. It's difficult not to despair at the endless stories of violence and conflict in our media. Sometimes we can feel like the only option is to turn off, to focus on the immediate needs of ourselves and those closest to us.

But, in his travels and in his speeches, Pope Francis puts forward an alternative approach – one that doesn't just focus on our own needs and goals, but sees each of us as part of a different type of global community.

"To the modern concept of the intellectual working for the realisation of self and in search of personal recognition, it is necessary to counter with a model built on solidarity, which works for the common good and for peace', he told a group of international students last year. 'In this way, young people are formed who thirst for truth and not power, ready to defend their values and live mercy and charity, which are the fundamental pillars for a healthier society."

There is an enormous blessing that comes from being part of a globalised Church. It allows us to experience a solidarity with Christian communities in places like the Central African Republic that have been torn apart by conflict. Organisations like Caritas and Catholic Mission offer a way for Catholic schools to contribute in a meaningful way to the lives of people in those communities. Students might even go on immersion trips where they connect with Catholic communities in developing countries.

Catholic communities here in Australia are also enriched by being part of a globalised Church. Many parishes welcome priests from overseas, and host regular liturgies for migrant groups. Our Catholic schools attract families from different backgrounds, many of whom first connected with the Church in countries a long way from Australia. They trust that the values that they were raised with will also be passed on to their children because our Church is a universal one.

Once you start to see yourself as part of a worldwide community of people with the same values and interests, other barriers also start to fall down. While he was in the Central African Republic, Pope Francis made a visit to a mosque that had been besieged by Christian militias.

"Christians and Muslims are brothers and sisters", he said to the men gathered inside. "Together we must say no to hatred, to revenge and to violence, particularly that violence which is perpetrated in the name of a religion or of God himself. God is peace. Salaam."

While globalisation has many detractors, there are in reality two types of globalisation – that which creates inequality and conflict, pushing people apart; and that which creates peace

and prosperity, turning people into brothers and sisters.

Under the leadership of Pope Francis, the Catholic Church is becoming more of a beacon to those who look for that latter type of globalisation, where the concerns of those at the forgotten margins of our world are the centre of attention for the global community.

As Jesuit priest Fr David Holdcroft recent wrote in Eureka Street, "Francis' approach was not primarily theological; it was in the first place pastoral and active. It was to travel and place himself at the centre of people's lived experience, withholding moral judgement, but helping its participants to situate their experience – and suffering – within a larger narrative and analysis."

Fr Holdcroft points to Pope Francis' homily on the island of Lampedusa, the landing place of many boat migrants attempting to find passage to Europe, and where it's impossible to forget the many who perished trying to make the journey.

"The culture of comfort, which makes us think only of ourselves, makes us insensitive to the cries of other people, makes us live in soap bubbles which, however lovely, are insubstantial', said Pope Francis. 'In this globalized world, we have fallen into globalized indifference. We have become used to the suffering of others: it doesn't affect me; it doesn't concern me; it's none of my business!"

He continued, "Let us ask the Lord for the grace to weep over our indifference, to weep over the cruelty of our world, of our own hearts, and of all those who in anonymity make social and economic decisions which open the door to tragic situations like this."

In a sense, what Pope Francis has done is made the peripheries the heart of our Church. With Pope Francis, the heart of our Church is no longer Rome. The heart is wherever the lost and abandoned congregate, wherever the desperate cry out for help, wherever victims seek shelter. The heart of a globalised Church is at the margins – the same place that Jesus lived.





Global Village

At Chisholm Catholic College, we recognise that the world is now a very small place. We teach Spanish and Japanese at the College. There are over 500 million native speakers of Spanish. Learning this language allows students to connect in the world in which they live. Learning Japanese, on the other hand, challenges students. It is considered one of the difficult languages as it has its own lettering system, which means students have to think differently to master it. The Japanese culture and customs also broaden students' ways of thinking and looking at the world. Japanese opens doors to careers of the future, because theirs is such a technologically advanced society. We have a sister city, Hirakata, in Japan and we have a student exchange every two years. We are planning the same thing for Spanish and anticipate our first exchange will be in 2018.

