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

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Digital Tools - helping teachers, parents and students

N ow is an exciting time for digital technology in education. We are seeing a fundamental shift in how teachers and students engage with education tools, driven by the benefits digital resources can offer and the increasing use of digital devices.

Teachers are increasingly looking for effective digital tools to support them in the classroom and parents are increasingly demanding the use of the right tools to prepare their children for a digital future. This transition from printed materials to digital resources in schools follows a similar 'digital disruption' we have seen in other sectors. Computers are becoming an integral component in a rapidly growing number of Australian classrooms. More teachers are using blended learning, a mix of digital and face-to-face teaching, and teachers now use a broad variety of digital tools, including subject-based platforms and apps, internet and social media.

It is widely accepted that ICT has an important role to play in improving education in classrooms and that students' readiness for the 'digital age' is vital. According to the Digital Education Advisory Group (DEAG) report, Beyond the Classroom: A New Digital Education for Young Australians in the 21st Century, "achieving enhanced education outcomes in Australian schools is increasingly linked to the pace of digital education uptake".1

Digital tools in the classroom

Comparative international studies into the use of ICT in school classrooms consistently find that students in Australia are above

average in ICT competency and Australia is one of the highest users of technology in school classrooms.^{2,3}

What they also find is that the positive impacts of ICT in classrooms correlates to how these resources are used, and is highly dependent on the ICT skills, and the methods and teaching practices (pedagogical approaches) of teachers. This emphasises the importance of digital resources for schools being user-friendly, so making the transition to using them is as easy for teachers as possible.

Our research shows that teachers who use the online education software, LiteracyPlanet and other similar resources find a range of benefits⁴:

- Students are easily engaged and often not even aware they are learning.
- They allow for differentiation and personalisation to cater for children across a broad range of abilities, including those who need accelerated learning and those with learning difficulties.
- They minimise administration time and allow for student-led learning, giving teachers more opportunity to give individual attention to students who need it most.
- They facilitate collaboration between students and encourage healthy competition.
- They provide teachers with easy and efficient data collection to track results and monitor student progress.
- They empower students with more independence and control.
- They allow students to work at their own pace and be challenged

- without being overwhelmed.
- They provide gamified digital learning environments which are particularly helpful in engaging otherwise difficult, struggling or reluctant learners.

Digital tools at home

We also know that parental engagement is a key driver of successful learning outcomes for children and this is a growing trend in Australia. Digital resources can seamlessly span across school and home environments, and they provide instant and reliable feedback, making them a great tool for increased parental engagement. Our research shows that:

- Most parents want to be more involved and support their child's learning at home.
- Most parents of school-aged children in Australia believe online education tools are important.
- A large percentage of children in Australia now use digital technology for learning at home on a regular basis.
- Many parents feel that in addition to helping develop core skills in literacy and numeracy, digital tools help their children's learning by improving motivation, enthusiasm, confidence, self-esteem and social skills.

Key trends in eLearning

These benefits and requirements are fuelling a number of key trends in the use of digital resources in schools, both here and overseas:

- Gamification, the application of game dynamics, such as interactivity, rewards and incentives, to learning platforms to motivate and engage students.
- Student-led and personalised learning, which allows learners to

pull information and create their own learning path.

- The use of mobile and 'bring your own' devices (BYOD) in schools.
- Adaptive digital environments that can identify student needs for support and allow teachers to address these discretely.
- Technology-based monitoring of student progress.
- Automation and curation to deliver tailored content.
- The introduction and use of social media tools, like blogs, and skills, like coding.

Fostering 21st Century skills

DEAG's report highlights that the challenge for teachers and parents is to embrace and respond to, "not just the innovations in technology, but the extraordinary pace of change...We need to harness the transformative potential of digital technology to support new approaches to innovative learning centred around the development of 21st Century Learning skills".

Those skills being creativity and innovation; critical thinking, problem solving; decision making; lifelong learning; collaboration and communication; ICT literacy; consciousness of being local and global citizens; and personal and social responsibility.

In talking to educators, parents, and children, I hear stories daily of how digital resources such as ours are fostering these important skills. Ultimately, and this is a key founding premise of LiteracyPlanet, digital environments can be interactive and exciting for students, and children learn better when they are engaged and having fun.

Technology in Schools: How Mobile Changes the Classroom

obile technology is changing the world. Arguably, the introduction of smart devices and app ecosystems represents the major technology revolution of our decade. Likewise, it's one of the main drivers of the current information revolution that's changing entire industries and the world itself.

Education, although often slow moving, political and bureaucratic, is undergoing a major change too, and it's not surprising. The current education system needs to step up, reinvent itself and adapt to the extraordinary technological changes that are occurring. And with all these possibilities, it's time we redesign the entire system and prepare our children for life in a rapidly evolving world.

That won't happen overnight, yet here are some of the trends that slowly, but surely, are changing the classroom.

Democratisation of Education

It's fair to say that thanks to the internet, the entire world's knowledge is available to 'anyone anytime'. Even more so with the progress of translation services burning the communication barriers.

Applications and services, like Duolingo, Lynda, Coursera, Udemy, Khan Academy and others, take all this access to knowledge and make it usable for everyone. That means, schools no longer have to rely on outdated textbooks, but can deliver the best education pretty much in real time. Naturally, this changes the role of the teacher, and likewise, solves a problem of teacher shortages.

The impact is huge, reaching way beyond the borders of individual countries. There are nearly a billion illiterate people in the world, 250 million of which are children. In other words, 250 million minds are going to waste. Technology today, is on the track to empower everyone to learn skills like basic reading, writing and arithmetic.

Gamification of Learning

As every teacher knows, keeping students engaged is an incredible challenge. In the US alone, 1.2 million students fail to graduate high school each year. Students who are not doing well are not lazy or incompetent; rather they're disengaged and bored.

At the same time, as a planet, we spend three billion hours a week playing digital games. Obviously, games are engaging by design. No other industry understands engagement and even addictiveness better than game industry.

To translate that knowledge into education can be a major game-changer. According to MIT, "Game players regularly exhibit persistence, risk-taking, attention to detail, and problem-solving, all behaviors that ideally would be regularly demonstrated in school."

