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

How can we Prepare our Children for the Future of Work?

One of the fundamental challenges for humankind is how we respond to change. For John Henry Newman, "to live is to change". This applies to our work as much as anything else. Work has, is, and always will be changing. It is no surprise that Newman published his thoughts on change in 1845 towards the end of the first industrial revolution. During this time, work was transformed by new technologies, such as mechanisation, through steam and water power. Electricity and internal combustion engines powered the second industrial revolution that followed only decades later yielding an era of mass production and factories. Then came a third revolution with the advent of computers and increasing automation.

We are currently facing the challenge of the fourth industrial revolution, or trendily, 'Industry 4.0' or even 'I4'. This is the age of the robot. Cyber systems will increasingly feature in our working and daily lives. The Cybermen first appeared in *Dr Who* in 1966, and by 1972, the comedy *Sleeper* depicted a future with robotic butlers. In 1979, the car manufacturer Fiat ran a 2-minute advertisement for a car showing the production of the vehicle and concluded "The Strada Handbuilt by Robots". The robots are coming!

Today, automation and cyber technology are all around us. The latest batch of Apple iPads come equipped with augmented reality. This is the technology that overlays relevant information over a scene a camera is recording. It is being used in warehouses to allow staff to locate stock more efficiently. Delivery drivers use it to locate parcels in their trucks and to navigate around the delivery premises. Our homes are filling with intelligent televisions, sound systems, fridges, even the humble light bulb can change to any colour our hearts desire controlled remotely from anywhere in the world. It is a long way from Henry Ford's '12' dictum that we can have our Model-T's in any colour as long as they are

The challenge for parents and educators is how we prepare students to work in this new age. Inevitably, the alarmists and doomsayers have been having a field day. It is common to hear the mantra "the robots will eat your job for breakfast". Not only are such claims unfounded, they are having a damaging impact on young people left feeling insecure and disconnected by this dystopian view.

Genuine experts in this field include Mike Priddis, CEO of Faethm. An ex-partner with Boston Consulting, he has undertaken a major project with the CSIRO on the impact of Artificial Intelligence (AI) and work. He points out that while robot adoption is doubling yearly, there is no clear fact base upon which to predict what is going to happen. It is not simply a case of jobs being destroyed or

created by robotics, many will be augmented by robotics and AI. The impact will be most negative on low-skilled work and workers who lack the capability to transfer their skills.

Living in a world of change and complexity means embracing chance and uncertainty as the inevitable concomitants of work. Learning that change is inevitable (except from a vending machine) and learning that uncertainty represents opportunity as much if not more than danger is critical for our students.

Unfortunately, traditional career education is stuck in the '12' mindset. We should not be preoccupied with trying to lock students into narrowly defined occupational choices or indeed seeking to reduce them to static personality and interest categories in this '14' world.

We need to engage and inspire students from primary school about the possibilities of work, and highlight the connections between what they are doing right now in their schools and what they might become. This is one reason why I have joined Become.education, who are transforming careers education for young people, making it easier for educators to deliver evidence-based best practice to their students. The company was co-founded by a graduate of ACU's Career Education program, and delivers programs for students in year 5 onwards.

We need to help all students develop opportunity awareness skills as I describe

in the Chaos Theory of Careers (Pryor and Bright, 2011). These are Flexibility, Optimism, Curiosity, Strategy, Persistence, Risk, Self-Efficacy, and Luck Readiness.

Students need contemporary career education on an ongoing basis from primary onwards, that develops these attributes so that they can enter a world of work, where they are continually learning new skills, adapting and transferring those skills, spotting new opportunities and being resilient in the face of inevitable set-backs.

Having written all this I am reminded that "it is difficult making predictions, especially about the future". This apt quote highlights the inherent uncertainty of the future and it is ironic that the source of the quote is also uncertain, having been attributed to a baseball coach, Yogi Berra, but also to the physicist Nils Bohr. The world is changing and uncertain, and career education needs to reflect these realities.

Parents & Children - Educating for Our Future

Formed in late 2013, Catholic School Parents Australia (CSPA) is recognised as the national body representing and advocating for the parents of over 766,000 children and young people who attend the 1737 Catholic schools across Australia. Driven by their core values of *Integrity, Respect, Faith* and *Inclusivity,* CSPA supports and celebrates the holistic education (cognitive, social, physical, ethical and spiritual) offered to students in Catholic schools.

