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
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


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Rethinking the Educational Landscape – Working Together for the Common Good

From a Catholic Education point of view, we often speak about being an institution that is Christ centred and child focused. What this means within the school context is ensuring that we are doing everything we can to give all children opportunities to learn and grow, to develop empathy and acceptance for others, and for the students to practise how they can have a positive impact on the lives of those around them and of their own using the examples provided through the gospels to take this and share this with others.







ducation is a constant situation of continual improvement and testing and re-testing of theories and practice. Those of a vintage who started their career before the turn of the century would have experienced a teaching landscape that was quite consistent in both its delivery and practice. That's not to say the teaching was easier, more that it was just dierent, especially from what has occurred over the past 10 to 15 years.

What it means to be an educator and learner has changed guite signifi antly. Where before there was perhaps less consideration of the learner and more about what was being taught, this can no longer be said to be true. Educators now take into consideration many aspects of the needs of the learner spending signifiant time planning for these di erences and implementing individual plans.

The last three years have dramatically changed the education landscape for both the learner and the educator. Teachers were not trained in how to deal with the rapidly changing situation that we all dealt with during the periods of lockdowns. For the first time in our living memory, we were in a period of the unknown not having a reference point on what to do and how to do it. This became a time for thinking out of the normal and utilising and adapting what others were doing.

Doing this, I believe, has given us an opportunity that has previously been used, but not widely implemented: looking at other educational situations that have experienced success and taking and learning from what has happened to learn from them for our organisation.

But sometimes, instead of trying to create something completely new, it is more about adapting and making small changes to something that is already there and using it in a new and di erent way. When

the first loc down occurred in 2020, schools became conscious of the context of their school community and their own particular needs. Not every school did the same thing. What was successful for many was the sharing of ideas and then developing them for their situation.

And I think this holds a key for what the future for education may hold.

I can see sustained success coming from groups and schools working together. Finding the synergies that occur between two or three learning communities, and then developing a system that holds everyone accountable for the learning happening not only within each place, but also within the collective.

When we work with others who are like-minded it invigorates everyone and provides the opportunity to open our minds to opportunities that we couldn't possibly have discovered or come across by ourselves. I see the future in education being one where we are open to the opportunities of working and growing together for not just individual success, but for the greater good.

And we can only do this if we are prepared to get out of our comfort zone and explore the opportunities of working and learning from likeminded and generous educators, opening the doors to creating learning communities that are outside the physical restraints of our location.

We have a world-class system of education in Australia. There are also over 7000 schools that o er a primary education across this country. In many cases, each of these schools operates relatively separately from each other. There are always opportunities for schools to share best practices and the pandemic has provided the key for us to explore this through technology. The platforms that were central during the

past few years, Teams, Google Meet and Zoom, provide a cheap and secure platform for sharing and learning together. Whether this occurs between single classrooms that transverse the continent or with a school a few kilometres away is irrelevant. And the platform doesn't matter either as long as each school can connect.

The key to this opportunity is like-minded people working from a shared interest or key area of growth in their school and using the network of others to work with, create, evaluate and deliver a curriculum that provides growth for their situation, and which does the same for those who they share and work together with in this shared arrangement.

And how could we bring other organisations into this shared space too? Could we include health and disability agencies as part of this shared network?

The pandemic has provided an opportunity to rethink and reimage a system of education that has stayed the same for the past 140 years except for some tweaks over that period. The future, our children's future, is in the connectivity and relationships that we need to discover and foster. If we can take this opportunity over the next few years, the outcomes for our students and our communities could be amazing.

If we could put this into place in each of our schools, wouldn't that be living a Christ centred, child focused education, one where we share and grow for the greater good while improving the lives of each student in our care. A silver lining from the past three years of difficul and uncertainty is within our reach, only if we are prepared to take that first step

Education – A Compelling Compass!

assive automation comes with artificial intelligence, obotization, virtual and augmented realities – this means the following 21st century skills are imperative. Given the reports that have been released, such as the "Looking to the Future - Report into Senior Secondary Pathways Into Work, Further Education and Training (Education Council, Professor Peter Shergold – Chair, June 2020), we take note of the recommendations, particularly the following: Recommendation 5 (p.20) states that Senior Secondary Education requirements and the way learning is packaged should be restructured so that students are not presented with a binary choice between vocational and higher education pathways. As quoted in the Report, John Dewey (Radio 1940s) - "we must prepare our children not for the world of the past, not for our world, but for their world, the world of the future." How many schools are non-binary in their approach and place equal emphasis and resources around their structure?