A great example is Duolingo. The language learning app allows teachers to monitor the progress of their class while students can create leaderboards, compete with classmates, win badges and learn in a gamified way. Studies show that learning languages this way can rapidly accelerate the learning process.

Personalisation

Our education system was built on a premise that our brains are static. In reality, our brains are plastic and get developed just like our muscle (see neuroplasticity – every parent should read The Woman Who Changed Her Brain). Asking all students to progress at the same pace can create situations where you try to lift twice as much as your body allows you and never progress in the long term because you'll never move the weight.

Right now, most technologies that attempt to personalise learning revolve around tailoring or personalising the reading of texts to students of different abilities. But, in the coming future, personalisation will include activities that provide students with a richer and more meaningful educational experience.

Many universities offer both online and offline education to allow students to adjust. This makes sense as we all have different biorhythms, and similar approaches have been proven to work in the corporate world.

Virtual Reality

When we hear virtual reality (VR), most of us automatically think of games and entertainment. While the roots of VR are rooted in gaming, thanks to technological advances, such as Oculus Rift, a virtual reality headset, its potential is being realised across multiple industries.

VR is also highly engaging by design. As engagement is the key factor in classroom learning, VR shows a potential to take it to the next level. For example, astronomy students

can learn about the solar system and how it works by physically engaging with the objects within.

The potential is limitless. Visualisation students get involved, do things otherwise impossible and see information from a completely new perspective. Instead, of looking at pictures of the brain, imagine traveling through it, seeing how it works.

More importantly, right now we're entering an era of cheap VR technology, with cheapest headsets costing tens of dollars. If the trend continues, and likely it will, soon it will become widely accessible to education institutions changing the face of classrooms.

It is a practice that will remain with them for life.

Co-curricular activities, such as the Art Academy, Debating, Justice Group, Leadership Forums, Music and Sports encourage students to look outwards. Our campus extends to sister schools in Italy and Japan and study tours to France, opening up new horizons for our students. All three languages are taught to VCE level.

The Digital Classroom

At the Academy we support our students to become digital citizens. Digital technology is a part of the curriculum, but more importantly, it underpins the way every student learns in and outside the classroom.

The Academy's approach is centered on ensuring students develop skills in this vital area and how to use them in a positive way. In the younger year levels they explore the possibilities of digital technology such as social media, including its merits and challenges. Students later move into specialties like programming, where they explore robotics. Computer coding is part of the curriculum. Independent learning is encouraged and supported at the Academy as the girls use the vast online resources at their fingertips. However, we aim for students to do more than just use and absorb digital technology. We want them to understand the discipline. develop content and get hands on experience creating their own work.

Engaging digital resources assist student learning with online interactive lessons, quizzes and classroom collaboration delivered via programs like Stile, Kahoot and Google Apps for Education. And long gone are the days of students producing their work only as a simple document or poster. The students now create assignments using diverse mediums. As an example, they may develop a video presentation incorporating green screen technology, a flash animation or an e-newsletter.

Our approach to digital technology will continue to evolve as it does in everyday life but we remain excited by its possibilities.

What Makes Us Special

Aquinas College is a Catholic Regional College, founded in 1961 to provide a secondary education for Catholic children residing in parishes of the Maroondah Deanery. Today, Aquinas is a vibrant community of 1670 students, over 200 staff and an Accredited Member of the Council of International Schools.

We choose to see ourselves in an international context and look for opportunities to educate our students on what it means to be a global citizen. Long standing sister school partnerships exist with two schools in France and an emerging relationship has formed in Ordos, Inner Mongolia. Students are provided an opportunity to travel to China, New Caledonia and Borneo each year to develop an understanding of other cultures and the need for environmental sustainability. Strong ties with very welcoming indigenous communities in Daly River and Santa Teresa in the Northern Territory provide a rich immersion experience for our selected FIRE Carriers while others will learn about the natural environment of this region, including Kakadu. At each of the senior levels a Retreat program creates an invaluable opportunity for students to reflect on their emerging spirituality, aspirations and formation.

Aquinas College enrols a small group of International Students and seeks host families able to create a supportive environment. We are also a campus of St Mary's College for the Hearing Impaired and greatly value the richness these students bring to our community. Nurtured by dedicated and resourceful educators, our students are encouraged to appreciate inclusivity and perseverance and develop a deep desire for justice and compassion.



We believe an excellent school fosters literacy and numeracy, creativity, independence and deep learning. The use of technology at Aquinas is focused on these objectives. All of our students bring their own devices, from Year 7-9 this is an iPad, and take responsibility for them. Our students understand the power of immediate access to resources, and use these resources for communication, knowledge building and collaboration. They are able to respond to tasks in a variety of ways, through writing, making films, annotating and collecting ideas, and presenting to a large or small group. They are able to seek help from teachers and classmates and build their own skills through the assistance of others. Teachers set course outlines, work requirements, submission dates and expectations electronically and students respond. Teachers are then able to offer feedback on student work so that it is timely and immediately available.

We have a parent portal that enables parents to see school notices, attendance information, homework and feedback. Technology at Aquinas contributes to the building of a visible learning community. Our classes are conducted in visible classrooms where the learning is evident from outside. This has helped create a learning culture in the College where students model positive learning experiences, particularly through collaborating. At the heart of learning at Aquinas is the relationship between the student and the teacher. The learning is most likely if the student has confidence in the teacher's knowledge, organisation and compassion. The use of technology has provided another opportunity to successfully build this relationship.







Avila College was established in 1965 by the Presentation Sisters who accepted an invitation from parishes in the Waverley area to establish a Catholic girls' college.

The Digital Classroom

Teaching and learning methods differ significantly today from those employed in the past, but students' desire to learn is as keen as ever. Avila's teachers are committed to learning and adapting too, which means that they are highly creative and skilled in using the latest digital tools to maximise student achievement. All Avila students are provided with a MacBook in Year 7 and it is a powerful learning tool. Computers are utilised across the curriculum in many dynamic and innovative ways.