As advocates for families with children and young people in Australian Catholic schools, CSPA emphasises that in educating for the future, it is vital that parents be engaged with their children's learning from birth through to their transition from school... and beyond. The Australian Curriculum outlines general capabilities which encompass knowledge, skills, behaviours and dispositions that will help students to live and work successfully in the 21st century – these seven general capabilities are: Literacy; Numeracy; Information and Communication Technology (ICT) Capability; Critical and Creative Thinking; Personal and Social Capability; Ethical Understanding; and Intercultural Understanding. It is expected that these general capabilities will be incorporated wherever possible into the content areas that your child is studying at school.

The OECD Learning Framework (OECD LF) 2030 titled *The Future We Want* outlines the knowledge, skills, attitudes and values which underpin the competencies students will require in over a decade from now. Importantly, the OECD LF outlines how 'educators must not only recognise learners' individuality.

but also acknowledge the wider set of relationships – with their teachers, peers, families and communities – that influence their learning' (OECD, 2018, p. 4).

Much research over the past fifty years has outlined the vital role of parents in their children's learning (e.g. research by Epstein; Harris; Mapp; Pushor; Saltmarsh; and Emerson, Fear, Fox and Sanders). Well supported findings show how parents engaging in their child's learning leads to children achieving higher grades, developing better social skills, improving behaviour and achieving better transitioning post-secondary.

In this parent engagement space, CSPA has been active in exploring parent engagement practices in schools across all school sectors nationwide. Working in partnership with the University of Southern Queensland (USQ) and ARACY, CSPA has used funding from the Australian Government's Department of Education and Training (DET) to survey and interview principals and parents about parent engagement. A key outcome of this research has been the generation of toolkits, to be launched in early 2019, outlining for principals, teachers and parents/carers, contemporary parent engagement strategies to enhance student learning and wellbeing.

Parents/carers engaging with their children in their education is paramount in their early years, and there is much evidence from Longitudinal Surveys of Australian Youth to support the reality that, outside their academic achievement at age 15, the most important factor affecting a child's Year 12 completion and later occupational status at age 30 is the influence of their parents. Parents do have the opportunity to make a real difference in their child's future by engaging with them across the whole of their learning journey and it is vital that schools play a proactively supportive role in nurturing this engagement.

8 TIPS TO ENGAGE WITH YOUR CHILD'S LEARNING AND WELL-BEING AT SCHOOL

- Meet and connect with your child's teacher(s) early in the school year.
- 2. Stay up to date with what your child is learning at school and talk with them about it.
- Participate in opportunities at school to find out more about your child's learning.
- Read to your child every day and share the joy of learning through words, rhymes and stories.
- 5. Share important information about your child with their teacher(s) and the school.
- 6. Encourage and support your child to do their very best both in their learning and behaviour have realistic expectations.
- Read the school newsletter and keep up to date with school happenings.
- Access information to be informed about your young people's senior school assessment and transitions from school.

Forming Young People for the Future Church

In an increasingly diverse society, Catholic educators must understand that young people will be drawn to God through many different pathways.

In 2017, Australia's Catholic bishops conducted a survey of young people aged 16-30 across Australia. More than 15,000 young people completed the survey, 81% of them between the ages of 16 and 18.

The report from the Catholic bishops' Pastoral Research Office found three experiences were particularly strong in helping young people aged 16-18 engage with God – youth groups, mission and outreach opportunities, and Mass and liturgical gatherings.

Youth groups were the most positive experience among young people, because it was a place where they could make new friends, discuss issues and explore their faith.

Mission and outreach experiences provided an opportunity to serve others, and space for self-reflection and spiritual growth, while school Masses and liturgical activities

were considered spiritually uplifting experiences. Digging underneath these broad trends, one could see a great diversity in the responses from young people.

Having their voices heard, and feeling part of the community, was understandably important. Many, particularly among those under 18, spoke about the need for the Church to engage young people in conversation about issues that affect them, especially issues such as mental health, study, body image, relationships, and sexuality.

Others, particularly older more engaged Catholic young people, spoke of feeling excluded in their parish, and desiring a richer liturgical experience than what was on offer. Traditional practices, like adoration or Latin Mass – which might turn off many older Catholics – proved popular among some young adult Catholics, while others were more drawn to social justice and outreach activities. In his comments on the survey, Fr Chris Ryan MGL said the diversity of

responses indicated that the Church needs to recognise the different perspectives of young people – both those that go to Mass, and those who don't.

'Expressions of spirituality and faith today must speak personally to youth (and not only to youth) if they are to be deemed important in their lives. Faith practices cannot be imposed from without, but must be personally appropriated by the individuals themselves. Even those young people who value traditional expressions of Catholic faith and piety do so on this basis: that it speaks to them personally rather than primarily because the Church teaches that this or that practice is valuable.'