In addition, we note the importance of the e ect of living in times of global challenge – the Pandemic, climate change, extreme weather, energy usage, cyber attacks, massive technological change racing ahead of the law, conflict and mig ation, biodiversity loss and extinction, gender, racial, disability gaps, erosion of social cohesion. It is through education that the world can advance human rights. This entails building the capabilities that make students autonomous and ethical thinkers and doers. It means equipping them to collaborate with others and developing their agency, responsibility, empathy, critical and creative thinking, alongside a full range of social and emotional skills. As noted by the OECD (Better Policies for Better Lives), it means developing student agency, along with co-agency with peers, teachers, parents, carers and communities to navigate the world, to enhance wellbeing.

As Antonio Guterres says:

"Education is the key to personal development and the future of societies, it unlocks opportunities, and narrows inequalities. It is the bedrock of informed, tolerant societies, and a primary driver of sustainable development."

This is the call from Antonio Guterres Secretary of the United Nations, it is the call from UNESCO. It is the call to guide us in our future. It is the call to all educators, inherent to our role as Catholic educators.

Cooperation, collaboration and solidarity must be at the centre of our teaching – this is the challenge of the equity gap.

UNESCO graues as a society, solidarity, compassion, ethics and empathy should be ingrained in how we learn – this is central to Catholic Social Teachina. Teachina should be focused on unlearning bias, prejudice and divisiveness and feeling empathy - this is the ability to attend to others and feel with them. Assessment needs to be based around solving real problems. Students need to be competent in STEM technologies and embrace artistic and cultural expression. Curiosity is a driver, as Professor Pasi Salzburg urges, we need to nurture the society of tomorrow. Global competencies are the new imperative.

As the United Nations Leader has pointed out – education is fast becoming "a great divider", noting that some 70 per cent of 10-year-olds in poor countries are unable to read and are "barely learning". With access to the best resources, schools and universities, the rich get the best jobs, while the poor – especially girls – displaced people, and students with disabilities, face huge obstacles to getting the qualifi ations that could change their lives.

As Catholic educators this is the drive for the future! As President of CaSPA, our Association is privileged to be able to strive for advocacy, in unity and service to these goals. We need to create a more sustainable, inclusive, just and peaceful world. Creative solutions is the call to our students, making our education transformational and providing them with a strong compass for the future.



A Reimagining of University Education

I am often asked how university education has changed over the past decade. Given the considerable technological advancement and social disruption which has occurred over this timeframe, it is safe to say that university education has altered considerably.



 $\overline{}$ he fact is that students require an educational experience that is di erent from that of the past – one which is future-focused, technologically enabled and impact driven. With technologically enriched processes increasing accessibility and delivering a learner-centred experience, the digital transformation of educational delivery has been critical in meeting this need. Furthermore, to balance the advantages of a digital classroom with benefits that an only be obtained through human interaction, universities are adapting other aspects of their educational repertoire.

When we reimagine, we open ourselves up to possibility. A need for change can serve as a catalyst for finding new opportunities and charting new di ections. The world is changing on many fronts. This has compelled universities to sharpen their value proposition and transform their pedagogical approaches.

Over the next ten years, we can expect to see much educational e ort being focused on achieving objectives associated with sustainable economic development. These include working to reduce disadvantage and inequality, building person-centric health systems, addressing issues surrounding global warming, and creating socially responsible growth economies. People who face disadvantage are the ones least likely to enter higher education. To break down structural and social barriers that prevent participation, universities will be seeking to provide inclusive options for underrepresented groups to access pathway, tertiary and micro-credentialisation options.

Through technological advancement, universities will be looking for opportunities to improve and enhance pedagogical techniques intended to train the future workforce. The use of augmented reality and virtual reality technologies in the classroom, for instance, is making huge advances and will continue to do so.

