





Catholic Education in the Global Village

The story of Catholic education in Australia dates back to the first decade of the 1800s, before Catholic priests were allowed in the fledgling colony. Lay women and men who had seen the power of forming young people

in the Faith began carrying on that tradition in their own homes. About 15 years later, the first of what we would today recognise as a Catholic school opened in Parramatta, starting a 200-year journey that has taken Catholic education to every corner of this country.

Australian Catholic schools were often established thanks to the generosity of lay people and run under the leadership of orders of religious women and men.

St Mary of the Cross MacKillop stands as a pioneer of Catholic education in our history, and especially in the history of educating disadvantaged children, girls and those in rural and regional Australia. Despite the ebbs and flows of government funding across two centuries, Catholic schools have always had a commitment to forming young people academically, physically, emotionally and spiritually.

As Pope Francis said back in 2014: "Education cannot be neutral. It is either positive or negative; either it enriches or it impoverishes; either it enables a person to grow or it lessens, even corrupts him. The mission of schools is to develop a sense of truth, of what is good and beautiful."

Catholic schools seek to imbue truth, goodness and beauty in each community in which they operate, including in the many new suburbs and towns where Catholic school systems are the first to take up the challenge of providing an education for children. It is not an overstatement to say that it's hard to imagine schooling in Australia without Catholic education.

One in six Australian schools is a Catholic school. In some remote parts of Western Australia and the Northern Territory, a Catholic school is the only school in the community. The impact of any Catholic school is significant; the impact of a Catholic school when it's the only school within a few hundred kilometres is immeasurable.

Each Catholic school across our nation is unique. Each has its set of individual strengths, as well as its particular challenges. But despite that school being a vibrant and dynamic and transformative unit, it's also part of a growing network of 1,740 Catholic schools that are forming young people to see themselves as truly part of something bigger than themselves.

Think of your local Catholic schools. Think of the outreach that takes place in support of the local, national and international community. Those schools are forming young people into citizens who have a sense of justice and a sense of service – citizens that know that life isn't all about "me", but about being part of a global village to which we can all contribute.

Think of how local schools are forming young people in that way. Now multiply that effort by 1,740 and you'll get a sense of the difference Catholic schools are making in this country – and in our world.





ACU and The Global Village

This momentum is exemplified by the National School of Arts at ACU. where world-class researchers come together with award-winning teachers to provide an exceptional educational experience for students that sets them up for life. In 2017, ACU was ranked in the top 2-3% of universities for Arts and Humanities worldwide. This achievement is evidence of the University's growing reputation for excellence in a range of disciplines, most notably History, Politics, International Relations, Sociology and Literature. At ACU, the future of Arts looks very bright indeed.

This success notwithstanding, doubts persist in some quarters about the value of studying the Arts, **Humanities and Social Sciences** at university. Historically, students who expressed an interest in doing a BA were asked why, the assumption being that it was an indulgent pursuit that wouldn't lead to a clearly-defined job. While old attitudes die hard, the world has changed almost beyond recognition. In today's 'global village', where core human values will shape the tide of technological innovation, the old stereotypes about Arts look woefully outdated.

The evidence for the 'real world' value of Arts is compelling. In Australia today, Arts graduates

have lower unemployment than the national rate and higher mid-career salaries than Science graduates. But they are also thriving internationally, with qualities that are highly prized by global employers in the workforce of the twenty-first century. Who would have thought that 60% of industry leaders in the United Kingdom had completed a Humanities, Social Sciences or Arts degree at university?

Consider this too. Young people today will experience about seven career changes in their lives. This means that a vocational degree – leading to one clearly-defined job – may no longer be the most practical choice for students. When government or industry signals that they are on the lookout for well-rounded graduates who can apply their skills in new ways to meet new challenges, this should be music to the ears of prospective Arts students because this is the greatest strength of Arts graduates.

The best thing about Arts graduates is they keep on learning. They understand context, communicate clearly and respond well to change. They are also outward looking, equipped to engage with diverse cultural perspectives, locally and globally. In a modern job market that values flexibility and diversity above all else, Arts graduates stand out as both 'work ready' and 'world ready'. It is not surprising that so many people who have carved out successful careers in law, politics, journalism, business, government, education and the creative industries have studied the Humanities and Social Sciences at university.

But what makes Arts at ACU so special? Why might students choose to study with us? Some will no doubt be attracted by our rising profile – the fact that we have been recognised for excellence in international rankings. Others will be drawn to our student-centred learning environment - an environment characterised by small class sizes, flexible pathways through our degrees and engaging teaching staff who know their students' names, provide personalised learning support and celebrate their students' successes. For still others the key appeal will be our graduate outcomes - our reputation for producing exceptional graduates who engage the world with confidence and purpose.