Jesuit theologian Karl Rahner once wrote that 'the Christian of the 21st century will be a mystic, or they will not exist'. One might conclude from this survey of young people that the Catholic school of the 21st century must open up diverse opportunities for young people to encounter the mystery of God, or they will fail to engage young people entirely.

DATA AROUND YOUTH SPIRITUALITY

A study released in September 2018 from ANU, Deakin and Monash universities looked at the religious beliefs of students in Years 9 and 10 (ages 15-16). The researchers found that at least half of teens identified as 'religious nones' – ie. not identifying with any religion or religious group. The picture, however, was more complex than just religious belief vs non-belief. They identified six religious 'types':

- This-worldly Those with no space for religious, spiritual or non-material possibilities, but not necessarily identifying as atheists. (23% of young people surveyed)
- **Religiously committed** Religion and church attendance is a big part of their lives (17%)
- **3.** Seekers Describe themselves as 'spiritual', with an eclectic worldview incorporating a range of beliefs including religious belief (8%)
- **Spiritual but not religious** God, faith and religion not important to them, but there's an openness to religious possibilities including life after death and reincarnation (18%)
- 5. Indifferent Largely indifferent or undecided about religion, spirituality and atheism (15%)
- **Nominally religious** Largely culturally religious, following the religious identity of their parents, guardians or community (20%).



Academy of Mary Immaculate is committed to girls' education and has a strong belief in the future role young women will play in Australia and the world. The Mercy values that shape our school's daily life sustain this vision and resulting in a supportive learning environment.

As the city school for girls, we sit on the crossroads of where education meets the real world. We want to develop in each student an appreciation and respect for our holistic environment: from the local urban, to rural living, to global possibilities. We match core curriculum with extension and support programs, and offer a wide range of co-curricular subjects, including

visual and performing arts, sports, social justice, and leadership initiatives.

We're particularly proud of our Year 9 crosscurricular program, 'Synergy'. This year, students worked with local traditional owners and the Yarra Riverkeeper Association to study environment and sustainability around the Yarra River. This program allows students to discover what motivates them, to critically think about the problems they encounter, and to create sustainable actions for positive change.

Our close connections with Melbourne's premiere learning and cultural centres enhance our learning programs. By conducting some of our classes at Melbourne Museum, the NGV and ACMI, we enrich students' social and cultural awareness and equip them for their future – whether they plan to go to university, to travel our world or to work.

Digital technology is disrupting current industries, leading to a change in the nature of how we work. Academy of Mary Immaculate prepares our students for these future workplaces by re-defining traditional ideas of 'careers'.

In Year 7, we guide and encourage students to use digital resources that assist their learning. Each student participates in a State Library of Victoria research skills workshop where they master how to source authentic content in a digital-driven education system and to derive value from their findings.

Students develop their foundational skills as they progress to middle school. Our careers education program designed for Year 8 students, 'Opportunity Knocks', mimics the complexity of real-world industries by enhancing a student's sense of 'being informed', their flexible mental application and enterprise skills.

Our Year 10 careers program – which includes traditional work experience and job-seeking workshops – helps students understand the core skills they possess and discover how they can transfer them into a workplace. By practically applying what they have learnt inside and outside the Academy, our girls connect the dots between knowledge, skills and social enterprise.

We continue these rich interactions with Melbourne through simulated work-experience projects such as, LendLease at Docklands, Swinburne University's 'Power of Engineering' event, and the option to complete a Certificate I in Financial Literacy. These sit alongside our careers education program and allow students to discover their identity as young Australian women seeking to shape the world.

As well as immersions to Timor-Leste and Santa Teresa, our senior students can travel to France and Italy.

These study tours, in the company of teachers, are available to those who study French, Italian, history, politics and art. They visit the usual tourist attractions as well as places linked to Marist Brothers' founder St Marcellin Champagnat.

Returning from an immersion or overseas tour, students often comment that the experience has been life-changing, and they feel a real connection with those who made them feel so welcome.

THE FUTURE

Caroline Chisholm Catholic College is a coeducational secondary College in Melbourne's inner west, dedicated to learning excellence in an engaged, faith-filled and supportive environment. The College supports students to be the best they are called to be, whether academically with science and mathematics, artistically with music and drama, hands-on trades or through our cocurriculum activities, such as sports and social justice.

Our programs provide a strong foundation for future pathways which is reflected in our academic results: 95% of our Year 12 students have gone onto tertiary education, and in 2017, we

maintained our median Study Score of 30. Our College Dux achieved a 99.1 ATAR and several students were successful in achieving scholarships to top tier universities. Our VET and VCAL programs continue to go from strength to strength. Students are able to enjoy real-life work experience while finishing their studies.