Avila College students are connected to rich up-to-date materials at the click of a trackpad. Most learning resources are online, including commercial textbooks, materials created by teachers at Avila and other experts.

Social media is also used to support and share learning. Various groups at Avila use Twitter, Instagram and Edmodo for learning. Students check their Edmodo pages to chat about learning, locate extra resources and complete guizzes or submit homework.

Google docs enable real time collaborative learning with multiple users able to contribute simultaneously to the same document, spreadsheet, presentation or website. Not only do students create professional looking publications, slideshows and videos to demonstrate their learning, but teachers also use their computers to record video to provide authentic rich feedback to students on their work. Avila College's involvement in a video feedback project with Monash University's Education faculty places the school at the forefront of educational innovation and research.



Through School eLocker and Google Apps for Education, both powerful digital platforms, students are able to communicate, collaborate and celebrate achievement. Learning can take place both within the classroom and beyond. Students use their digital devices when conducting inquiry-based units, such as Year 8 City Experience and Year 9 Healesville Immersion Experience.





As we do not have a designated priority parish catchment zone we draw widely from all parts of Melbourne, with all parish primary schools given priority in the enrolment process.

The Digital Classroom

We are committed and supportive drivers of ICT in all aspects of College life. In 2015, we began the implementation of an innovative four-year ICT Strategic Plan which focuses on using ICT to improve student outcomes.

The early phase of this plan included an extensive overhaul of our ICT infrastructure creating a dedicated connection to AARnet, an ultra-high bandwidth gateway to the internet, and conducting the coordinated roll out of managed Windows operating Notebooks to staff and students to encourage dynamic engagement in classroom learning.

All teaching spaces have data projectors to enable a visually engaging delivery of learning materials, and students are supported in utilising personal cloud-based storage to encourage collaboration and maintain a digital portfolio – critical skills in today's workforce.

Our Notebook program is supported by an intensive professional learning program for teachers to enable them to consistently deliver a digitally-rich curriculum across all learning areas.

Our advanced ICT program also extends to the way the College communicates with parents, who are able to use our learning portal to provide details about their son's medical information, pay school fees and receive College news. The College promotes a three-way partnership between staff, students and parents, and ICT is routinely utilised to enable this important collaboration.



Providing a classroom environment of unconditional respect where students are valued, listened to and work together is an important dimension of achieving this aim, as is delivering learning-teaching programs that are engaging and rigorous and develop students as independent learners.

As a Catholic school our focus with students is on their development as a whole person and their growth in strong values, care and consideration for others, particularly those who need our help. Academic achievement is an important part of students being their best.

Learning how to learn, gaining feedback on learning progress, and setting new learning goals are important components of students achieving excellence at Emmanuel College.

All students in Years 7-9 have a school prescribed laptop and those in Years 10-12 have a BYOD program. These programs enable students to make use of online learning opportunities and in some subjects, ebooks. Students use their computers to access a range of presentation options, keep notes, develop projects, research and communicate with each other and teachers. It is a valuable tool that is used both at school and home.

In the 21st century students can be engaged in learning anywhere anytime. We have tried to create an environment where this is supported by our use of two online Learning Management Systems. The College has SIMON which also has a parent portal. Students can access classroom resources, school information and assessment materials from anywhere anytime. This system also provides the opportunity for students to upload their work for teachers to assess. In addition, as part of our membership of the New Tech Network students from Years 7 to 9 have access to Echo which is another online Learning Management System, where they can access all of the materials that they need to complete their Project Based Learning assessments.



The school has many outstanding new facilities, with five significant buildings less than a decade old and many other areas recently upgraded. Our Y9@E program located at the Burwood campus offers Emmaus students wonderful opportunities for innovative and engaging learning while maintaining academic rigour during this pivotal year in secondary education.

The Digital Classroom

Emmaus College uses technology to enhance learning. All students have a mobile ICT device to assist with the process of learning as well as equipping students for the ever-changing technological landscape engulfing work and society. Communication, critical thinking, collaboration and creativity are the key skills identified in educational research for understanding the importance of ICT at school and beyond.

The plethora of software tools available with online Web 2.0 technologies are empowering teachers to explore many interesting ways to present content. Students are able to demonstrate their learning in a variety of ways, from video to avatars, comics, online presentations and infographics.

In 2016, Years 7 to 9 students have an iPad as their ICT tool for accessing and producing all types of multimedia content. In senior school and at VCE, it was decided that laptops/notebook computers are the designated ICT device for Year 10s. At Years 11 and 12, students bring their preferred device with many students selecting a laptop/notebook computer. The types of tasks completed at the higher levels require more complex thinking and use of more sophisticated software skills.

At Emmaus, communication with our parent body is paramount in working to achieve the best outcomes for students. A variety of online tools are used for this purpose.

With the many changes in ICT from one year to the next, Emmaus College's network and communication tools are constantly reviewed in order to achieve the best educational outcomes for our students.



Students in Year 7 and above are part of our BYOD (Bring Your Own Device) Program and have uncapped yet filtered internet access throughout our campuses and access to loan devices. We also have a dedicated Mac Lab to support Video and Multimedia production.

Robotics and Programming are introduced in our Early Years, starting with Cubeletsin Prep to Year 1, with plans to expand with the introduction of Lego WedoRobotics and Lego EV3 in 2016 for Years 2 and above.

Our Co-curricular Program, GenTech, enables the girls to actively participate in the creation of help desk files and gain insight into the running of a complex network.


Extra-curricular activities



With our strong Brigidine heritage and the core values by which we live and teach at Kilbreda, our students have every opportunity to grow into successful young women. Success comes in many forms; here at Kilbreda we nurture not only academic endeavour, but growth of the person as a whole. Developing self-confidence, a strong sense of social justice, knowledge of the world outside their own, and an eagerness to extend oneself physically are all part of everyday life for students at Kilbreda.

Our College offers many representative sports for competition including athletics, badminton, basketball, cross country, diving, football, hockey, netball, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, triathlon, volleyball, equestrian and surfing.

The Digital Classroom

Kilbreda College is committed to exploring new and innovative ways of teaching and learning that enable students to acquire the sophisticated 21st century skills required for success in study, work and life. Digital technologies play an important role in this approach.