The following decade will also see greater interdisciplinarity being incorporated into university teaching and learning. Many of the world's challenges will require such an approach to solve them and this is where the humanities and the social sciences will continue to play an important role in education. Irrespective of the course being delivered, we can hope to see subjects, such as philosophy, sociology, politics and economics, embedded into the learning experience. This will not only improve students' understanding of the social complexities that influence the global lands ape, but will hone their skills in communication, problem solving, and ethical reasoning. Universities will also be looking to integrate these skills in a manner that is relevant to their students and allows them to apply these learnings by incorporating opportunities to undertake civic engagement and community volunteering practicums as part of their academic journey.

The coming decade will see universities using their physical spaces to build microcosms of future ambition. Co-labs, innovation hubs and business accelerators will be used to foster communities of collaboration and enable future change makers by providing students the opportunity, space and support to focus on their own venture creations. In particular, universities will be directing their investment in entrepreneurial education towards advancing the global common good. They will encourage students to apply the principles of entrepreneurship towards achieving positive social or environmental impact and empower them to search for innovative and sustainable solutions to social problems they believe are important.

University-industry collaborations with like-minded partners will be an additional component in the entrepreneurial skill development of students. Industry co-location on campuses is gaining considerable traction and will likely be a predominant feature of the future university. The advantage for students is that they will have industry integrated learning and research opportunities on their doorstep. The transition to the workforce is infinitely mo e seamless if they have already been applying their learnings to real life contexts and have developed a familiarity with workforce realities. The advantage for industry is that they have input into the types of knowledge and skills being taught to future workers in their field and ha e ready access to trained recruits, world-class researchers and state-of-the-art facilities.

Change can lead to new opportunities. This is just a glimpse of the direction in which university education is likely to head in the near future. Perhaps the most important point is that nothing will, or indeed should, remain the same.

And, in the face of change, education must always be reimagined.



How Might We Reimagine Education in 2023?

mmediately, I think of the dad who told me he was 'lost'. He couldn't understand the gender identity debate that had enveloped his daughter at her big Catholic school in Sydney. He wanted to be a good

A year 12 student at a Melbourne Catholic school also springs to mind. She told me how her interest in attaining the ATAR to capture a spot in Medicine had evaporated during long, lonely lockdowns. She just wanted 'connection' and university was now off her to-do list

And our teachers, too, are an anchor in that triangle of education success, along with students and parents. This remark from one teacher at a big Queensland Catholic school keeps me awake at night. Why do so many students mourn the marks they lose, he asked, rather than celebrate the marks they get?

challenge as is how schools navigate gender identity. The anxiety that grips too many children, young and younger, needs to be addressed head-on. Body image, consent, bullying, friendships and social media also fill a list of challenges to be add essed as we move forward.

Some of those issues point to the state of mental health in our school population; an unwelcome legacy left by COVID. With almost one in seven Australian children aged four to 17 su ering a mental health disorder, we can't a ord not to act. It needs to dominate our conversations around and within our schools, and involve parents, educators and our children. Our students are our future, and their voice is crucial to ensure they are match fit to lead, engage and emb ace a world that will continue to change.

Our schools need to be filled with edu ators who grow our children's hearts along with their heads; educators who teach our children to never put a ceiling on their own potential. And we, as parents and their vital role.


That doesn't diminish the role of families in their child's education. It's at home where many school lessons are practiced. It's also at home where other crucial skills are learnt – from the value of teamwork to

It's when that triangle of education works – parents, teachers and children – that everything works. Take a cog out of the wheel, and it

As I pen this, another inquiry is underway, due to report in 2023. It's into the phenomenon of 'school refusal' when emotional distress not seen before, mirroring challenges like eating disorders and anxiety.

In the past year, I've spoken at dozens of schools to engaged, psychologists and school counsellors. We all want the same.

Perhaps 2023 is the year when the confluence of challenges face by our children leads to a tighter triangle of engagement amongst

where my children's minds are stretched along with their hearts. Where they learn the value of balance. Where the academic successes are celebrated – but so too are those that will determine, post-school, how they give back to the world their cohorts will one day lead.

Do they value forgiveness? Inclusion? Diversity? The role of teamwork?