We have state of the art science labs, a trade training centre - complete with 3D printing, an indoor swimming pool, 850-seat auditorium, two libraries and a wholly-owned outdoor education campus. All students are given laptops and our IT infrastructure is leading among schools in the area.

Our digital technologies studies offer students the opportunity to learn coding and programming and, if interested, participate in the VEX Robotics Challenge where students demonstrate their skills in robotics programming.

Students have access to online platforms that enhance their learning, and through our networks, including the University of Melbourne and Victoria University, students are able to gain insights into future studies and work opportunities.

Also developed in association with the University of Melbourne, our Reading Program challenges each student to set individual goals and monitor their reading progress, building upon literacy skills developed during primary school and enhancing the skills required for success in the senior pathways.

Although students achieve excellent academic success, the College believes education is more than just a score. There are a number of extension programs, including international exchanges with schools in Japan and Italy; Aspire, our accelerated educational and enrichment program; Encore Music for students in Years 7 to 9; and a partnership

with Australian Catholic University enabling Year 12 students to study tertiary subjects while at the College.

Driven by a personalised learning philosophy the classroom is differentiated. learning intentions are explicit and teaching is scaffolded to allow all students the opportunity to build their skills and knowledge.


To further support our students, Killester College is working in partnership with the Australian Mathematics and Science Institute (AMSI) on a program called Choose Maths. The focus of this program is to help prepare students and teachers for a future where Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics will be even more important than they are today.

The curriculum designed and delivered at Killester is progressive, student-centred and demands students to continuously extend themselves beyond their current capabilities and capacities. In partnership with Monash University, we have innovated and reviewed the delivery of curriculum and wellbeing with particular focus on Years 7 and 9. Findings from the Year 7 project, where there has been a ten-year emphasis on raising the bar and closing the gap in numeracy and literacy,

show that a combination of teacher collaboration and building positive relationships with students, is having significant positive influence on improvement. At Year 9, an open, flexible learning space and grouping of classes together aim to:

- place greater emphasis on thinking and the development of problem solving skills;
- embrace new developments in elearning and training students in how to access and use information;
- prioritise academic rigour; and
- focus on student-centred learning that caters to all learners through differentiation.

At Killester College, we are ensuring this forward thinking approach will prepare our students for life beyond the classroom and for careers not yet invented.

EDUCATING FOR THE FUTURE

'Preparing students for life beyond the classroom for careers not yet invented' is a challenge Loyola College is embracing with courage, enterprise and a spirit of enthusiasm. It is a challenge not unlike attempting to scale an ominously steep cliff face that has never before been conquered: you know the general direction you need to take, you know there may be setbacks with repositioning required, but you are self-assured that with the right set of tools, knowledge and skills, and a resilient mindset of continuous improvement, you will make it to the top.

Discerning digital citizens, well-formed confident young men and women capable of making a

valuable contribution to society are what Loyola College aims to make of its students. While they may benefit from having 24/7 access to the world and to the College's learning management system via their personal, one-to-one digital devices, technology is just a tool - having the skills and knowledge to make effective use of such technology is just as important.

Development of physical learning spaces that promote face-to-face collaboration, without diminishing access to digital resources and tools, is an area Loyola College has in recent years actively pursued. Following an Ignatian tradition of companionship and conversation, along with pedagogical best-practice and research, the College has in the past 18 months been trialling a 'collaborative learning booth' classroom, and for several years now has been rolling out several

'Student Operated Learning Environment' (SOLE, Sugata Mitra) style classrooms. These learning spaces employ a range of design thinking measures, such as student-accessible state of the art audiovisual monitors, super-wide touch screen computer pods and whiteboard-surfaced tables. These setups are designed to promote authentic, face-to-face conversation and team-based problem solving, while giving students single-point, group access to high end digital technologies.

In an age where the ubiquity of the Internet of Things, Wearable Technologies, Virtual/Augmented Reality and Artificial Intelligence creates a digital Geostorm of unimaginable career possibilities for our young people, ultimately it will be the individual's human uniqueness and the capacity for that individual to nurture and maintain authentic, real relationships with other humans, and with all

elements of God's creation, that will add value to society and the environment, and lead to a fulfilling. life-giving future.

It is doubtful anyone can accurately predict how steep and how high is the cliff face that is our young people's future. Navigating the ethical conundrums, not just the technological ones, requires not just a healthy relationship with the technologies we use. but also a healthy disposition to oneself, to those others around us and to our place in this world. Loyola College's commitment to the values of 'Justice, Mercy and Faith' embraces an education of the whole person, valuing the past, being present to ourselves and each other in the current moment, while enthusiastically gazing into the future, ever attentive to new learning experiences.