In Arts at ACU, the world is our classroom. We recognise that the modern workforce requires globallyfocused citizens who understand different worldviews, are crossculturally competent and empathise with the life experiences of different peoples. In addition to an engaging curriculum informed by contemporary international issues, we offer our students rich opportunities to further their studies overseas. From semester-long exchanges with one of our 90 international partner universities, to intensive units of study taught by ACU staff in locations such as New York, Rome, London, Venice and Beijing, 200 Arts students at ACU have benefited from international learning experiences over the past year. These students have discovered that studying overseas is a transformative learning experience that builds their confidence, broadens their perspectives and gives them an edge in the global job market.

While becoming 'work ready' is a key outcome of studying Arts at ACU, developing socially aware and ethically-minded graduates who aspire to use their knowledge and skills in the service of others is at the core of what we do. Students in the School of Arts are encouraged to recognise and help ameliorate disadvantage in local and global contexts. For example, in our core second-year community engagement unit, we encourage students to see how urgent 'global problems'. such as poverty, exist in our own communities. This year students in this unit have participated in the Big Idea Competition - 'Australia's leading social enterprise immersion and competition for university students'. There, they have had the opportunity to apply the research, critical thinking and problem-solving skills developed in their Bachelor of Arts degree to come up with actual solutions to real-world problems. This is precisely the kind of 'hands-on' experience that future employers will be looking for.

ACU's National School of Arts is gearing up for an exciting few years ahead. Our offerings are expanding to include innovative new degrees in diverse areas, including global politics and creative practice; we have study tours planned for Rome and New York; and we are welcoming a large number of new teaching staff who will further enrich our expertise in history, politics and international relations, and sociology.

Our School is a lively intellectual community for students who wish to engage with pressing global issues and who aspire to make the world a better place.

Professor Ondaatje is a prize-winning researcher in American history, and in 2012, was awarded the Max Crawford Medal, 'Australia's most prestigious award for achievement and promise in the humanities'. Parents as First Educators in the Global Village

The history of Catholic School Parents Australia (CSPA) is relatively short however the story of parents and Catholic education in Australia goes back nearly 200 years to 1820 with the opening of the first Catholic school in Parramatta. Formed in late 2013, CSPA has quickly established itself as the national body for parents-carers with children in the 1740 Catholic schools across Australia. Now, more so than ever, it takes the whole global village to educate the child, and with great pride and responsibility parents are 'the first and most important educators of their own children' (Pope John Paul II, 1994).

Driven by our core values of *Integrity,* Respect, Faith and *Inclusivity*, CSPA supports and celebrates the holistic education (cognitive, social, physical, ethical and spiritual) offered to students in Catholic schools.

What does CSPA do?

Catholic School Parents Australia:

- Advocates for families with children and young people in Australian Catholic schools;
- · Represents these families to

education authorities such as NCEC and ACARA and governments;

- Supports and provides national leadership to the State and Territory parent bodies working with Catholic schools;
- Works with such agencies as the Australian government and the Australian Research Alliance for Children and Youth (ARACY) to support, explore and promote Parent Engagement as an influence on student learning; and
- Collaborates with the National Catholic Education Commission (NCEC) in all matters pertaining to parents as partners in Catholic education.

Currently, a key undertaking of CSPA is the exploration of Parent Engagement practices in schools across all school sectors nationwide. Working in partnership with the University of Southern Queensland (USQ) and ARACY, CSPA has used funding from the Australian Government's Department of Education and Training (DET) to survey and interview principals and interview parents about Parent

Engagement. A key outcome of this research will be, during 2018, the generation of tool kits outlining for principals, teachers and parents – carers, contemporary Parent Engagement strategies that enhance student learning and well-being.

CSPA is keen to get this right as respected research has shown that when parents engage in their children's learning, they develop a stronger belief in education (Pushor, 2007) and their children are likely to:

- · achieve higher grades;
- · stay at school longer;
- develop better social skills:
- have improved behaviour;
- · graduate successfully; and
- transition to post-secondary education.

(Emerson, Fear, Fox and Sanders, 2012).

If undertaken effectively, Parent Engagement can be a cost effective way for not only a parent – carer to improve their child's learning and well-being, but also for the globally connected village of Australia to assist their students in stepping up to another level of performance.



Tony O'Byrne is the inaugural Chair of CSPA, a position he has held since 2013. Tony was principal of Aquinas College at Ringwood for 25 years up until 2013. Tony's three children were educated in Catholic schools and he currently works for Melbourne Catholic Education.

Hidden Costs of Education

■ ave you started savings for your child's education? Understanding the total cost of education might give you a reason to. When it comes to planning your child's education, there are several factors most families consider, from the quality of the education, range of subject options, academic achievement, school values and ethos, and family tradition. And, although cost may not be the number one factor when making this important decision, research by ASG¹ suggests that the estimated total cost of a Catholic education² has risen by 57 per cent in the last decade, which makes cost a growing consideration for many families. Information from the Australian Bureau of Statistics also indicates that the cost of education across all sectors has risen by 64 per cent over the past 10 years, which is more than double the increase in inflation.3

Luckily, finding out the fees and levies associated with a particular school, and comparing schools across a range of criteria is relatively easy to do, especially with resources such as Catholic Schools Guide.

