Learning to Care for our Common Home

We are living through times of rapid change.

Today we are experiencing increasing uncertainty and facing not just one but many crises – ecological, social, economic and in the Australian Church.

We all know that humanity is living in a way that is unsustainable on the planet. Just looking around at the plastics, the chemicals, the pollution of our waterways and atmosphere, our daily consumption of fossil fuels and the many human systems that we have created that serve ourselves rather than benefiting the common good.

So what are we going to do about it?

On June 18th 2015, Pope Francis issued his encyclical, Laudato Si' - On Care for our Common Home. His leadership message is clear: we need to stop and reflect, to see the deep interconnections between everything and work together through dialogue and action. We are being invited to respond with the common good in mind, love in our hearts and a commitment to act in a way that respects all that surrounds us.

What does this message mean for us today?

Its release was an historic event, as Pope Francis issued a powerful message about our moral responsibility to care for creation. On Care for Our Common Home (Laudato Si') is a very strong appeal from Pope Francis addressed to "every living person on this planet" for an inclusive dialogue about how we are shaping the future of our planet.

Pope Francis calls the Church and the world to acknowledge the urgency of the challenges we face and to join him in embarking on a new path where we develop an integral ecology – inclusive of the social, economic, cultural, spiritual and ecological.

This encyclical means that caring for creation is forever part of Catholic Social Teaching and permanently core business for Catholic organisations and their people.

So what is this new path we are being called to take together?

Dialogue is the resounding first step. We are being invited to open our minds, our hearts and our will to tune in and discover with curiosity firstly, and then more intimately, to the details of where we live. For our children this may be easy, so we can take our lead from them. Awe and wonder open us up to feelings and experiences that Pope Francis says we need to have in order to work out what to do about the problems we face. "To dare to turn what is happening in our world into our own personal suffering, so that each of us can determine what to do about it."

Pope Francis reminds us that our common home is a gift – and that our first response to that gift needs to be thank you! Beyond that we are being invited to enter into relationship with everything around us.

So how are we going to transition to a life giving path for all Creation (including ourselves, of course!)?

Well, the first thing we need to do is to see that we are not separate from everything around us. Paying

attention to the connections between everything is the key. Our journey on Earth is an exploration of place as much as it is an inner journey of our hearts and minds. So, cultivating our inner life and our outer life through meaningful action is the balancing act we need to strive for, understanding that we have a part to play through our simple daily actions.

Beyond the day to day activities of individuals what can our organisations and schools do to really make this change?

We all need help to make the change and our organisations need more than a champion model to embed sustainability. Jesus is the best model for us to look to when seeking help for this change.

Recognising how our Christian spirituality is connected with sustainability through exploring Laudato Si' is an invitation for all Catholic organisations. The new theology contained in Laudato Si' includes the intrinsic value of every living and non living thing, understanding that every part of Creation is revealing God to us in every moment and coming to realise that we are called to be in a state of 'sublime communion' – when we are in right relationship with our maker, the human family and all creation.

Everyone is looking to the next generation with hope and Catholic schools are in the best possible position to offer ecological education and spiritual formation.

Understanding our deepest motivations and how the spirituality

of each place is longing to be shared is central to the story. Schools are working hard to embed sustainable practice.

There are plenty of examples of initiatives, such as gardens, recycling, units of work that integrate ecological thinking and student outcomes, prayers and liturgies. Integrating the ecological and spiritual is the critical work ahead, and every member of each school community has a unique contribution to make.

Catholic Earthcare Australia has developed a model and a suite of resources that takes organisations, such as schools, on a sustainable journey – and its called ASSISI. It's all about developing 'Learning Communities for Sustainability'.

Growing the capacity for communities of practice to learn how to become sustainable together is where dialogue, formation and steering groups come in to play, developing the social skills to enquire together and think through the best way forward in each unique bioregion of Australia. The name ASSISI comes from the principles we used in designing a model that is sustainable in itself – A Strategic, Systems-based, Integrated, Sustainability Initiative.

The call for a change of mind and heart, reflected in action is the work of Catholic Earthcare Australia. And it's not just personal ecological conversion we're here for, it's the institutional change required that now deserves our collective and urgent attention.



Jacqui Rémond is National Director of Catholic Earthcare Australia, the ecological agency of the Catholic Church in Australia. Jacqui has spent many years developing partnerships and ecological conversion programs to enable the Catholic Church in Australia to better care for God's Creation through advocacy, education, research and collaboration. Two key initiatives are the National Energy Efficiency Network (NEEN) and A Strategic Systems-based Integrated Sustainability Initiative (ASSISI).