MacKillop College has a strong commitment to educating the whole person rather than focusing exclusively on subject specific material. In service to this commitment, we have various extracurricular activities and opportunities available to students, including art, music, theatre, sporting activities, an extensive Outdoor Education Program, a Religious Retreat Program and an International Program.

Our theme for 2019 is Many journeys, one community and, as we do with every annual theme, it will be woven into the curriculum to try and ground our students' lives in the wider community,

and the wider world. Our hope is that this will serve to prepare them for a future beyond our College and might help cultivate a love to learn from the diversity and opportunities the future holds.

This week serves as an introduction to the eclectic range of international food, music, fashion and dance that enrich the world and, we hope, sparks a curiosity within our students to deepen that experience.

International and local students can interact with our curriculum at any year level, including completing VCE or VCAL over two or three years. Students become integrated into our educative

community from their first day and become part of a dedicated homeroom and pastoral structure. This allows for a well-rounded experience for all who come through our doors.

All of this is made possible by our having outstanding facilities, a dedicated ICCT centre, beautifully maintained gardens, grounds, sporting fields and recreational areas. We have a genuine respect for the environment and a keen focus on sustainability and sustainable learning.

Choosing A School



Be better informed about this crucial choice. How?

Open Days and School Tours: Open Days showcase the school at its best, but you also might want to see the school on a regular operating day - a tour is great for that. These are sometimes taken by teachers, even better when they are taken by students. Entrusting a tour to its students without teacher supervision says something about the transparency of the school and the confidence it has in its students. Ask questions on tour - don't hold back - get to know the environment.

Gather your intel: check out the school website. Is it updated regularly? Does it have a contemporary feel? The state and navigability of the site can tell you a lot about a school's attitude not only to education, but also to technology. Grab a prospectus or handbook: what subject choices are there? Schools can easily supply a list of every subject offered at each year level and if they can't, then move on. What facilities do they have? Are they being well maintained? Make a list of the things you and your child are looking for and check them off.

Results: it's not the only thing you look for, but how does the school perform at its 'pointy end' - Yr 12? So, make sure you know about the trend data on Yr 12 results - are they improving or declining over the last three years? It's worth knowing that the school can get a healthy percentage of their students through Yr 12 and into tertiary education. Moreover, good schools can track exactly which courses are being selected, so ask for that information.

What does your child want? Traditionally seen as a purely parental decision, this is an easy one to overlook, but should be considered. Is your choice of school one that your child wants to go to? Does she have friends there? Does he want to take that 50-minute bus ride everyday? Has your child expressed any preferences? Have you had the conversation?

Tech Awareness

What can you do now that protects your children for a future that's increasingly going to be spent in the online space? We all want to be safe in the online environment.

Talk to your children: set your expectations clearly about usage of social media and how much they can use it, but also talk about safety on the Net: not engaging with strangers, cyberbullying, the dangers of file sharing. inappropriate imagery or content, and not responding to scams.

Know what kids are doing: be aware of how they are using the internet and how often. Do they disappear into their room for hours at a time, quietly, and not much homework is getting done? Have them use the computer or mobile device in a shared space. Consider setting restricted modes or privacy controls


Another big choice here. Do I choose the subjects I like? Subjects that get scaled up? Arts? Sciences? Tough choice, but I have to make it. How?











Don't worry about scaling: if you're too focused on the scores and whether they go up or down, you're not doing the subject for the right reasons – this is an extrinsic (external) motivation and is not nearly as powerful as intrinsic motivators in sustaining performance over a long period.

Look at the subject requirements: is it a subject that requires a heavy portfolio load? Does it require a lot of reading? Do you need to write major essays and reports for it? Is it mostly technical? Does it cover what you think it does? See what the subject assessment requires and ask yourself if that's something you genuinely think you can handle, particularly together with your other choices.

Know your uni preferences? If you know what you want to do in uni then this will guide your choice, especially in prerequisite subjects (ones you need to study for a certain course). Don't be afraid, however, to choose one subject outside your study area; it broadens your horizons and prepares you for a more flexible future where you learn to consider other perspectives. Many universities have their students choose a subject each year from an elective program which must be outside their field of study.

What if I don't know what I want to do? The best advice here is to go with a broad range: a humanities subject, a maths, a science and English will give you a good grounding in a range of disciplines while also keeping your options open.

The Future Can Do Now



on social media sites they often visit. Set limits on recreational use of tech. No phones at the dinner table is a good place to start.

Let them know you know: perhaps one of the biggest dangers here is parental ignorance. Do a bit of homework yourself on what sites your child is on and how they work. It at least informs the conversations you have.