Kilbreda values a flexible approach to learning with one-toone laptops, facilitating technology use within and beyond the classroom. Students are encouraged to explore content, collaborate and present their work in a variety of ways using technologies that complement in-class learning. In 2015, Kilbreda moved towards the use of digital textbooks (JacPlus) which supports the development of students' digital literacy.

Year 7 and 8 students participate in digital technology classes that explore a wide range of technologies, including digital camera use and photo manipulation; movie-making and editing; animation creation; digital illustration; game design and programming; and 3D design and printing. Students from Years 9 to 12 have opportunities to broaden this learning through electives such as Digital Technologies, Maths electives, Visual Communications, Multi-Media, VCE IT and VCE Media Studies.

Technology also provides formative ways of monitoring and assessing student progress. Online testing (such as On Demand) and use of ePortfolios are just two of the methods Kilbreda uses to track student progress and support students in their learning. Summative assessment information is also available for parents in the form of online interim reports. Kilbreda takes cybersafety very seriously and runs a variety of programs which explore contemporary issues with students.







Students and teachers collaborate and use their personal digital device as a tool that develops the student as information seeker, analyser and evaluator, problem-solver and decision-maker. Students collaborate to provide solutions to real-world problems creating links beyond the classroom and moving levels of thinking beyond a simple knowledge framework to complex analysis and evaluation. Student learning outcomes are enhanced due to levels of learning both in and out of school with an emphasis on higher-order thinking, creative thinking and expression being promoted throughout the curriculum. Loyola College offers a technology-rich environment, with multiple Mac and PC computer labs, multiple collaboration zones in the i-Centre, large touch screen collaboration devices and high speed Internet and wireless access, which leverages the benefits of contemporary learning and thus improves learning outcomes.

Mazenod College is a Catholic Boys' College served by the Oblates of Mary Immaculate working in partnership with the Archdiocese of Melbourne.

In 2017, the Oblates of Mary Immaculate celebrate 200 years since their foundation. The Oblates emerged during a golden era of founding Religious Communities, and the idea of preaching Missions for Re-Evangelisation, the original purpose for the Community, was not ground breaking or new. There are, however, two significant choices that the Founder, St Eugene de Mazenod, made early on in the establishment of the Oblates that gave it life to survive, to grow and to have a lasting effect on the Church.

The first significant choice was Community; to live their lives modelling themselves on the Apostles gathered around Christ. The second significant choice made by St Eugene de Mazenod and his early companions was to send Missionaries abroad; this required a great deal of trust in God and generosity of heart. Even though the Mission had many challenges, he always insisted that they live in Community.

Mazenod College has a strong Catholic Identity in the spirit of St Eugene de Mazenod supported by an Oblate Community living at the College, helping to develop a strong sense of Community amongst current students, families and the Old Boys' Association. In the context of this strong sense of Community, the Mazenod Community has a long tradition of supporting overseas Missions, 'Leaving Nothing Undared for the Kingdom of God'.

The Digital Classroom

Our learning and teaching goals: Develop and nurture a stimulating and dynamic learning environment with a culture that promotes high personal achievement, maximises learning for all and encourages students to assume responsibility for life-long learning; and, have a consistent implementation of stimulating, sound pedagogy that reflects high expectations for every student, and engages students to become responsible, independent and interdependent learners.

Students have daily classroom access to a range of contemporary technologies to support learning, such as 3D digital printing, green-energy lego robotics and digital readouts from our large scale rooftop solar plant. We have specialist computer facilities for high-end CAD, digital design and production in Materials Technology. Digital Art, Studio Arts, Visual Communication Design and VET: Interactive Digital Media. Further, dedicated specialist computer facilities are available for Music Production, Software and Games Programming, IT: Business Applications and Electronic Publishing.

Students have daily access to Netbooks and Notebooks for use in core classes where they work in a contemporary way with curriculum delivered via our newlyupgraded Learning Management System (LMS) and the use of Google Docs.

Students can access information and communicate with the college through our LMS. Our parent portal is currently under construction, but when complete, will enable enhanced communication with parents regarding their son's academic progress.





The Digital Classroom

GAFE (Google Apps for Education) is now being used across all Year Levels to enable students to work effectively and efficiently between school and home. Collaborative work is enhanced by the use of GAFE tools as is teacher-student feedback and consultation. The use of personal devices, such as iPads and Macbooks, has personalised student learning and assessment. The College has adopted "Flipped Learning" which inverts traditional teaching methods, delivering instruction online and moving homework into the classroom. Teachers constantly endeavour to include technology use and skills in both classroom and homework tasks encouraging students to become 21st century learners who can evaluate and review digital resources. The use of a digital parent portal allows efficient communication with parents and carers while ensuring privacy is maintained. College events, such as excursions and other co-curricula activities, reports and accounts, are accessible 24 hours a day. Parents can contact College staff directly via the portal.

The College Libraries are places of learning providing access to a wide range of books, ebooks, ejournals, weblinks, podcasts, educational videos, library guides and online services to meet the curriculum and learning needs of students.



Supported by the College IT department, this team of students spend lunchtimes assisting other students to optimise their laptop settings, applications and programs to allow for increased productivity.

Online learning tools and management systems are used to optimise tasks and to gain instant feedback to further inform teaching instruction. The timely, often instant, feedback provided by these systems coupled with analytics obtained via specialised software, help our teachers to continuously and accurately assess student learning and better tailor lessons to the specific needs of their students. Our new learning management system, 'CANVAS', enables us to manage and deliver learning through one system, providing extra support and flexibility for students and teachers alike. It joins our website and social media channels in allowing parents the opportunity to more frequently engage in their daughter's learning, along with the College's extra-curricular, faith development and student wellbeing programs.



A focus on personalised learning and pathways enables all students to follow their head and their heart through innovative e-learning programs, single gender classes in core subjects, programs of acceleration and a broad extra-curricula program.

Personalised Learning: In 2015, an emphasis was placed on ensuring personalised learning. 
The Digital Classroom

This trust produces very powerful interpersonal relationships that have a profound impact on students' learning.