What some parents fail to consider however are the additional costs associated with education that sometimes go unrecognised until their children actually start school.

Research conducted by ASG1, an education savings and scholarship benefit fund provider in Australia, illustrates that costs such as uniforms, books, extracurricular activities, technology and excursions or school trips in 2017 can actually represent 27 per cent of the total costs for a child attending a Catholic secondary school in metropolitan Australia. Families planning on sending their child born in 2017 through a Catholic education could face additional costs of close to \$50,000 over 13 years.

ASG CEO John Velegrinis says Australians are fortunate to have excellent government, systemic and private schools to choose from, but costs can spiral out of control. "We advocate parents use a disciplined approach by putting a little bit away each week so they can financially afford to meet their children's educational goals and aspirations."



Independent statistician and Managing Director of foreseechange Charlie Nelson says a range of economic factors influence the cost of education. "Employment growth, hourly wages and inflation all impact the cost of living, which puts extra strain on the family budget. With school fees likely to rise further, it has never been more important for parents to financially plan for their child's future."

Careful planning and budgeting now can of course help families ensure there are no surprises during the first year of school.

ASG provides a cost and savings calculator on their website— www.asg.com.au which can help you understand the various estimated costs associated with the different types and stages of education, which may help you with your planning.

Find out what uniform costs are now and likely to be when your child starts school

- Uniforms can be expensive, and will most likely need to be updated as your child grows up.
- Ask the school about uniform costs and find out if there is a second-hand uniform store.
- You may also want to find out if the school is looking to update or change uniforms in the near future.



Get a feel for current book, technology and stationery costs

 Find out what the average book list cost is at each year level to see what the likely costs could be when your child starts school.



Find out if there are additional levies during the school period

 It might be worthwhile confirming with the school if they are planning on any additional levies to cover things like buildings or refurbishment over the coming years.



Find out whether or not all trips and excursions are included in the school fees and levies

 Confirm with the school the policies around school trips and excursions and if these costs are included in the annual fee schedule.



Find out if here are any special activities, such as exchanges or overseas trips, that your child may want to attend

Cultural and language exchanges or excursions are great opportunities
for students to learn and experience new cultures and countries.
If you think you'd like your child to participate in these types of
experiences, it might be worthwhile finding out from the school when
and how much these types of trips or experiences cost to ensure that
you can plan for these additional costs as they come up.



Understand whether there are costs for things like school band or sporting equipment

 Participating in school music or sporting programs can also mean additional costs for purchasing or renting instruments or equipment.
 These costs can vary, and if your child participates in a number of activities, they can add up quickly.

Principal faith to life

Bringing faith to life

ost of us wouldn't know much about the Central African Republic. A landlocked country in the middle of Africa, it is home to around 4.6 million people. Despite being the site of ongoing conflict between Christian and Muslim militias in recent years, it is rarely featured in our news here in Australia.

But in 2015, the Central African Republic did make the news – and not for another outbreak of violence. In November that year, Pope Francis launched the Catholic Church's Year of Mercy in Bangui, the country's capital. Opening the Holy Door of the Cathedral in front of a crowd of onlookers, the Pope declared that the city was, that day, 'the spiritual capital of the world'.

Traditionally, only churches in Rome have had Holy Doors. They are generally designated during jubilee years so that pilgrims may walk through them to receive the plenary indulgences that are available to them during those celebrations. The Year of Mercy was the first time a Pope had allowed Holy Doors to be designated in other dioceses. The Central African Republic, which few could even find on a map, was the first place where a Door of Mercy was opened.

Pope Francis has spoken about what he terms the 'globalisation of indifference', which often arises as a defence mechanism when people are confronted with the overwhelming difficulties facing people around the world. It's difficult not to despair at the endless stories of violence and conflict in our media. Sometimes we can feel like the only option is to turn off, to focus on the immediate needs of ourselves and those closest to us.

But, in his travels and in his speeches, Pope Francis puts forward an alternative approach – one that doesn't just focus on our own needs and goals, but sees each of us as part of a different type of global community.

"To the modern concept of the intellectual working for the realisation of self and in search of personal recognition, it is necessary to counter with a model built on solidarity, which works for the common good and for peace', he told a group of international students last year. 'In this way, young people are formed who thirst for truth and not power, ready to defend their values and live mercy and charity, which are the fundamental pillars for a healthier society."

There is an enormous blessing that comes from being part of a globalised Church. It allows us to experience a solidarity with Christian communities in places like the Central African Republic that have been torn apart by conflict. Organisations like Caritas and Catholic Mission offer a way for Catholic schools to contribute in a meaningful way to the lives of people in those communities. Students might even go on immersion trips where they connect with Catholic communities in developing countries.