Explore the positive use of tech: help your child become tech-savvy and reinforce their decision-making resources. Build up ways of researching information on the Net, talk about trustworthy sources, make them aware of the issue of plagiarism, especially as a uni-prep skill, take active involvement in their research – not by doing it for them, but by helping and guiding.

Preparing For University Now

This just happens in Years 11 and 12, right? No, your child can start developing habits and good practices as early as the start of secondary school. Students entering university need to develop the skills to become independent learners as they move from a more structured school environment to one in which they must be self-directed. How? Here are some things your child can do from Year 7.

Manage your time: start using tools to map out your study activities and commitments. A poster-size wall planner is great for longer term planning, such as when assignments or tasks are due (see the writing process below), when exams are on, and for charting other commitments, like part time jobs or holidays.

Get used to writing: most programs require writing at some point. Follow a process for producing written work (you can chart this process in your wall planner):

- 1. **Analyse** the topic/question
- 2. Form a starting **Plan**
- 3. **Read** and take **Notes** directly into your plan (note sources)
- Write using these notes (start anywhere in the body, write Intro and Conclusion last)
- 5. **Edit** before submitting (print out to do final read-through)
- 6. **Submit** the paper; make sure you know how to submit and by when.

Read: the need for reading is a feature of almost every university program. There are two types of reading you can do: academic and leisure. The first is reading you do in your study area – as you get closer to Year 12, do more of this. The second is any reading you do for pleasure – do as much of this as you can; it exposes you to vocabulary, structure, ideas, and importantly, good reading is the basis for good writing.

Get used to working with others: form a study group or at least have a study partner. Working with others will happen frequently at uni, so start working with others now – discuss assignments, talk about readings, ask each other exam prep questions. Develop a routine – e.g. every Monday you might go to your local library and spend a two-hour study block. You will be amazed how many students you will meet doing the same thing.

Formulate techniques for revision: start to think about ways to revise exam content that work for you. Make quiz cards, use them with your study partner; practice verbally presenting information to your partner; transform text-based notes into something visual – a flowchart or a diagram. Active, intensive, regular study sessions are better than long hours cramming at the end of semester.

Know your study preferences: Do you like to study in the morning? Do you prefer absolute quiet or music on? Do you do best in one-hour intensive bursts? Do you like seeing images over text? Get to know how you work best; these practices will also work for you at university.



USEFUL TERMS

ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admission Rank):

The overall ranking on a scale of zero to 99.95 that a student receives, based on their study scores. The ATAR is calculated in each state to reflect a student's rank against other students in that state and used by universities and TAFE institutes to select students for courses.

Higher Education Studies: First-year university studies recognised by the VCAA for contribution to the ATAR for students who are academically very able.

Prerequisites: A subject or subjects that need to be completed prior to a particular university program. Some, certainly not all, university programs have pre-requisites – for example, a course may require a certain type of mathematics to have been successfully completed.

Study score: A score from zero to 50 which shows how a student performed in a VCE study, relative to all other Victorian students enrolled in that same study in a result year. It is based on the student's results in school assessments and examinations.

Units: The components of a VCE study that are a semester in duration. There are usually four units in a VCE study, Units 1, 2, 3 and 4.

Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCAA): The authority responsible for curriculum and assessment programs for students in Victoria.

Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning

(VCAL): An accredited Secondary certificate for Year 11 and 12 students in Victoria. A hands-on course offering practical work-related experience and learning for students.

Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE): The senior secondary school qualification made up of the units studied in Yrs 11 and 12.

Vocational Education and Training (VET):

Vocational courses that provide occupational or work-related knowledge and skills in areas such as hospitality or trades, available to students in Years 11 and 12 and offered at some schools or at TAFE.

Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC): Acts on behalf of universities, TAFEs and other

Acts on behalf of universities, TAFEs and othe providers facilitating and coordinating the joint selection system. VTAC calculates and distributes the ATAR.







We proudly offer the International Baccalaureate (IB) Middle Years Program to Years 7 – 10. The IB develops our students as global, independent learners. Through independent enquiry-based learning, culminating in their Personal Project, our girls develop skills that will ensure they are ready to embrace the VCE, and life beyond school.

Through our partnership with CBC St Kilda, our girls also develop strong social skills as they learn and socialise in a co-educational environment; skills they will need in future studies and the workforce.

Sacré Cœur is a leading Catholic School for girls. It was founded in 1888 by the French order of nuns. the Society of the Sacred Heart (RSCJ). We belong to our international Sacred Heart family comprising over 150 sister schools across 40 different countries.

At the heart of a Sacred Heart education is a deep respect and concern for each student's wellbeing. We believe that positive relationships lie at the heart of learning and for students to be ready to learn, they must first feel happy and secure.