For their part, staff members contribute to a learning culture that aspires to excellence and continuous improvement. They are energetic, collegial, highly motivated educators who are passionate about learning. love teaching girls and are committed to their own professional growth. We are very proud of our school climate and culture. It is conducive to innovation and improvement whilst being ever mindful of our rich history. We firmly embrace our Catholic faith and Mercy heritage, and we hold fast to our values of justice, compassion, courage and joy.

The Digital Classroom

We believe that technology, if used effectively, can play a vital role in preparing students for living and working in a digital age and widen the scope for creative expression, experimentation and innovation. The College is committed to providing an environment in which learning is co-created and collaborative, engages with contemporary issues and is adaptable to changing social contexts.

Google Apps for Education is used extensively by teachers and students to collaborate in real time with each other online; provide timely, constructive and task-specific feedback; design and develop websites; and publish work to external audiences. Google Sites allow teachers to 'flip' the classroom and provide content to students online that can be accessed and explored outside the classroom to strengthen learning and understanding.

Teachers use data from a range of different sources to inform classroom practice and to cater for the needs of individual students. Specific tools allow this data to be easily recorded, analysed and utilised.

2015 has seen the introduction of the Makerspace in the library, and it now functions as a dynamic working space for students and staff to collaborate, create and explore digital technologies. Complementing the STEM programs and Digital Technologies curriculum, the Makerspace allows students to experiment with 3D printing, robotics and circuits, and utilise this learning in their mainstream classes.



We embrace technology holistically to ensure it enhances our learning program!





Year 11 and 12 students choose the device that best suits their learning style and VCE program.

As a school, our belief is that learning comes from the continuous dynamic interaction among students, staff and parents. Our school learning management system, Firefly, allows 24-hour access to learning and our students are encouraged to access MOOCs (Massive Open Online Courses), such as the Khan Academy and Stanford On-line.

Access to a personal device ensures students have the tools to participate in the widest variety of learning experiences to further enhance their academic goals. All classrooms at Sacré Cœur are ucs (wireless-enabled, equipped with smart boards and Apple TV. Our classrooms are places where digital citizenship is part of the education process and growing responsible, technologically-adept leaders of the future are developed.

What Makes Us Special

Salesian College, Rupertswood, is the oldest Salesian educational foundation in Australia, established by the Salesian Society in 1927. The College occupies the grounds of the historic Rupertswood Mansion, which was built in 1874, and is the gateway of the College. The College maintains a unique and expansive environment which includes an active farm precinct.

Salesian College is a vibrant learning and faith community enabling young men and women to become life-long learners and value their education within a culture that respects each and every individual. Recent College developments include a cafeteria and decking area, an expansive well-being centre, and the Year 9 Mazzarello Campus that offers an integrated curriculum focussed on applied learning utilising the rural environment, including the farm. A new performing arts centre has been established on the lower level of the original Mansion ballroom, with a spacious senior art space occupying the upper level.

The College's vision is that students experience their classrooms and environments as a stimulating and inspiring learning space. Our aim is to kindle a passion for learning and a deep appreciation of the importance of education in our students' lives so they can cultivate their talents and be their best.

The success of the College is based on a broad curriculum, serene environment and our vision: Faith, Community, Excellence and Learning (CLEF).

The Digital Classroom

The College is responsive to the role technology plays in contemporary classrooms. Both teachers and students use Microsoft Office 365 which has enhanced the way iPads can connect with Surface Pro devices used by teachers. With Office 365, students can now access and install various software online including Microsoft Word, PowerPoint, Excel and OneNote on their desktop, laptop, tablet and smartphone.

In 2015 the College trialled vLearn (Virtual Learning) Citrix software that will be introduced at the beginning of 2016. vLearn will provide staff and students with a suite of learning applications all accessible from school and at home to ensure learning resources can be accessed 24/7. By using Daymap (learning management system) for continuous reporting with assessment scores and feedback, we ensure that parents are kept up-to-date with their child's learning and progress. Parents can access results, curriculum information and class notes by logging onto the Daymap Parent Portal.

New technology is being introduced to Science and Health/Physical Education classes with Augmented Reality kits. These interactive resources can be accessed using a free app on the iPad and have completely transformed the way students explore the different systems of the body in an interactive, animated 3D environment. Our Year 9 students are using student-led classroom blogs as a way to connect with parents and the wider community. Additionally, our College Media Team photograph and film key College events that are shared with our parent community so they feel a part of the College and their child's education.



Authorised as a world school for the International Baccalaureate: Middle Years Program (IBMYP) in 2014, we stand front and centre on the international platform for inquiry-based learning which affirms the individual differences and strengths of each student. In today's fast-paced, interconnected world, students need a sophisticated combination of knowledge, skills and personal attributes to prepare for success, achieve personal growth and lead lives with meaning. Promoting open communication based on understanding and respect, the IB encourages students to become active, compassionate, lifelong learners.

Duke of Edinburgh: The Duke of Edinburgh Award offered to all students at Bronze level, and invitational at Silver and Gold, affirms and challenges the participants to grow through the provision of an international program designed to build resilience, foster independence and celebrate achievement. Unique in its delivery, this program is a rich learning opportunity for girls to flourish.

The Digital Classroom

As a College that explicitly values inquiry-based learning and contemporary pedagogy through the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Program, Santa Maria College makes consistent use of digital resources as a tool to facilitate learning. Digital devices are an essential tool that promote research, organisation, communication, and critical and creative thinking in the classroom. Just as the teacher, the physical equipment and the students themselves are resources for learning, so too are digital mediums seen as a resource that provide information and encourage students to develop skills of discernment in the careful selection and organisation of information.

Devices are an everyday part of College life with the community constantly connecting for both basic and complex tasks. Students, staff and families make use of devices to assist in organisation through the College Portal – an interface that allows two-way information between the staff and the community. Online tools support pedagogy and curriculum that is both engaging and reflective of the digital demands of the real world.