Catholic communities here in Australia are also enriched by being part of a globalised Church. Many parishes welcome priests from overseas, and host regular liturgies for migrant groups. Our Catholic schools attract families from different backgrounds, many of whom first connected with the Church in countries a long way from Australia. They trust that the values that they were raised with will also be passed on to their children because our Church is a universal one.

Once you start to see yourself as part of a worldwide community of people with the same values and interests, other barriers also start to fall down. While he was in the Central African Republic, Pope Francis made a visit to a mosque that had been besieged by Christian militias.

"Christians and Muslims are brothers and sisters", he said to the men gathered inside. "Together we must say no to hatred, to revenge and to violence, particularly that violence which is perpetrated in the name of a religion or of God himself. God is peace. Salaam."

While globalisation has many detractors, there are in reality two types of globalisation – that which creates inequality and conflict, pushing people apart; and that which creates peace

and prosperity, turning people into brothers and sisters.

Under the leadership of Pope Francis, the Catholic Church is becoming more of a beacon to those who look for that latter type of globalisation, where the concerns of those at the forgotten margins of our world are the centre of attention for the global community.

As Jesuit priest Fr David Holdcroft recent wrote in Eureka Street, "Francis' approach was not primarily theological; it was in the first place pastoral and active. It was to travel and place himself at the centre of people's lived experience, withholding moral judgement, but helping its participants to situate their experience – and suffering – within a larger narrative and analysis."

Fr Holdcroft points to Pope Francis' homily on the island of Lampedusa, the landing place of many boat migrants attempting to find passage to Europe, and where it's impossible to forget the many who perished trying to make the journey.

"The culture of comfort, which makes us think only of ourselves, makes us insensitive to the cries of other people, makes us live in soap bubbles which, however lovely, are insubstantial', said Pope Francis. 'In this globalized world, we have fallen into globalized indifference. We have become used to the suffering of others: it doesn't affect me; it doesn't concern me; it's none of my business!"

He continued, "Let us ask the Lord for the grace to weep over our indifference, to weep over the cruelty of our world, of our own hearts, and of all those who in anonymity make social and economic decisions which open the door to tragic situations like this."

In a sense, what Pope Francis has done is made the peripheries the heart of our Church. With Pope Francis, the heart of our Church is no longer Rome. The heart is wherever the lost and abandoned congregate, wherever the desperate cry out for help, wherever victims seek shelter. The heart of a globalised Church is at the margins – the same place that Jesus lived.







Marshall McLuhan, who coined the term 'global village', likened the vast network of communications systems around the globe to one extended central nervous system, ultimately linking everyone in the world. And there is no doubt that Assumption College maintains strong links with many people well beyond Kilmore. ACK works with our fellow Marists in Timor-Leste (East Timor), and every year staff and students spend time there with local people. We are also raising funds to refurbish our sister school in Laumana.

We have close ties to the Indigenous community of Santa Teresa in the Northern Territory. A group of our staff and students annually immerse themselves in the culture, spend time with the locals and do a variety of jobs alongside them. Our Indigenous Liaison Officer, Jenny Pendlebury, is a welcoming presence at the college, and due to our strong commitment to reconciliation, a group of staff and students have become FIRE (friends igniting reconciliation through education) carriers. This project is an initiative of the Aboriginal Catholic Ministry and the Opening the Doors Foundation.

As well as immersions to Timor-Leste and Santa Teresa, our senior students can travel to France and Italy. These study tours, in the company of teachers, are available to those who study French, Italian, history, politics and art. They visit the usual tourist attractions as well as places linked to Marist Brothers' founder St Marcellin Champagnat. Returning from an immersion or overseas tour, students often comment that the experience has been life-changing, and they feel a real connection with those who made them feel so welcome.

What Makes Us Special

Caroline Chisholm Catholic College is a co-educational secondary College in Melbourne's inner west, dedicated to learning excellence in an engaged, faith-filled and supportive environment. The College supports students to be the best they are called to be, whether academically with Science and Mathematics, artistically with Music and Drama, hands-on in our trade training centre or in out-of-classroom areas, such as sport and social justice. The all-girls and all-boys junior campuses cover Years 7 to 9, whilst the senior coeducational campus from Years 10 to 12 offers VCE, VET and VCAL programs. Our students' academic results are strong: 95% of our Year 12 students have gone onto tertiary education, and in 2016, we achieved a median study score of 30 for the first time. Our College Dux achieved a 99.5 ATAR and three students were successful in achieving scholarships, including a Dean's Scholarship Engineering at Swinburne.