Jacqui is currently the Convener of the National Council of Churches Australia Eco Mission Project, the NSW Eco Mission Network, one of the founding members and on the steering committee of the Global Catholic Climate Movement, and a member of the Australian Education Sustainability Alliance and the Justice and Peace Advisory Council in Sydney.

With a long history in environmental advocacy, Jacqui has previously worked as the Coordinator of the Northern Australia Environment Alliance and served as Chair of Environs Kimberley. In 2006, Jacqui undertook training with Al Gore to become a 'Climate Change Leader'. This led to her involvement in 'The Big Switch' campaign and her organising the first 'Walk Against Warming' in the Kimberley. Today, Jacqui is a mentor to a group of retired academics in Al Gore's Climate Reality Project.



Australian Catholic University Embraces Laudato Si'

A ustralian Catholic University (ACU) is proud to recognise its longstanding responsibility to embrace the natural environment,

and practicing sustainability is directly related to the Catholic Mission of our university.

Pope Francis observes in his encyclical, *Laudato Si' – Caring for our Common Home*, "how inseparable the bond is between concern for nature, justice for the poor, commitment to society and interior peace".

ACU has worked steadily to transform the way it operates in order to lighten its environmental impact through gains in energy efficiency, water conservation, and waste recycling.

There have been some significant achievements: in 2014 and 2015, ACU was Australia's most energy-efficient university and one of its most efficient water users.

It has a recycling rate of above 40 per cent, up from barely 15 per cent four years ago.

The major source of the University's environmental impacts is its many buildings, and ACU has invested strategically and ethically in sustainable renovations,

refurbishment and new-building construction.

Its Melbourne Campus is home to the Daniel Mannix Building, which obtained six stars under the Green Star rating system, indicating world-leading sustainable design and construction.

ACU's operational sustainability program has positioned the University well to meet the increasingly urgent demands made of organisations in all sectors for stronger sustainability leadership, and to grasp the many emerging opportunities to display it.

Those demands have emerged from many sources, including the moral imperative stated in Laudato Si', from the expectations of our students, alumni and staff, from the wider Catholic community, and from sound financial drivers for efficiency and resilience.

The opportunities are many: they include smart energy and building technologies; clever use of videoconference technologies to remotely connect our people across our dispersed campuses; paperless administration and assignments; better building management; and enabling and empowering our community of students and staff to take more action daily to help ACU reach its sustainability targets.

ACU is now planning in detail how it can expand its sustainability program to meet these new challenges. For our students and staff, the day to day experience of sustainability is subtle, because so much of our sustainability work has been prosaic and out-of-sight: it's in the built form of our campuses, in the operation of our heating and cooling systems, in the digitisation of our buildings, and in our lights, taps, toilets, showers and water tanks (all 550,000 litres of them).

Over the next several years, those initiatives will continue apace, but inspired by Laudato Si' and its commitment to the common good, ACU will elevate its practice of mission-based sustainability so that it becomes a normal, positive part of the daily experience of campus life, and will contribute to ACU's strong record in preparing its graduates to create a better world.



Making The University Experience More Than Just a Certificate

they continue their studies and work towards a career.

Australian Catholic University (ACU) has invested significant time, thinking and funds into the improvement of the overall student experience. A whole range of strategic projects, including the Learning for Life framework, have been specifically targeted at responding to the demands of our students for a

better learning experience at ACU. Our student engagement programs provide a co-curricular experience building social contacts, skills and employability. For the University it was validation of the significant commitment to this program to achieve such outstanding results in the Quality Indicators in Learning and Teaching 2015 Student Engagement Survey (SES).

We saw the Overall Experience Satisfaction of ACU students increase to 83.4% – well above the industry average of 80%. Within the survey we saw how the University's focus on quality teaching in a modern learning environment had resonated with our students, with satisfaction rates reaching:

 86% for Skills Development compared to the national average of 81%

- 67% for Learner Engagement compared to the national average of 60%
- 84% for Teaching Quality compared to the national average of 82%
- 75% for Student Support compared to the national average of 72%
- 88% for Learning Resources compared to the national average of 86%

The faculties, through Learning for Life, provide input into the key learning and teaching areas of curriculum design, the increased use of technology to enhance learning, and the provision of significantly improved physical learning and teaching spaces. The aim is always to ensure that our students receive the most engaged and engaging learning and teaching experience, irrespective of the mode of delivery and that our graduates

are job-ready to further develop in their professional lives. Programs such as Learning for Life are driven by, and centred on, students. As a university, we pride ourselves on building strong relationships with our students, extending to their aspirations for a university that provides them with the best opportunity to cause change in the world. We look to develop and empower our students' entrepreneurial skills, with many putting these skills into practice to create their own NGOs and community organisations, becoming job creators with a focus on the community around them.