Staff at Santa Maria College actively seek opportunities to utilise technology as one of many ways in which to connect learners to ideas. Students are supported in making responsible choices with technology, and are encouraged to view technology as one of the many wonderful resources available to them that enhance learning. It is important to acknowledge that whilst the digital natives in our classroom understand the intuitive nature of technology, the role of teacher in supporting and promoting responsible digital citizenship is crucial and a strong dimension of e-learning.



The Digital Classroom

At Siena College, technology is used to explore innovative ways to enhance learning and communication. We provide a technology-rich learning environment with a wireless network throughout the campus and excellent access to both fixed and portable technologies.

Computer laboratories, mobile laptop sets accessing both Microsoft and Apple platforms, and data projectors in every classroom, allow the seamless and effective integration of ICT into the curriculum. iMac computers and the latest industry-standard software enhance studies in the area of Visual Arts and Design, and a well-resourced ICT Help Centre provides excellent onsite support for students and staff. Students in Years 7-10 use iPads, while students in the VCE years are able to use an iPad or a device of their choice to further enrich the learning program. Students and staff have onsite and remote access to ebooks, a video library and Apple television is available in a range of classrooms and the library.

We actively support both students and parents by engaging experts to assist them in managing some of the challenges faced in our digital world. Parent seminars and information nights are offered to outline how technology is managed and used by all members of the community.

Students are taught about safe, responsible and ethical use of technology and about how to manage their digital footprints. Both private and public digital forums are used for learning and teaching and for sharing information and ideas. At Siena College, technology is used to give students a voice, particularly via an online forum used by the Students' Representative Council.

What Makes Us Special

Established in 1996, Simonds Catholic College is located across two inner city campuses in West Melbourne and Fitzroy North. Our close proximity to the city makes the school easily accessible by public transport, and allows our students to take advantage of the many sporting and cultural precincts on our doorstep. Our small size allows for each student to be known; class sizes are small, typically 22-24 students in Years 7-10, decreasing to 14-15 at Years 11-12. It also provides students with an abundance of opportunities to represent the school in activities from debating, public speaking, chess, Maths Games days, Brain Bee Challenges, performing and visual arts, numerous ACC sporting teams, through to our award-winning Teen Chefs.

Whilst we aim to inspire the boys to strive for academic excellence, we also have a holistic approach to education. Our student wellbeing, pastoral care and leadership programs allow for personal development and growth, and discovery of their own unique potential. In 2015, the College employed a full time School Counsellor and Coordinator of Student Wellbeing who has been working with both our students and parents to further develop wellbeing aspects of the College. Simonds Catholic College has a rich mix of cultural and social backgrounds and we believe that every child deserves an opportunity to have a high quality education.

When boys enrol at Simonds Catholic College we ask them to take advantage of all the opportunities offered to them, and assist them on their journey to become young men by providing an educational environment where each student is known, supported and inspired.

The Digital Classroom

21st century learning is very different to the type of learning that our students' parents experienced. Students are facing a fast-paced world that is connected, interactive and collaborative, and a world in which technology is continually evolving. This technology is changing the way our teachers teach, our students learn and the way in which we are able to interact with our parent community.

The use of iPads and our online Learning Management System (LMS) allow students to learn anytime, anywhere: whether it be during formal teaching time, private study or at home. Classrooms are fitted with large LED televisions that enable teachers and students to wirelessly present lessons and student work via Apple TV connectivity. Even the more fundamental technology allows the College to interact with our parent community more efficiently, ranging from absentee notifications by SMS to the availability of online bookings for school events such as Parent Teacher Interviews and School Tours.

The College is continually looking at ways to improve our IT programs and infrastructure to support student learning and connectivity with parents; staff have recently been upgraded with dual purpose tablet and laptop devices, and we are currently investigating an upgrade to our LMS. Looking ahead, the newer technology will allow students to submit their assessment tasks and have them returned electronically. As well, we will be able to offer parents continuous reporting methods, so they can monitor their sons' progress as it happens, rather than waiting for traditional end of semester reports and parent teacher interviews.



Collaborative digital tools that allow for the sharing of ideas or support groups of students analysing Shakespeare texts are not new to our College. However, hardware is regularly updated to support new ways students can access successful learning. St Aloysius College has installed a 3D printer which is utilised as much by the Art students as the Engineering students. Touch screens are fitted to encourage small group collaborations where students can learn to share ideas and develop communication skills.

Our parents are taken by the hand and connected to their daughter's learning through digital means and offered support via Parent Forums. The Digital Classroom today extends into the home, and developing responsible. digital citizens of integrity is highly valued. The foundation of our programs, digital or otherwise, aligns with the values we instil in all of our students.





Students and staff use the innovative Google suite of products to enhance collaboration and sharing within the classroom. Building communities and forums for online communication, these tools allow students and staff to enhance understanding by asking questions of their peers and teachers who can respond, free of the physical boundaries of traditional classrooms.

A new Learning Management System is allowing more efficient communication between staff, students and the parent community. The use of electronic textbooks and an electronic diary allow structured, personalised learning programs to be developed and delivered to students of all abilities. A thriving student eLeader program exists at St Bede's College which celebrates student expertise and interest in technology. These eLeaders aid in the professional learning throughout the College and uphold the cybersafe principles of good digital citizens. Assisting staff and their fellow students in the use of technology, the eLeaders exemplify the positive and modern spirit this digital age produces.





Each student owns their own device, which allows for personalisation and a sense of ownership. iPads are used for communication, student organisation, research and evidence-gathering. Beyond that, they have been used to create movies and podcasts, stop-motion animations and instructional videos.

Currently, we have five computer laboratories in which we run industry-level software suites, such as Adobe and Autodesk.
Our classes in 3D design and animation, product design, digital drawing, robotics classes and woodwork all make good use of specialist software to best effect. We extend this use with Lego EV3 and NXT kits, two 3D printers, scanners and high quality colour printers.

A dedicated ICT committee investigates and creates challenges for the school to explore, aiming for St James College to be a truly transformational institution incorporating technology to best effect.