Although students achieve excellent academic success. the College believes education is more than just a score. Students' strengths also lie in music, drama, new technologies, trades and community engagement. There are a number of extension programs, including international exchanges with schools in Japan and Italy; Aspire, our accelerated educational and enrichment program; Encore Music for students in Years 7 to 9: and a partnership with Australian Catholic University enabling Year 12 students to study tertiary subjects while at the College. Modern facilities include a swimming pool, 850 seat auditorium, two libraries, a wholly-owned outdoor education campus, and in 2018, the opening of a new performing arts centre. Each student is known and valued in our inclusive multicultural community.

Global Village

As a College we offer annual cultural exchanges to and from Japan and Italy through our Languages department and sister schools. Students immerse themselves in the customs, language and way of life. We are in process of re-establishing links with Caroline Chisholm School in Middlesex, UK, and forging new ones with schools in China.

Students showcase their talents through a music immersion excursion to Tenant Creek as well as at various College and non-College events.

Students also participate in annual local ANZAC Day parades as well as representing the College at various other events.

We sponsor a teacher's salary at a Jesuit College in East Timor and raise funds annually for Caritas. We are also working with Caritas to establish an exchange program that reflects Catholic Social Teaching (CST) principles based on respect and dignity for those we will visit in the near future.

We participate in World Youth Day and the Australian Catholic Youth Festival, as well as outreach programs for refugees and migrants in our community. We offer parents English as a second language via after school classes.

We are a member of the Food Security Network and harvest fresh produce for the Asylum Seeker Resource

Fundraising from our Mission Action Day is distributed to support international Lasallian communities, especially our "twinning" program, which supports schools in Pakistan and Papua New Guinea. Our students benefit from the international network of hundreds of Lasallian schools, and through this, are provided with limitless opportunities.

Our students have numerous opportunities to connect and engage with international communities though social justice immersion experiences in Sri Lanka and Papua New Guinea and a cultural exchange in the Philippines available each year, along with student exchange and study experiences in France, Italy and Hong Kong, Mandarin is available alongside our established French and Italian programs. Our senior students travel to an indigenous community in Wilcannia, NSW, to support local parish building works. In addition, our senior cricketers tour Sri Lanka to compete with our Lasallian partners there and the more adventurous visit New Zealand for the annual snow/ adventure trip.

Within the formal curriculum, our boys take advantage of progressive technology to connect with unlimited resources, organisations and companies. We are also using technology to build connections and relationships with our Lasallian schools in Singapore, Pakistan and Hong Kong.



Our newest facility, the Galilee Centre, was opened in July 2017 and houses a 250-seat Lecture Theatre, 4 Language Rooms, VCAL, Careers, College Psychologists and Education Support. Our Y9@E Program located at the Burwood Campus offers Emmaus students wonderful opportunities for innovative and engaging learning, while maintaining academic rigour during this pivotal year in secondary education.

We encourage our students to strive to be their very best in all aspects of life. We are confident that our co-educational environment provides a more realistic way of preparing young people to take their places naturally in the wider community. In the contemporary society in which we live, it makes perfect sense for young people to be together in a co-educational environment during their formative teenage to young adult years. Emmaus has an outstanding Housebased pastoral care program that aims to meet the personal needs of students with key elements being respect, positive relationships, responsibility and resilience. Social justice programs, leadership opportunities, performing arts, sport and a range of other co-curricular programs help ensure our students feel very much part of the Emmaus community. Great schools cannot exist without great students. We are proud of our students and confident that they will continue to be active contributors to society.

Global Village

State-of-the-art ICT infrastructure and a one-to-one device program allows a digital connection to the world. Our Language program also opens up multiple opportunities to be globally connected. Students have the opportunity to study Indonesian, Italian and German, We have successful, longstanding Sister School relationships with schools in Jakarta, Indonesian, Pinerolo, Italy and north western Germany. Regular formalised Exchange Programs exist with these Language Sister Schools.

Emmaus College also has a Sister School in the USA. Kennedy Catholic High School is located in Seattle and there are visits either to or from the USA each year. Emmaus has also been able to offer, on a long-standing basis, a European tour for senior students. This three-week tour takes in many of the world-famous landmarks in Western Europe, Emmaus has also initiated a World War One tour to Gallipoli and the Western Front. There have also been a number of Performing Arts tours to New York, with workshops during the day, and Broadway shows in the evening! Our Year 9 students (Y9@E) have the option of a two-week World Challenge experience in Thailand, immersing themselves in the local culture, and undertaking a community outreach program.

On a more local level, Emmaus College has a strong focus on Indigenous issues, participating in the many Reconciliation and NAIDOC Week activities. Students who participate in our Year 11/12 Central Australia tour experience a visit to an Indigenous community - which is one of the many highlights of the trip.

To further encourage our students' passion for languages and developing international relationships, Loyola College has official sister school relationships with schools in France, Italy and Indonesia, and students are able to participate in a biannual reciprocal exchange program.