Our objective is to build and develop connections to maximise capabilities and opportunities for respectful and mutually beneficial relationships, ensuring all

students have their emotional and social wellbeing carefully nurtured.

Our vision, Sacré Cœur Women Shape the World, is a strong statement that reflects our existing and future aspirations for our young women, and it is authentic to our Sacred Heart Tradition. We believe in the need for them to be globally minded citizens who are prepared and able to share their gifts and talents with others to shape the world.

The contemporary world has seen much opportunity for individual entrepreneurship and we need to prepare our students for a world very different to the one of even a decade ago.

Agency is the ability and opportunity to make choices for oneself. We look for opportunities for agency that are age and stage appropriate. Giving students a choice in some of what they learn and produce increases the student's investment in her own learning journey. The ability to be autonomous and to take purposeful action is a major factor in success in life.

Mastery, as a contemporary learning pillar, honours all students and their need to be stretched. Mastery works in tandem with agency to allow all students to gain a level of expertise through ongoing practice on meaningful tasks. Mastery means a contemporary learning environment is very much about quality of learning rather than quantity of tasks.

The final pillar, authenticity is intrinsically linked with the other three. A contemporary learning environment demands that learning is real. Students need to believe what they are learning is meaningful and has a clear purpose. As a result, they consistently achieve excellent VCE results and seek to contribute to their local communities and to the world.

Chadstone developed a Learning and Teaching School Improvement Plan to be rolled out from 2017 – 2020. Pedagogical Framework, designed to support teachers in the delivery of quality evidence based teaching and learning practices, ultimately improving student learning.

A combination of interdisciplinary curriculum approaches, Project Based Learning (PBL) and Problem Based Learning (PrBL) will be incorporated into our new Pedagogical Framework.

Our Years 7-9 Project Based Learning Overlay (PBL) is a rigorous, relevant and engaging educational model that promotes self-directed learning and develops real world skills. Problem Based Learning (PrBL) at Year 10 and Year 11 will utilise a case study based approach to encourage students to apply their learning to real world scenarios. In 2019 we will be implementing project

Duke of Edinburgh. Santa Maria College has also proudly been involved in the Duke of Edinburgh Award offering the Bronze, Silver and Gold certificates over many years, boasting the highest achieving school in Victoria for the Gold award. It is a balanced.

non-competitive program of voluntary activities that encourages personal discovery and growth, selfreliance, perseverance, responsibility and service to the community. We believe the Duke of Edinburgh Award provides students with the opportunity to challenge gender stereotypes, work in partnership with the wider community and push themselves to new heights.

Embracing the Digital Platform for Learning. At Santa Maria College, the use of technology to support and enrich learning means students are ready to move into an agile and ever-changing 21st century world.

The use of the G-Suite for Education allows all students to freely communicate and collaborate with other students and teachers. The use of the G-Suite throughout the College allows teachers to more readily respond to the individual learning needs of each girl and to differentiate the teaching of each class. By utilising the G-Suite ecosystem, teachers are able to observe and comment on student work in

real time while they are developing it, making timely and tailored comments to help enhance each girl's learning. According to one Year 9 student. "I like that it is interactive as I can easily communicate with my teachers and peers to collaborate, share and receive feedback."

Santa Maria students in Year 7 begin their exploration of Digital Technologies, a learning program where students have the opportunity to become creators of digital tools rather than just consumers of existing technology. Through a program based around computational thinking, students explore the functions and purpose of algorithms and binary numbers and either establish, or further develop, skills in coding using Bluetooth enabled robots, such as Sphero, and select use of drones. In addition to this, possibilities for invention and innovation through the use of digital input devices called Makey Makeys places our students at the height of such digital advancement in the educational space.

EDUCATING FOR THE FUTURE

As we near the end of the second decade of the 21st century, the education system in Australia is once again under the spotlight – and at St Aloysius College, we say quite rightly so! 

EDUCATING FOR THE FUTURE

St James College is a smaller Catholic Lasallian College that provides education for young men in Years 7-10. In Years 11 and 12, our students have access and choice from an extensive range of VCE, VET and VCAL courses through our partnerships with our Brother Lasallian Colleges and local schools.

Given our size and our strong pastoral care and wellbeing programs, we ensure there is a close bond between students and staff. At St James, we see our small size as an advantage. We aim to engage young men in positive learning relationships and present opportunities for success in a wide range of endeavours.

Our young men have the opportunity to access leadership positions at an earlier time. Student Representative Council, Sporting Captains, Cultural Leaders and Social Justice Leader positions are all available for students in Years 7 to 9. Important leadership roles, such as School Captains, House Captains and Arts Leaders, are held by Year 10 students - much different to other Year 7-12 school settings.