What Makes Us Special

St Monica's College offers a vast offering of courses and subjects to its students and for this it is renowned throughout the northern suburbs of Melbourne. From Year 7 to VCE, students' needs and interests are catered for through extensive options in English, and also in Mathematics, from support classes to extension classes up to and including Specialist Mathematics. The College's LOTE program teaches the following languages other than English from Year 7 to VCE: Italian, French, Modern Greek, Spanish and Japanese. Immersion classes are offered for the first four years in Italian and Japanese.

The College's performing arts and visual arts curricula are impressively extensive. In these areas students are able to take all or some of Music, Dance, Theatre Studies, Art, Visual Communication, Media and Textiles. Excellent facilities have been built to meet the demands of these subjects into the 21st century.

All students receive a Notebook free of charge (changeovers occurring after Year 9) and it has been stated that St Monica's College leads the field in ICT provision and integration of Information Technology across all areas of the school.

It is recommended that prospective Monican families access our website to discover the entire range of subjects on offer. Further, the College is pleased to ensure that small numbers in senior years seldom prevent the offering of VCE, VET or VCAL subjects.

The Digital Classroom

St Monica's College takes seriously the reality that contemporary learning in schools is now online, whether this is via web-based courses, eBooks, working in the cloud or in eLibraries. The contemporary classroom is no longer just a physical space because, through digital technologies, the 'classroom' is accessible anywhere, anytime. This is acknowledged in our newest Strategic Plan 2015-2019. The 'bricks and mortar' of contemporary schools now require expansive wireless access, as well as large bandwidth, so all their students and teachers are able to be online at all times, school as well as home. St Monica's has the network capacity to support 1000-plus users online all at the same time. And all this is in the service of improving student outcomes because, "we provide facilities, resources and technology which reflect a commitment to excellence and encourage each student to reach full potential" (College Mission Statement).

St Monica's College is committed to a 1:1 program meaning students receive new full size laptops at Year 7 and Year 10. Courses and their resources are all online and students are able to access both Google and Microsoft applications in the cloud. Teachers utilise online learning management systems, like Moodle, WordPress and Google Classroom, so that students can more easily access their work. With the development of ICON (Integrated Catholic Online Network) continuous reporting is being introduced so that parents will be able to monitor their child's development online throughout the year and not just at report time.



eLearning and Star's iTeam: The introduction of the laptop program across Star of the Sea College in 2011 has been transformative in the way teaching and learning takes place, both inside and outside of the classroom.

The ubiquitous use of technology offers both teachers and students new ways to collaborate and communicate. Staff value the role that technology plays in providing real-time feedback to students and in providing seamless access to differentiated material.

Technology also opens up stronger and more meaningful face-to-face interactions. Students regularly check in online with subject teachers and their homeroom teachers, providing clear points of discussion.

Students in Year 7 are fully-supported in their use of technology. They attend a day-long "boot camp", run by our trained iTeam students, at the commencement of their year at Star. They also participate in dedicated ICT classes throughout their first year of secondary school. They continue the exploration of their digital identity throughout their school years, ensuring that they understand their online rights and ethical responsibilities.

With the introduction of SIMON, an online pastoral resource for students and families, parents are encouraged to view their daughter's academic progress and extra-curricular involvement throughout the year, rather than waiting for their end-of-semester report.

The Wave: The Wave program is an initiative introduced in 2014. This whole-school program aims to maximise current technology, the development of learning spaces and 21st century pedagogy to effectively personalise teaching and learning at Star of the Sea College.

Collaboration, communication, creativity and critical thinking underpin the development of curriculum that continues to engage each student. Totally redesigned teaching and learning spaces were opened for Year 7 and 8 students in 2015. The building that houses the new spaces was renamed Trasna: a Celtic word meaning "crossing place".

The spaces offer both students and teachers a choice in the way they learn and teach. Class "hubs" can be configured in multiple ways for groups of twenty-five to fifty students, and all variations in between, utilising one or more teachers. Each class hub is supported by interactive projector technology and full wireless connectivity.

Five breakout areas enable other learning interactions throughout *Trasna*. The "maker" space offers teachers and students the opportunity for hands-on activities. The performance space is a favourite for the students for learning games and creative presentations. The amphitheatre space is great for peer teaching. The "free" library is a self-regulated initiative where students take and return books whenever they want. Finally, the "green screen" area allows for the integration of movie-making in any subject.

The Wave will continue to inform the redevelopment of spaces throughout the whole of the College.







Our vision at Thomas Carr College is to be a dynamic Catholic learning community, guided by the Gospel. To enable this vision, in 2012 the College embarked upon a 10-year Master Plan, investing \$22 million in capital development

In 2013, the \$7 million Bruce Runnalls Middle Years Centre, which accommodates Year 7 and 8 students, was completed.

A state of the art Performing Arts Centre, including a 500-seat auditorium, will be constructed in 2016, plus our existing gymnasium will be redeveloped.

Our Good Samaritan Country Campus located in Coragulac (11kms from Colac) at the former Good Samaritan Convent, has been extensively renovated and accommodates up to 30 students for the Year 9 country experience. Students spend three weeks at our country campus participating in outdoor education activities, community service and curriculum project work.

Thomas Carr College now offers Certificate II and III courses in building and construction in our purpose-built Trade Training Centre.

Our beautiful new Chapel is enhanced by unique art glass windows representing the life of our patron, along with specifically-crafted liturgical furniture enhancing this sacred space.

The Digital Classroom

In 2012, with the widespread use of digital technologies that can provide rich opportunities to enhance learning and teaching, Thomas Carr College committed to provide each student with an individual digital device. The College considers it critical that the culture and behaviours in relation to the use of digital technologies is taken into account.

Technology eSmart framework guides and supports schools to implement relevant cybersafety policies, practices and curriculum. It is designed to equip school communities to be safe and responsible when using digital devices.

In conjunction with this move to embrace digital technology, the College initiated a Parent Access Module (PAM) utilising SIMON, the College intranet. Parents are issued with a secure log-in which enables them to access live and up-to-date data on their child's progress, reports, assessment tasks, teacher comments, parent letters, and other relevant College information. It is easily accessible by logging in through the College website.

At Thomas Carr College, we value moderation and balance in the use of digital technology, therefore, when students take part in the country experience at the Good Samaritan Campus, they live, learn and work in a technology-free environment.