Our Liberation Letters project works with refugees to assist them to learn to read and also to apply for jobs by writing letters of introduction for them. Students gain as much as do those they assist, as they share stories of their lives. These stories make the world outside Australia real, while emphasising their responsibility to be people of justice and service to those in the wider world.

We have a strong Indigenous Education program, from participating in the Garma festival to learning about all the edible plants and bush tucker on our own campus. At Chisholm, we see our students as the signature of our College. They are the evidence of an excellent and relevant suite of educational opportunities that draw the world closer to them and allow them to interact with other global villagers on a regular basis.

Each July, we have the privilege of welcoming a group of Japanese students to our community. These students stay with host families and gain a better understanding of the Australian lifestyle. Students are able to immerse themselves into College life, establish relationships with our students and visit the local sights. Both schools continue to communicate via email and Skype after the immersion program so students can continue to develop their skills in both countries. The exchange of information is extremely important for the students' growth and development.



Global Village

We have a very culturally diverse student cohort, so Harmony Day celebrations are significant for our community, creating an opportunity for better understanding and tolerance through a range of activities and events that provide our students with more awareness of the cultural backgrounds of their peers. NAIDOC week is celebrated annually, and often includes indigenous guest speakers and entertainers.

Students from Years 7 – 12 can study Mandarin Chinese. Those undertaking the study of this subject in senior years have the opportunity to participate in a cultural and language immersion tour to China, improving their language skills and understanding of the culture. There is an annual Chinese Immersion Day which is jointly organised by participating schools in the region, as well as the challenge of a Chinese speaking competition. Each year we host a large group of students from Macau for three weeks and these students 'buddy' with one of our students to attend some classes during their time here. This cultural exchange provides further opportunities for cultural understanding.

Our 1:1 laptop program and high speed internet connectivity in all buildings enable our teachers and students to connect guickly and easily to a variety of online resources both locally and globally, to enhance the classroom learning experiences for our students.

At St Benedict's College, we have students who excel in their chosen discipline of sport and compete at international level. These students are acknowledged and encouraged, with support for school work provided for times spent competing overseas.

Global Village

Our students have the opportunity to take up many challenges. As a school in the Edmund Rice tradition, we are committed to developing relationships with communities all over the world through the process of immersions. Students have the opportunity to participate in the following programs:

- China exchange where students spend three weeks in China attending South West Weiyu middle school in Shanghai. as well as immersing themselves in Chinese culture.
- Timor Immersion in this immersion students and teachers travel to Timor Leste to assist in building preschools and completing ongoing general renovation work to community buildings.
- Samoa Immersion groups travel to Samoa and work in local villages in Samoa: Viasala, Samusu, Amaile and Solosolo providing school and medical centre resources. as well as assisting as teacher aides in a special school.
- India Immersion this experience allows students to witness the great works of the trainee priests in Lungai, Sister Magdalene Peter and all the Handmaidens of Mary who work with the 'Untouchables' in Rajganpur, and to work with the differently-abled children at Vikas Deepti who are being cared for by the Missionaries of the Divine Word and Good Samaritan sisters.

Immersions can provide a powerful experience for those involved and have the potential to transform participants. Encouragingly, many of our students apply for these programs taking the opportunity to look beyond the school grounds. step out of their comfort zone and learn firsthand in an environment beyond their previous experience.


Global Village

The influx of many refugee families from war-ravaged countries across the world has seen the College adapt itself to the needs of these vulnerable young men and women. St James is committed to providing a place of safety and care. The opportunity for students to engage in immersion experiences is an important part of their education. The College conducts an immersion to Cambodia, where students learn about cultural and historical aspects of Cambodia, while also immersing themselves in village life and engaging with children in local schools.

What Makes Us Special

For over 140 years, St Joseph's College, Gregory Terrace, has established itself as a community focused on faith-centred holistic development, the pursuit of academic excellence and the creation of an atmosphere of care for young men in Years 5 to 12. The College draws on its philosophies from our Catholic and Edmund Rice traditions to foster the Terrace Family. The College operates across four campuses and offers state of the art facilities from its main campus in Spring Hill, including the Year 10 initiative Waterford Place, through to its 10 hectares of Sporting fields at Tennyson and the Outdoor Education Centre at Maroon Dam. Superb facilities and an innovative school structure reflect the College's commitment to honouring tradition, whilst staying at the forefront of planning and research into boys' education.