In addition to the languages curriculum, Lovola College staff have been working hard to develop meaningful ways of formally integrating intercultural understanding into our year 7 – 10 curriculum. This includes, but is not limited to: a year 9 Surf Coast Walk, where students spend three days engaging with a local indigenous man who teaches them about the land and about his culture, and also the year 8 High Resolves program, where students learn to view themselves as global citizens and learn to challenge their unconscious biases. As a Jesuit partner school, Loyola College also has a strong focus on social justice and allows opportunities for our students to participate in immersion tours to East Timor and the Philippines, where the students experience first-hand the local culture and aim to help the communities both by sharing their skills and knowledge and by providing them with valuable resources.

Global Village

Languages at Marcellin are an integral focus for the students in our College to not only develop skills, but to engage in the broader world context. Considering the breadth of the opportunities in their futures, a greater cultural exposure enables students to see beyond their lives in Australia. Chinese, Italian and Indonesian are all taught at Marcellin with the opportunity for students to attend Language and Visual Arts focused immersions.

Remar is a school-based Marist Youth Ministry that operates in Marist schools across the world. The program offers a range of community solidarity activities as part of a lived expression of Christian faith. The second year Remar students attend a Solidarity Camp, held in Bourke, NSW, where our boys are exposed to, and support, an indigenous community.

The Marist Solidarity Immersion to Cambodia commenced in 2011 and is an integral part of the wider culture of our College. Most of the immersion is spent in Pailin, a region on the Thai/Cambodian border. The pilgrim group, comprising of Year 11 students and staff, works with the Marist Brothers and their community at Pailin in solidarity with the other.

Our Saint Marcellin Champagnat Award provides an opportunity for Old Collegians to take part in a Marist Solidarity project in Johannesburg, South Africa, to live and work with some of the most marginalised children in Africa. Participants have found this experience of putting faith into action to be profoundly moving.







Parade students choose from three languages, Japanese, French and Italian. They can participate in a two-week Japanese Exchange Program with our sister school near Nagoya, a three-week Italian immersion program offered biennially and students taking French can study abroad during the Christmas break.

Every opportunity is taken to celebrate the important role that multiculturalism has played in our history. Evidence of this is especially found in the tutoring of refugee students at the St. Alban's Community Centre by our boys.

Parade has four indigenous students from Halls Creek and Wyndham via the WUNAN Project. We are certainly richer because of their involvement at the College. Students also visit Lake Mungo to appreciate Indigenous culture and their connection with the land. Other pilgrimages take staff and students to Ireland, India and Africa. An appreciation of the Christian Brothers work is gained and a real understanding of the less fortunate on the world scene is experienced.

World Challenge is an amazing program that runs biennially and has taken students to Mongolia and Tibet. Recently, students visited, Laos, Cambodia, Thailand and China. These visits are always coupled with a community project and working closely with local groups. Science has allowed students to visit Cuba and Indonesia, gaining an understanding of local culture and also working on a volunteer basis. Students work closely with leading scientists on biological and conservation management research programs and get to dive through their accreditation as PADI divers.

Global Village

This portfolio encompasses both the academic component of school and the pastoral aspect in acknowledgment that when students feel connected to school, their educational outcomes improve. Indigenous perspectives continue to be an important aspect of studies in a range of subjects from Years 7 – 12. Year 7s explore the ancient history of Australia's first peoples. Year 8s explore the significance of landscapes to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples and Year 9 incorporate Indigenous Australian stories into their studies of ancient myths and legends.

Three Languages are offered at Penola Catholic College: French, Italian and Japanese. The Faculty offers a wide range of experiences and activities: Immersion Days for Senior Students, Languages Week, Overseas Trips with Homestay with each of our sister schools in France, Italy and Japan, Digital and Audio Language Laboratories, Transition activities with feeder primary schools, Language Clubs and computer and multi-media facilities. Year 9 students of Italian also have the opportunity to be a part of a CLIL class. CLIL stands for Content and Language Integrated Learning. This class will be immersed in the Italian language through the study of Religious Education and Humanities in Italian. For the first time, our Year 12 students have studied 1st year Italian at the University of Melbourne. We welcome all!



Global Village

This is achieved through a variety of opportunities including cultural and service exchange, immersion, reconciliation and interfaith dialogue programs. Siena College's sister school agreement with Theresa D'Avila School, Lille, France and an exchange agreement with Le Pensionnat du Sacre Couer School in Rheims. France, facilitate an educational and cultural partnership between students. teachers and parents. Students studying Italian and Chinese can participate in cultural immersions to these countries where they visit local schools and stay with local families.

Stepping out of their comfort zone and immersing themselves completely in cultures far removed from their urban environments, students can participate in the South African and Indigenous Immersion programs. In the South African program, students and staff stay with local families who have been impacted by endemic poverty and inequity. They are given an insight into living below the breadline, while also developing an understanding of the courage, determination and faith of the women and families of the Kopanang Community. Through the Indigenous Immersion, students visit a local indigenous school and camp on indigenous owned land, while learning the customs and wisdoms generously shared by their indigenous hosts.