This is what excites us and motivates the University to continue to focus on delivering our teaching for the modern university student in ways that engage and grow their appetite to learn. To do this, we need teachers with a passion to innovate. This was solidified at the Australian Awards for University Teaching (AAUT) Citations for Outstanding Contributions to Student Learning, with Faculty of Education and Arts academics Dr Catherine Bell and Dr Cathie Harrison, along with Mr Anthony Whitty from the Faculty of Health Sciences, recognised for their creativity and innovation in learning and teaching.

For ACU these results are recognition of what we have been able to achieve in a short time, but like our students, we are not settling for the status quo.

The University will continue to listen to our students to make sure our courses and programs engage and enable their aspirations.



What Makes Us Special

As the only school founded by the Dominican Friars in Australia, Blackfriars Priory School remains faithful to the search for Truth (Veritas) as lived and taught over the last 800 years by the Order of Preachers (Dominicans), and exemplified by Saint Dominic, our Founder, and Saint Albert the Great, our Patron. The Blackfriars curriculum across all school years is based on the Australian Curriculum and Specialises in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) and Entrepreneurship. Our curriculum engages students across ELC to Year 12 addressing the learning needs of girls in the ELC and boys throughout their schooling. To complement our rigorous academic studies students are extended and challenged further through diverse and enriching programs outside the classrooms.

Blackfriars has established a multitude of holistic personal development opportunities embedded in the curriculum including outdoor challenges to Kangaroo Island and Kuitpo Forest, father son camps, mentor days, student exchanges, retreats, elective programs and international study tours. A thriving teaching and learning environment is built on meaningful and purposeful relationships with each student. Through observation and assessment, our teachers identify each student's natural areas of interest and excellence before developing an individual learning plan. Each plan then incorporates kinaesthetic (or "hands-on") and visual learning experiences that appeal to the different learning needs of each student and concurrently develop their confidence in achieving personally-determined goals. These are skills that enable a well-rounded education, enduring friendships, happy memories and the confidence to participate fully in life. These are the skills of a Blackfriars' student.

Environment and Sustainability

As a focus of the Australian Curriculum, Environmental Sustainability is incorporated throughout the curriculum at Blackfriars Priory School. At Blackfriars we aim to develop our students with the values and motivation to increase their knowledge on sustainability issues and take action.

Recently, Blackfriars students turned a rocky garden bed into a flourishing piece of land sprouting edible indigenous plants as part of an ongoing school-wide conversion to ecological sustainability.

The "sacred garden" includes vegetables, fruit trees and indigenous plants. The Indigenous Focus Group were responsible for selecting the indigenous plants and trees to be included. Meanwhile Year 12 students played an integral part in the design and construction of the project as part of the Religious Education curriculum. The garden has given students a hands-on education in environmental care and permaculture. Students have been able to learn that we are all connected now and forever to God's creation.

Students from the Early Learning Centre through to Year 12, have been involved in planting the garden beds, harvesting and eating the produce.

Further plans are in place to install more student garden areas in the Primary School, which will include organic recycling and a worm farm. Around the school, Blackfriars has an extensive recycling program including paper, plastics and toner cartridges, while large underground rain water tanks supply irrigation to the back oval and gardens.

In collaboration with the Adelaide Botanic Gardens, students are helping to preserve endangered native plants through the SEEDS (Stewardship of Endangered Endemic Species) project. CBC students are tasked with propagating rare plants from seeds to maturity and returning the new seeds to the Botanic Gardens. Even the state-of-the-art Junior Campus has been designed to incorporate large open spaces best suited for boys' learning with excellent sunlit rooms, automatic LED lighting and even the beautiful floorboards from the old school was recycled into the outstanding ceilings of the chapel.

Environment and Sustainability

Gleeson College is committed to involving students and staff in opportunities to learn about, and move towards, ecological conversion. As a community we are committed to reducing our carbon footprint. In 2016, staff engaged with Pope Francis' encyclical, 'Laudato Si' to inform and inspire our work educating youth about the importance of traditional custodianship, as well as their personal role in both stewardship of our land and just resource utilisation for the future.

Students learn about human interactions with, and exploitation of, our natural environment and investigate possible solutions. Students are involved in planting gardens and learning through themes such as ecosystems and the processes for our food to come from 'paddock to plate'. Displacement of people from their homes and environment on a global scale is addressed in a range of College Social Justice activities, Liturgies and Masses.