Academic support is provided through the tracking of student performance from entry to exit. In 2016, 31 Senior students achieved an OP 1, with the median of the College an OP 5. Over half of the cohort received an OP 1-5. Terrace Gentlemen are supported to embrace a love of learning, to be critical thinkers and problem solvers, and to use their gifts and opportunities to make a positive difference in society. The College facilitates an award-winning, comprehensive and inclusive co-curricular program. The range of sporting and cultural activities promote teamwork, a sense of fair play, personal excellence and humility. A House system, comprised of nine Houses, provides the basis for pastoral care and formation at the College, with students from Years 5 to 12 divided into Tutor Groups within each House. The Terrace Family values and nurtures each student on their journey to be a young man of knowledge, humility and wisdom.

Terrace Gentlemen are educated to appreciate the contribution that they make to building the values of a world community. The study of both French and Japanese provides all students with critical multicultural understandings. Classroom-based language studies are enhanced through vibrant exchange and tour opportunities to both France and Japan. Students in Year 10 engage in a comprehensive three-week immersion program. which allows them to stand in solidarity with the marginalised in remote areas and developing countries, such as Timor-Leste, India, Fiji and Cape York.

St Joseph's prioritises inclusion through a commitment to campaigns, such as Close the Gap and working with Friendship Groups, including the Gregory Terrace Old Boy founded Orange Sky Laundry. A dedicated bursary program financially supports placement of Indigenous and refugee students who would otherwise not be able to experience a Terrace education.

Technology is harnessed by staff and students to connect and journey with others across the globe. A Beyond Borders program affords the wider Terrace Family with the opportunity to meaningfully engage with communities abroad, immersing in others' realities and striving to make justice, peace and human rights a global reality. Further to the work of students in Timor-Leste, a dedicated parent group maintains a thriving Timor-Leste coffee and hand-made card business to help support long term economic independence in the region. St Joseph's College aims to form Terrace Gentleman as leaders capable of inspiring communities to undertake our global vision for a better world.



Global Village

As one of 200 Sacred Heart Schools world-wide, Stuartholme School has a long history of being part of a Global Village. A globally competent student is aware. curious, and interested in learning about the world and how it works. Their education allows them to gain an in-depth knowledge and understanding of international issues, develop their capacity to recognise another person's perspective and communicate ideas across diverse linguistic and cultural backgrounds.

On a local level, Stuartholme students have the opportunity to engage with students from nearby schools who have a high percentage of students from immigrant and refugee backgrounds as part of a weekly Homework Club. While providing academic support, students from both schools get to know one another, share stories and learn about different cultures.

On a national and international level, students can take part in a number of immersion programs where they have the opportunity to visit regions and countries and spend time with the local community. Whilst the programs often include a construction project, the key objective is to allow students the opportunity to build relationships with the community so that they may value the differences of people, language and cultures, and deepen their respect, appreciation and intercultural sensitivity. Through offering these opportunities and developing students' knowledge and skills. Stuartholme girls are empowered to make a profound difference to the communities they come from and to the wider world.



Growing up in a world of poverty and disadvantage, coupled with a forced marriage at the age of twelve, she was in a very vulnerable position. Even more so when her husband died just two years into their marriage. She's now running her own successful sewing business and has become an inspirational community leader.

In 2015, Janaki joined a youth club formed by Caritas Australia partners, Caritas Nepal and the Ekata Foundation Surkhet, as part of the Children and Youth Empowerment Program (CYEP) which provides youth with job skills and income-generating projects. She took a loan from the youth club to purchase her first sewing machine.

Two years on, Janaki has 11 sewing machines and is running her own business, teaching others, and is considered a community role model.

"My confidence level has raised," Janaki says. "I appreciate all those respected peoples of Australia who are supporting this wise cause. Through their help, women who experience domestic violence and who are financially vulnerable are getting new hope in their life. I thank them from bottom of my heart."