What Makes Us Special

Xavier College is the only Catholic school in Melbourne run by the Jesuits (The Society of Jesus) and the charism and priorities which flow from its Jesuit ethos do imbue the College. Xavier encourages its students to become 'Men and Women for Others' by living a life of love and service. This exhortation is supported by offering a wide range of opportunities for service.

For nearly 500 years, Jesuit education has pursued excellence in academic, sport, music and community service. By the time our students graduate in Year 12, not only will they have a well-rounded academic education, they would have completed a combined minimum of 26,000 hours of community service.

Xavier has a unique three-tiered model between its three campuses which begins at co-educational 3-year-old kindergarten at Burke Hall and Kostka Hall through to Year 4. Xavier has a boys Middle Years program from Year 5 to Year 8 and the boys then continue to the Senior Campus from Years 9-12 which also has a boarding facility.

Xavier is ranked as one of the highest performing schools, based on the VCE ATAR results and also has a comprehensive co-curricular program which encourages students to further their skills in various areas outside of the academic curriculum.

In 2016, Xavier will enter its 138th year. Xavier has a rich history, yet also fully embraces the possibilities of the fast unfolding new century. At Xavier, our students discover a life long love of learning and service to others.

The Digital Classroom

"Collaboration" highlights the digital classroom: Middle Years students mentor Early Years children in experiences like the Digital Buddies Program. We also draw on our students' expertise as they form the students' "Techsperts" group working alongside their teachers. Parents are supported in the choice of home devices and the school gives parents advice on safeguards for access through mobile devices. The best schooling still has at its heart, collaboration between school and home. The "digital age" also supports this with online contact between parents and teachers becoming increasingly more important - forwarding or receiving information, making appointments, checking on progress and monitoring school attendances. All students enhance their learning through the use of interactive whiteboards and present their learning in animations. movies and websites. All Middle Years students use SEQTA (or the student portal Connegt); we also heavily use Google tools in Middle Years and, increasingly, in the Early Years as well. SEQTA is also used for ongoing parental access to student marks in the continuous assessment model.

Coding has become an important educational concept in all learning, Kindergarten children use guick response codes to retrieve data. Middle Years students use their iPads creatively with a range of software, Year 7 students make global connections through Skype and in the Senior Years we see the use of SEQTA, Office 365, Google Apps for Education, Adobe Creative Cloud and other internet-

There is so much evidence of the "digital age" at school: based technologies, such as Quizlet, Socrative, Weebly and Wikispace. In the digital classroom, technology is integrated in all teaching and learning across the curriculum.



LEARNING MORE, CREATING CHANGE.

Catholic Schools share in a close partnership with Caritas Australia to end poverty, uphold dignity, and promote justice around the world. In 2015, a record 86% of Australian Catholic schools participated in Project Compassion, with school students and their families contributing almost \$3 million to our annual Lenten appeal.

This year marks fifty years of Project Compassion. Every year since 1965, our Caritas family demonstrates their extraordinary commitment of faith, love, generosity and compassion by supporting our Lenten appeal. With the support of schools, students and parents around the country, Project Compassion has grown from a modest act of alms giving to be one of the largest fundraising appeal of its kind in the country.

Fifty years ago, our first Lenten appeal raised the equivalent of \$90,000. Last year, Project Compassion contributed more than \$11.5 million towards Caritas Australia's humanitarian and long-term development programs in more than 35 countries, and with First Australian Communities.

Through Project Compassion we put our faith in action. With their creativity, energy and resolute commitment to just leadership, the next generation of Australian Catholic school students will send Project Compassion soaring to new heights!

This year, the theme for Project Compassion is: 'learning more, creating change'.

This year, we champion the many ways Caritas Australia works with local partners around the world to ensure all children, women and men can harness the power of education, training and shared knowledge.

As Pope Francis says: "Education is an act of hope." This year, Project Compassion reminds us how education, knowledge and skills can empower the world's most vulnerable communities to realise their hopes for peace, equality, dignity and justice.

Doney's Story - "now I have a vision."

Doney is a quiet and humble woman, but thanks to an innovative program supported by Caritas Australia, she's creating big changes in her life, and in her village.

Doney beams when she talks about how much her life has changed in the past five years. "My life has been transformed," she smiles. "I have a vision."

Located in East Africa, Malawi is one of the poorest countries in the world. Over half the population is living below the poverty line, with more than 80% of people living in rural communities, and relying on farming small plots of land to produce adequate food to live on.

In Doney's remote village in the Blantyre region, her family has often gone months without enough food. Yet, when Caritas Australia and the local Caritas began a program in Doney's village, they didn't simply see poverty and isolation, they saw strength and great potential.

Caritas worked with Doney's community to identify and build upon their strengths. Empowering the community to make the most of their land, our local partners trained families in new farming techniques, so they can produce more plentiful and reliable crops. Doney says, the problem of malnutrition in her household is an 'old song'.

As the community looked at their strengths, Doney's skills and passion for education were quickly recognised. "I was chosen by the community, and after that, CADECOM took me for training in Adult Literacy as a Facilitator," she says. Doney's training gave her the skills to teach literacy and numeracy to adults in the village.

Today, many more people are able to read and write and they know how to count money. Knowing how to count, tally and work with money is important because Caritas has introduced a Village Savings and Loan group as part of the program.

This group allows people to borrow money to invest in their own small businesses. Doney's husband Nedson is a tailor. With funds from the Village Savings and Loans program, the family can buy materials for him to sew. And with the profits they make from his business, the family can afford to send their children to school.




Today, Doney is determined that her five children will also have the chance to learn, to grow and to create the bright future they deserve. Even though just 7% of 15-24 year olds in Malawi complete secondary education, Doney is resolute: "I encourage my children to attain education so that they can be independent in the future," she says. "This would make me proud!"

Doney is proud of her new skills and of the fresh hope that her community has gained. With the support of Caritas Australia and our local partner, Doney's community has been able to harness and grow their strengths. Today, they are building new livelihoods, improving health and growing literacy to create paths towards a better future.