Our staff are experienced in how young men learn. We adapt our teaching and guidance to cater for the needs of our students. We run a number of programs to extend our students through our advanced subjects - Accelerated Mathematics and Science programs, Language and Literature electives, and our special interest clubs - Public Speaking, Debating, Chess, Theatre Sports, Visual Arts, Teen Chef, Drama and Music.

Educating for the Future

The world is changing. Technology is changing the way we work, live and communicate. At St James College, we incorporate technology across our curriculum to equip our young men for their futures. In Digital Technologies, we run Robotics at Year 7 using Lego EV3 robots. This is part of the Engineering and Design subject in the Year 7 curriculum. We also teach Game Design and 3D Design at Year 8. incorporating the internationally recognised programs of Game Maker and Maya.

In Years 9 and 10, we offer a range of technologybased electives, to further develop a wide range of practical ICT skills, including Web Design, creating online database apps, drone technologies and the VET Certificate II in Creative Industries, by partnering with the Academy of Interactive Entertainment.

In Design Technologies, woodwork runs at all four year levels. Students learn skills in Years 7 and 8, and complete more advanced projects in Years 9 and 10. For Year 10 students, we also offer a VET Certificate II in Furnishing for those who wish to pursue trades in the future.

In light of our region's 'Asian millennium', at Years 7 and 8. Indonesian language is studied by all students. with an opportunity to continue this language study into Year 9 and 10 as an elective. Indonesian is also offered as VCE Unit 1 and 2 in Year 10 via the Victorian School of Languages for those students who wish to enhance their studies. Students study a range of topics within the Victorian Curriculum 7–10 framework, allowing them to begin Indonesian with the foundation of other languages learnt at Primary School. Bahasa Indonesia as our choice of language reflects the future needs, interest and growth of the world in which our students live.

EDUCATING FOR THE FUTURE

Star of the Sea College prides itself on living out its motto "Deeds not Words". The 135-year-old College is a staunch supporter of justice initiatives involving students through social interaction with those who are living on the margins of society. Students are encouraged to become involved in community events and activities to broaden this outreach. This is evidenced through a wide range of student involvement: primary school buddies, companioning of the elderly, working on environmental projects with the Presentation Sisters at Balnarring, volunteering through Sacred Heart Mission in St Kilda, Ministry Retreat working with the homeless, the Friday Night tutoring program in Richmond, Eddie Rice Camps

and soup van. Embedded in this outreach is the belief that we are continuing in the footsteps of our founder, Nano Nagle, whose love of the poor came from her deep connection to the Gospels. A contemporary education must cover all aspects of the curriculum, but the focus needs to be firmly set in the intangible skills of empathy, collaboration, cooperation and critical thinking. Armed with these "soft" skills, and an excellent academic focus. Star strives to prepare young women to achieve their potential and to be change agents for a better world. The opportunities afforded students by life experiences outside their regular environment make this a lived reality.

Education today is about how learning experiences develop key skills for our future workforce. Star has learning opportunities that generate curiosity, with students wanting to "find out more".

We develop experiences where they have to define a problem, think critically from multiple perspectives. visualise possibilities, think creatively about delivering a solution and conquer any challenge.

Project-Based Learning gives students the choice and freedom to explore issues in a collaborative way. Teachers are not the deliverers of content, they facilitate the project. The 6 Ds of Solution Fluency -Define, Discover, Dream, Design, Deliver and Debrief - provide students with problem-solving skills to work through collaborative projects and present findings to an audience.

Design Lab enables students to be creative. problem-solve and collaborate, drawing from skills and thinking used in the Arts, Digital Technology and Engineering. Students develop skills in the use of design process and the application of design thinking for new fabrication processes in the use of 3D printing. They use high and low technology and make their wearables, and develop coding skills to engineer movement for an automaton toy.

Star's NASA/STEM study tour extends and enriches the standard school curriculum with students visiting Space Camp at US Space and Rocket Centre, Alabama. They carry out physical-training exercises. STEM-engineering challenges and work together as a team on a number of space missions in simulators. learn about the success and failures associated with the history of space exploration at the Kennedy Space Centre in Florida, participate in aerodynamic experiences, such as "iFly", and undertake a physics workshop of the rides at Universal Studios. Varied and active STEM activities introduce our young women to careers and pathways beyond the classroom... and their imaginations.

provides context for students to apply their skills in a number of project/scenario-based learning activities. We believe this approach not only equips students with the skills they require in their future study and careers, but also reinforces mathematical and science content through applying their knowledge in authentic contexts.