On a practical level, Gleeson College utilises solar power options, timers on lighting and air-conditioning, a subsurface monitored watering system and have installed 4-bin systems for sorting of waste. What Makes Us Special

Mercedes aspires to realise the potential of all our young people to educate them to be the best person they can be - intellectually, spiritually and socially.

We are one of only a few schools world-wide to offer an international curriculum for all students from Reception to Year 12 and the first to offer all three International Baccalaureate (IB) programmes in the Asia-Pacific region.

The concept of internationalism builds on the fundamental Christian philosophy embodied in the aims of the College - to encourage respect, to give recognition and understanding to the rights of all people and the capacity to move beyond self-interest and to serve those who stand in need. Students at Mercedes College develop strong academic, social and emotional characteristics and are encouraged to think independently and drive their own learning; take part in programmes of education that can lead them to some of the highest ranking universities around the world; become more culturally aware, through the development of a second language and be able to engage with people in an increasingly globalized, rapidly changing world.

Mercedes College was the first Australian school to become an Associate Member of the Council of International Schools (CIS), one of three Catholic schools nationally, the only Catholic School in South Australia and one of 425 schools world-wide who have been awarded accredited status. CIS Accreditation drives continuous improvement and synchronises the IB Programme evaluation process of whole-school evaluation and accreditation.

Environment and Sustainability

Energy management has been a key focus for the College since 2005 when an energy management system was put in place. This successfully reduced the College's energy consumption (Mercedes uses 40% less energy than a comparable size school).

In 2014 an Energy Master Plan commissioned a project to install demand and supply energy technology that did not compromise functionality of College assets. The plan looked in detail at energy use profiles, hours of operation, energy use by asset and location along with usage trends and proposed solutions. This resulted in a Power Partnership Agreement with Tindo Power to provide 100kw of solar power for the power generated from the system over the next 10 years. This Power Partnership Agreement is one of, if not the first within a school in Australia.

On the demand side the College rolled out the replacement of all luminaires with long-life LED globes significantly reducing energy consumption and maintenance costs.

These important initiatives add to our major water retention project developed in 2009 and our ongoing waste recycling programme. It has been possible for the College to be environmentally sustainable, socially responsible and financially prudent while offering our students educational opportunities in relation to learning about and using as part of their studies, the renewable energy sources projects within the College.

At the Junior School, students work on a garden as part of the Science curriculum. There is also a student eco-group and a senior leader with a focus on creation and environment. Sustainable practices have also been incorporated into the curriculum at Ignatius Early Years. The College has adopted programs that include the recycling of paper, plastic, lights, batteries, and mobile phones. Solar panels and water tanks will be installed in 2018. All of these actions are taken as practical responses to Gospel values that are presented daily to our students and staff.

Technology is used appropriately to engage students in addressing real-world problems important to humanity, engage collaboratively and develop higher order thinking skills.

Our students develop their individual leadership skills and confidence, including exercises to build confidence in talking to a group, team building and collaboration skills. Whether it be the high ropes challenge at a year level camp or being on stage at the Entertainment Centre each year, our students develop leadership skills for life within and beyond school.

Environment and Sustainability

Green JAM (Justice And Mercy) forms a sub-group within the larger JAM team and it has initiated a SAC 'greening' project. Students sold pot plants each lunchtime to fund other Mercy works. During the year, Green JAM students had an enjoyable time planting seedlings in our new garden beds and working as a team. It was lovely to see older students supporting younger ones and teaching them the importance of taking care of our environment.

Year 9 and 10 Green JAM and Green House students represented St Aloysius College at the Switched On Schools Summit, hosted by the Australian Youth Climate Coalition and the Adelaide City Council. Green JAM and Green House are committed to working together to ensure that SAC is an eco-friendly school, dedicated to reducing waste and increasing appreciation for our lovely environment. Green Art creates artworks from recycled materials and uses the money made from selling the artworks to fund other environmental projects.

LED lights, sensors for movement to turn lights and airconditioning on only when people are present, solar panels, recycled water for toilets and 'digital by default' to reduce paper use are all current environmental projects within the College. The environment and sustainability are intrinsic to our beliefs as Catholics and hence form an important part of our religious education program.

What Makes Us Special

St Patrick's Technical College is a purpose built specialist trade training school. We offer a trade focused SACE curriculum and award winning pre-apprenticeship training for Year 11 and 12 students. We specialise in developing individual programs for students who wish to complete their SACE in conjunction with a School-based Apprenticeship.