Reconciliation and interfaith dialogue programs are offered through the Building Bridges and FIRE Carriers projects.

Established in 1996, Simonds Catholic College is located across two inner city campuses in West Melbourne and Fitzroy North. They come by every mode of transport accompanied by parents who represent 40 nationalities. Although 80% of our students were born in Australia, over 50% speak a language other than English at home.

When they arrive, some of these new Year 7 students will learn Italian through to at least Year 9, while others will choose to learn Japanese. Some will continue to study Italian or Japanese through to VCE, or elect to study another language externally. When they reach Year 9 and 10, some will choose to travel on overseas study tours that incorporate home-stays that make their experiences all the more real.

But none of them really need to travel anywhere to understand that people live in different ways and believe different things, because every day they are encountering cultural differences simply by studying, eating and playing with their classmates. Whether they are cooking falafels in Food Tech or researching pandemics on their iPads, they are doing these things in one of the two Simonds Catholic College campuses, each of which is a microcosm of multicultural Melbourne, and a global village in its own right.





St Joseph's College specialises in boys' education and understands the varying needs of boys growing up in the 21st century. We apply innovative and progressive teaching methods to maximise boys' engagement. Our curriculum is designed specifically to cater for boys' needs with a 'hands on' approach to learning. We have a renowned Year 9 program known as 'Valdocco' which focuses on respect, responsibilities, relationships and rehearsal. We offer 24 elective subjects in Year 9, including viticulture, animal husbandry, advanced heath and fitness, cycle cross, advanced mathematics and music 'noiseworks'. There are several programs and opportunities offered to our students. One of these programs is our Life Skills program which teaches boys how to become responsible and honest citizens within and beyond their community. Our students are equipped with iPads and MacBooks from the beginning of their journey through St Joseph's College. We also offer an advanced sports program with 15+ sports on offer, after school tuition for all students four nights a week and six international experiences per year.

As a Catholic school in the Salesian tradition, students have the opportunity to be part of the Caligiero Program where they spend time in an overseas country where there is a Salesian presence.

Our students are connected to the wider world in many ways through digital technologies which are a core part of the learning programs. We begin our connections at the local level with our innovative, flexible and digitally enhanced learning spaces in Becchi (Year 7 area).



St Monica's College, Epping is a vibrant coeducational community of students, staff and parents, which embodies the truths and values of the Gospel of Jesus Christ in its structures, processes and styles of relating. We are a leader in the areas of literacy and numeracy, committed to supporting all students in the development of these essential life skills.

The College employs specialist staff with expertise in the education of highly able students: HORIZONS - Accelerated Learning Program; and Arrunga – Year 8 inclusive Autistic Program, students with learning difficulties and integration programs. Our LOTE Learning Centre teaches Italian, French, Greek, Spanish and Japanese, and includes a bilingual immersion program (CLIL) in Japanese and Italian. The College provides an extensive range of VCE offerings. VET and VCAL programs are offered on site and students have access to the VCAL Hub, a purpose-built facility. The College also has a strong commitment to the pastoral care of students. and incorporates a pastoral program in the curriculum at all levels. Five College Educational Psychologists are available to support students and parents.

The co-curricular programs are vast. Star of the Sea College students are encouraged to become advocates for others, both at the College and in the broader community. Dialogue between students and staff about matters that directly impact on the health and happiness of all students is encouraged and acted upon wherever possible, with an emphasis on empowering students to articulate and defend their views.

Formal opportunities for leadership abound, starting at Year 7 with students having opportunities to develop leadership skills. The student-led Music Festival is one area where leadership is associated with collaborative skills. In a limited time frame, students peer teach choral and dance moves for their House, culminating in a competition over three nights.

The Communications Captain chairs the Student Advisory Panel comprising representatives from each year level. The panel meets to discuss issues raised by students.

Students initiated, and actively participated in, a broad range of discussions that have led to change at the College: the new uniform design, the development of the mobile phone usage policy, the improvement of College facilities, the roles of Year 7 to 10 leaders, the menu at the Nagle Café, and Starwise, the pastoral wellbeing program implemented across all year levels.

Students in Year 9 have the unique experience of studying in the historic building, Kamesburgh Mansion, on the ANZAC campus on North Road, Brighton. They work closely with the residents and day visitors to the centre as part of their community outreach.

Global Village

Star of the Sea College creatively commemorates International Women's Day, raising awareness of issues such as human slavery and trafficking which are confronting women across the globe. Cultural diversity is a lived experience through our extensive Social Justice program: video conferences with students in Pakistan and Jordan around issues of wealth distribution, the environment, women and justice; Friday Night Tutoring with refugees in Richmond, Soup Van and Sacred Heart Mission in St Kilda; and dialogue with local Islamic students about faith and environmental justice.

A key student/teacher immersion experience is the Vietnam tour which occurs every second year. In this program, students build houses and visit orphanages as they immerse themselves in the Vietnamese culture. Three vibrant and dynamic language programs are offered from Year 7 to Year 12 – Japanese, German and Italian – and students have the opportunity to attend exchange or immersion programs in each language. In 2018, the Science faculty is embarking on a USA Space Camp study tour focusing on Young Women in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics). The itinerary includes the Advanced Space Academy in Alabama, Smithsonian Institute's Museums in Washington DC and Cape Canaveral, and Universal Studios in Florida. These educational experiences will be complemented by collaborative opportunities for students in fields as diverse as robotics, electrical engineering, forensic science and genetics. For example, Year 8 students are working with Engineers Without Borders to design and create a flat-pack chair made out of cardboard which could be used for the homeless or in the area of disaster relief.

Thomas Carr College is an innovative educational community, providing the latest technology, buildings and facilities. We offer an engaging curriculum, equipping our students with knowledge, skills and attributes for the future. Powerful learning is facilitated by dedicated staff who nurture faith and positive relationships. The holistic education provided helps students to develop independence, informed decision making, and respect for themselves and others. In 2014, the College completed the first stage of a multi-million dollar building program with the construction of a \$7-million contemporary Learning Centre for Year 7 and 8 students. Thomas Carr College recently opened a campus in Coragulac. The Good Samaritan Campus is a former convent located near Colac. Our Year 9 students are given the opportunity to embark on a 3-week Country Experience using these facilities.

In 2015, the College's \$3-million Trade Training Centre was opened allowing for the delivery of Certificate II and III courses in Carpentry, Furniture Making, Brick and Block laying. In 2017, the College opened a state of the art Performing Arts Centre, which includes a 500-seat auditorium, the latest technical production equipment, dedicated drama and music rooms, and a recording studio. In 2018, the College will introduce its Magis Program for gifted students in Year 7. The Magis Program is designed to cater for the needs of the academically gifted student who demonstrates above average abilities.

In the spirit of Archbishop Thomas Carr, young men and women are encouraged to strive for excellence according to their individual gifts and are challenged to pursue justice in the world.

Global Village

Thomas Carr is committed to providing opportunities for students to engage with the world. Each year, students travel to a range of countries to immerse themselves in other languages and cultures. These study tours provide wonderful opportunities for our students to connect with young people from other parts of the world. The College has also extended its Alumni to include those graduating from the VCE in China. Since 2009, this program has enabled staff and students from both countries to travel. live and study alongside each other. In such an increasingly interconnected world, we value the relationships and learning that arises through this program.

Since the College's inception in 1997, our students have been encouraged to "take their place in the global community". The VCE in China program provides real opportunities for Australian and Chinese students to build their global competence and skill sets so that they can confidently enter a globalised workforce with finely tuned intercultural communications skills that the enable them to interact with a diverse group of co-workers. Thomas Carr College enjoys a long standing sister school relationship with The Margie School in Surabaya, which is located on the island of Java in Indonesia. Year 10 and 11 students have the opportunity to visit The Margie School as part of our student exchange program. The College has a wellestablished Italian language program and offers a biennial study tour to Italy. Students explore the language, culture, architecture and history of various parts of Italy.


Global Village

The College also provides an ever-expanding schedule of international tours and experiences for senior students. In 2018, the College is hosting tours to France, Belgium and Germany to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the end of World War I and will also host a tour to Japan for our language students.

Every three years, the football program conducts a playing tour of Ireland and England, while our basketball program regularly hosts tours to the USA and New Zealand.

We host bi-annual trips to the Kokoda Track and, in 2017. our Performing Arts students travelled to New York and participated in workshops with some of the world's leading stage show specialists on Broadway.



Janaki is a young entrepreneur from Nepal, who has turned her life around. Growing up in a world of poverty and disadvantage, coupled with a forced marriage at the age of twelve, she was in a very vulnerable position. Even more so when her husband died just two years into their marriage. She's now running her own successful sewing business and has become an inspirational community leader.

In 2015, Janaki joined a youth club formed by Caritas Australia partners, Caritas Nepal and the Ekata Foundation Surkhet, as part of the Children and Youth Empowerment Program (CYEP) which provides youth with job skills and income-generating projects. She took a loan from the youth club to purchase her first sewing machine.

Two years on, Janaki has 11 sewing machines and is running her own business, teaching others, and is considered a community role model.

"My confidence level has raised," Janaki says. "I appreciate all those respected peoples of Australia who are supporting this wise cause. Through their help, women who experience domestic violence and who are financially vulnerable are getting new hope in their life. I thank them from bottom of my heart."