The curriculum at StPatsTech has been developed to support the trades in which we deliver training. The core subjects of Maths, English and Science are taught in a way that makes them relevant to each trade program. These subjects have been developed with input from industry and in association with TAFE SA. The VET component of every program is 100% built-in meaning no classes missed to undertake trades and technical training. Our partnership with TAFE SA means that students access accredited courses that are endorsed and recognised by industry. Through the SA Government's Work Ready program this partnership also means StPatsTech students are guaranteed a place at TAFE if they are not successful in gaining an apprenticeship during their time at the College.

Employability Skills are embedded across all subjects, training and projects at St Patrick's Technical College. This focuses students on self-management, problem solving, teamwork, communication, planning and organising. All students undertake major projects that have been developed with employers and industry bodies. Many employers are active participants in these projects as managers and mentors while others are involved as part of the College's extensive work experience program in which students undertake six weeks of industry placement.

Environment and Sustainability

Every course in the College's School of Engineering & Transport features competencies specifically designed to train students in environmental and sustainability work practices. These topics are part of the Australian Quality Training Framework (AQTF) and include: follow environmental and sustainability best practice in an automotive workplace; apply environmentally and sustainable procedures in the energy sector; provide basic sustainable energy solutions for energy reduction in residential premises; promote sustainable energy practices in the community; and participate in environmentally sustainable work practices.

As part of their Cross-Disciplinary Studies course, students in the College's School of Building & Construction undertake a Civil and Urban Environments project each year. This project has been developed collaboratively with UrbanVirons Group, the Civil Contractors Federation and the City of Playford. It involves students working on a number of small- to medium-sized construction projects in and around the College grounds. Each project is designed by students working alongside industry mentors and requires them to apply learning from their trade courses to project tasks with focus areas on turf management, landscape design, weed control and water management. Relevant mathematics, communication and science concepts are part of each project.

Practical projects and training such as this are preparing St Patrick's Technical College graduates to be environmentally aware tradespeople of tomorrow.

What Makes Us Special

Every boy has a story. At St Paul's College, we take the time to learn each boy's unique story as part of a quality education that integrates Faith, Relationships, Excellence and Diversity.

We are a Catholic school for boys from Reception to Year 12 in the tradition of Edmund Rice. Our education is based on Gospel values that place an emphasis on the spiritual dimension of students' lives. Our values are underpinned by respect and humility and the belief we must be of genuine service to others. While our roots are Catholic, we teach the universal values of respect, dignity, equality, compassion, truth, love and mercy. Respecting all cultures and religious traditions, we are inclusive and open to many faiths and spiritual journeys.

The St Paul's staff fosters right relationships with all members of our community, enabling students to flourish in their educational journey. We recognise each boy's individuality and offer a variety of approaches to suit unique learning styles. St Paul's College accommodates both academic and vocational pathways. Many of our graduates go on to university having achieved excellent results in Year 12; some achieving academic merit awards, while others undertake trade careers having achieved recognised qualifications at our Trade Training Centre and beginning their careers as part of their SACE studies.

Through our pastoral care, academic and co-curricular activities, we will help to open your son's heart and mind. We will equip him with the skills and knowledge to become a young man of action committed to justice and solidarity.

Environment and Sustainability

Learning how to protect the environment and promote sustainable behaviour begins in the classroom at St Paul's College. Students collect food scraps from lunch and recess into plastic buckets that sit in each primary classroom, which are then placed in plastic bins to create compost for a vibrant vegetable garden. Sitting in a sun soaked area of the primary play space, the garden boasts a healthy crop of Brussel sprouts, lettuce, silverbeet, beans, tomatoes and a range of herbs where students can get their hands dirty and understand where food comes from. The garden is allowed to go to seed and regenerate naturally so students can learn about the lifecycle of plants and how different plants produce fruits and seeds.

A team of six Primary Environmental Leaders enthusiastically support the environmental and sustainability program by presenting messages at forums and assemblies and creating educational posters encouraging recycling. They also have a food club to champion healthy eating and encourage other students to eat different fruits and vegetables. The program extends to Upper Primary where students ensure recycling bins are used effectively by visiting classrooms and offering to empty the bins into large collection bins. This initiative has resulted in a significant reduction in the amount of recyclable products going to landfill.

In 2011, a Caritas partner organisation began working with Dinia. She has been able to develop a sustainable income through a livelihoods program that helps both her and her neighbours overcome the widespread poverty of the rural Philippines.

Her strength comes from her own journey of healing, which began in shock and despair.

"I didn't have other income aside from my husband's from his work as a miner," she says.

"After he died, I used to collect shells and crabs from the seashore to sell. That was my main source of income ... it was a very small income."

Dinia flourished thanks to education and development programs supported by Caritas Australia.

Today, she has an integral role in her community, a sustainable livelihood, and a brighter future for her children.

"My life is much better now. It is much easier," Dinia says.


